UNIFORM COURSE OF STUDY

Presidents of Normal Schools Are Preparing Same

The presidents of the four Oregon state normal schools are in the city today, engaged in preparing a uniform course of study under the new law providing for one board of regents, and harmonizing of the work of training teachers for the whole state. They are Robert C. French, of Weston; E. D. Reesler, of Monmouth; B. F. Mulkey, of Ashland, and A. L. Briggs, of Drain.

The normal presidents will work up their course today, and Thursday they will meet with the board of regents for adoption of the course, and submit reports turning over the property of the four schools to the new state board.

The labors of the presidents and of the regents are of the utmost importance to the future education in Oregon, and their work is being carefully done.

WILL NOT RECOGNIZE THEM

San Francisco, July 17.—Schmitz today announced that he would refuse to recognize Taylor as mayor, and so soon as there are any vacancies in municipal offices he will fill them. He claims he has already made up his mind as to the men he will appoint to succeed the present supervisors, should they resign. He says the appointment of Taylor will in no way affect his standing, and maintains that he is the only legal mayor.

STRIKE STILL PENDING

Oakland, Cal., July 17.—Small leaves for Chicago within the next 48 hours. He says nothing will be done toward the extension of the strike until he holds a conference there Thursday with some of the more important leaders of the local unions East. Miller, of the Western Union, speaking for Clowry, in answer to a request from Commissioner Neill that a suggestion be made for a basis of settling the strike, declared the company was willing to reinstate all but a few strikers, who were unduly prominent in the union.

Andrew Jackson's Education.

During each winter for two or three years after he had reached the age of seven Andrew Jackson was sent to the old field school of a Mr. Branch. After this he attended the select school which a Presbyterian preacher, the Rev. Dr. David Humphreys, taught in the Waxhaw settlement. He appears to have been going to this higher school in the spring of 1870, when the Inroad of Tarleton created a panic in that portion of the Carolinas. At some later period of his youth he is said to have attended the old Queen college or seminary at Charlotte a couple of terms, but the time is not definitely known.

As to education, therefore, it may be safely stated that Andrew Jackson enjoyed much more than the ordinary advantage of a backwoods boy of his time. At the age of ten he had become so good a reader that he was often chosen to read the newspaper to the assembled neighbors, and he remembered with pride in after years that he had thus had the honor of "reading out loud" the Declaration of Independence upon its arrival in the Waxhaws. For a lad of ten this was, indeed, something to remember with honest pride.—Thomas E. Watson in Watson's Jeffersonian Magazine.

Class of Halsey.

San Francisco, July 17.—Morning session of the Glass trial was devoid of sensational evidence. A number of minor officials of the telephone company were examined by the prosecution in the effort to fix the duties of Halsey. LAND

SUIT

Went to the Jury This Forenoon At Eleven O'clock

All Tuesday was occupied in Judge Burnett's court with the trial of the condemnation case brought by the state board of trustees of the institution for feeble minded to secure the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Thiel. A jury was empaneled consisting of E. A. Cone, D. F. Eckhout, Peter Feller, R. B. Fleming, C. S. Hamilton, Alex. Harrold, J. W. Harritt, A. L. Harvey, E. T. Malvin, N. Mickel, J. S. Pennebaker and John Scott.

The jury went upon the land and looked over the whole property. Arguments were cut short by the court, and the case went to the jury at about an hour before noon.

Verdict for Thiel.

The jury brought in a verdict about 1 o'clock as follows: "We, the jury in the above entitled civil action, find for the plaintiff and assess damages for defendant, in case the property described in the amended complaint is taken by plaintiff, at the sum of \$8386.40."

The Thiel land is 85 acres. The state wanted it at \$75 an acre. Thiel asked \$125. The jury gave him \$95 an acre and \$300 damages.

R. B. Fleming was foreman. Bingham and Martin were their attorneys.

The Thiels Will Fight.

The Thiels have won the suit, but are not satisfied with the verdict, as they claim to have \$10,000 invested in the land, and say that the state has bucconed them out of \$2000. They say they will not get off the land, unless they are put off by force, and will not accept the award of the jury.
