FUNERAL OF MRS. SHANNON

Pioneer Woman of Marion County Laid at Rest.

The funeral services over the remains of the late Mrs. Wesley Shannon, of Eugene, were conducted at the presence of a large number of friends at the First Congregational church at 10 o'clock today. Rev. S. Knight conducted the services in a very impressive manner, giving a sketch of the life of the departed and making reference to many of the circumstances of her life. Among those present were Mr. Mrs. T. G. Hendricks, of Eugene, Mrs. R. O. Thomas, of Turner, many other friends of the departed. Her nephews, Grover Simmons, Howell, and Jerome Simmons, Monitor, were present.

On Monday, July 15th, Mrs. Shannon died at Eugene, and in accordance with her desire, the remains were brought to Salem, and laid to rest beside her husband, Wesley Shannon, in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Mrs. Shannon was one of the pioneers of Marion county, crossing the plains in the year 1845, some 62 years ago when the country was a wilderness. Together with her parents she grew up the old Indiana home, where her childhood had been spent. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Simmons, settled at Howell Prairie, where her brother, Grover, still resides.

It was upon this old home place after the death of her parents, the Elizabeth, now Mrs. Wesley Shannon, erected a church as a free gift to her neighbors. This church stands as a monument to her memory for religion.

Thirty-five years ago, Rev. P. S. Knight, then pastor of the First Congregational church in this city, received Mrs. Shannon into membership in this city, with which she was prominently identified until her removal to Eugene, where she assisted in organizing the Congregational church there.

Her husband, who died several years ago, was well known here, having been the builder of the house that is an old land mark in Salem, that owned at present by Mrs. Rana at the end of Chemeketa street. Her brother, Davis Shannon, was at one time county judge of Marion county.

his body was recovered in a hole about 50 feet deep several hundred yards below where he went down. Marshal Gibson and Deputy Sheriff Esch went to the rescue with grappling hooks, and finally succeeded in rescuing the body, but life was extinct.

A young man named Bosanko had the misfortune this morning to fall from a scaffold while painting at the Goodrich place near Chemawa. He dropped about thirteen feet and crushed the right ankle in such a manner as to produce a most serious wound. Mr. Bosanko was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital and is being given every comfort available.

Woman's Arm Broken.

Mr. and Mrs. John Mills, of Gervais, are in the city today, to secure expert medical treatment for Mrs. Mills' arm, which was broken Monday by a fall from a buggy. The buggy became uncoupled, and she was thrown out with such force as to break a bone. Mr. Mills is a well-known hop buyer.

Busy on the Farm.

Alex. LaFollette came up from his ranch today. The senator's whiskers are nearly a foot long, as he has not been in the city for weeks, but he reports prosperity a yard wide and all wool in the Mission Bottom country. Grain, hops, fruit and hay crops are all heavy and getting into good shape for market.

Gone to Albany.

The Oregon Railroad Commission has gone to Albany to hear both sides of the question of a new passenger depot, and the location thereof. The new depot is much needed, but where it shall be located, and whether it shall be a depot hotel or not are the matters to be decided. It looks to the outside public as if there will be a large union depot and a dining hall and lunch counter combined.

Board of Trade Meeting.

This evening at the rooms of the Salem Board of Trade that organization will hold its regular monthly meeting for the transaction of such business as may come before it. The subject of the cherry fair, and the future perpetuation and enlargement of that event will come in for discussion, and possible action. President Thielens proposes to bring up the subject of the adoption of a floral emblem for Salem, and the matter will also be brought up of holding a regular floral festa every year in connection with the cherry fair. All members of the board are asked to attend.

Gone to Corvallis.

The regents of the State Agricultural College are holding a meeting at the college today, when plans will

be adopted for the new shops and other improvements. The recommendations of President Kerr will come before the board.

Barber Dairy Ranch Sold.

The Barber dairy ranch, near Marion, was sold today to a man from Tennessee for \$12,000. The sale was arranged by Eli Vaughn, of Portland. It is one of the best milk farms in the county.

Vice-President Here.

Vice-President Fairbanks went through on the second section of the morning overland, bound south. There was no demonstration whatever, and no one went out to the train even to see the second highest official of the nation pass through the Capital City. He was not molested in any way, and some curious people tried to get a glimpse of him in his Pullman, where he rode in a plain-people style, without any decorations or trimmings. His reception at Portland was confined to the Press Club of that city, which had the good grace not to allow the president of the American senate to pass through the metropolis unheeded, unwept, unhonored and unsung.

After More Paint.

U. J. Lehman, manager of the Oregon Sienna Paint works, in this city, left today with a force of men to work the mine at Walker, Lane county. He will be away about a month and will ship in several cars of the pigment from which this famous Oregon paint is made. It is understood that it is going to be used on the new barns erected on the state fair grounds.

C. E. S. Wood, who is probably Oregon's most distinguished literary man, is in the city today to argue a case before the supreme court. He is a West Pointer, and one of the editors of the Pacific Monthly, and has a wide reputation for doing original writing that is of the rather picturesque class, to which men like Walt Whitman and Leo Tolstol belong.
