CHERRY AND ROSE FESTIVAL

Board of Trade Takes Steps to Make It An Annual Affair

A very active session of the Salem Board of Trade was held last evening at the rooms of the organization in the Murphy block. Foremost among the subjects considered was the cherry fair, and ways and means of perpetuating it as an annual event in our city. It was shown by President Thielsen that the cherry shows have added much to our prestige as a fruit center, and was pointed out that we cannot afford to let it die.

Frank Power, president of the Pacific Coast Nurserymen's Association, recited many evidences of the free advertising which the recent cherry fair gave our city, and it was the unanimous opinion of those present that it should be made permanent. As there is no permanent organization for that purpose, it was proposed that the Salem Board should take steps to preserve and enlarge the project. Upon motion a committee was appointed to draw up resolutions to be presented at some future meeting endorsing the cherry and floral idea, and pointing the way for its perpetuation. The committee is composed of President Thielsen, E. W. Hazard and Rev. Barr G. Lee.

President Thielsen took occasion to suggest that the time had come when Salem should adopt a floral emblem, and suggested the sweet pea as the most appropriate and practical. He felt that it would be an honor to have Salem known as the "Sweet Pea City," and mentioned many practical advantages to be derived therefrom.

The subject of having our fine fruits on sale at the passenger depot was brought up, and the executive committee of the board was authorized to take the necessary steps to have this brought about.

Secretary Polsel made a good financial showing, which indicates that there is over \$1000 in the treasury. The secretary was instructed to secure a suitable register for the board rooms, and the executive committee was authorized to expend about \$150 in foreign advertising. Much interest was manifested in the work of the board, and the meeting adjourned with the utmost good feelings and enthusiasm for the work of the organization.

Estate Eaten Up by Claims.

The estate of F. C. Baker is not likely to be a profitable heritage, according to the report of Margaret Baker, widow and executrix, filed with the county clerk this morning. She reports that the estate was worth \$32,998 and that she has in paying the claims on the estate disbursed \$39,125. The additional \$6126 needed was advanced by the executrix. The estate has yet to pay an inheritance tax to the state of \$1424. For her services as executrix, Mrs. Baker allowed herself \$3870. Among the bills paid were attorneys' fees amounting to probably ten per cent of the estate's value.

Murder at Portland.

While walking homeward along the Cornell road at a late hour Tuesday night Alexander Huber, a Swiss dairyman, 24 years of age, was shot and killed by an unknown assassin, supposedly an enemy with whom he had had an altercation. There was nothing to suggest robbery as the motive.

Huber had reached a lonely spot by the roadside as he walked towards his home. On the west side of the road there is a well-beaten path and near the path a shallow ditch. When the assassin fired from the darkness Huber tottered and fell into the ditch, where he lay prone upon his back.

The body was found there at an early hour in the morning, the wan light of coming dawn directing the attention of a chance passer-by to the stark features of a man staring steadily towards the sky. Henry Nagell, Huber's partner in the dairy ranch on the Cornell road, found the body. Nagell was making his regular morning trip to the city to deliver milk to his customers.

Matrimony Permit.

Carl Brand called at the county clerk's office this morning and made application for a matrimony permit. He asserted that Edward C. Truenback and Theresa Newhouse were over age, and that both were able and willing to get married, and he paid the necessary fee for the license. So be it.

SOME PILING.

Independence Shipment Would Make a Pole 1130 Miles Long.

Piling material from the Santiam timber section is to be shipped to California in wholesale quantities from Independence. Information concerning these shipments is meagre, so far as to whom the parties are and the uses to which the piling is to be put is concerned, but it is known that probably 6,000,000 feet of piling for California is to be loaded here.

The piling is to be brought down the Santiam and the Willamette to Independence, and here loaded on the cars for shipment south. The initial drive was to arrive today, and presumably will be loaded at once. Work is being done on the spur to the river, preparing it for the heavy loads to be taken to the main track. E. Russell, a representative of the California purchasing agents, was in the city last week making arrangements for the shipments. The piling is such length that three ordinary 30-foot freight cars are necessary to receive them, or many of them at least.

Goes to Fall City.

Miss Laurella Holmstrom, who graduated in the last class of trained nurses from the Salem hospital, has accepted a position as head nurse of the Falls City hospital, leaving this morning for the scene of her future labors. The hospital at Falls City is to be congratulated on securing Miss Holmstrom's services, for, besides a thorough understanding of her profession, she is remarkably tactful, of a bright and cheerful disposition that makes a patient forget pains and worries, and take his medicine "cheerfully, just as the doctor ordered it," when she presents the spoon.

MAKES DARING DESCENT

New York, July 18.—Members of an employees' beneficial association who engaged Balloonist W. A. Meeker to make an ascent and parachute drop at a Halam picnic, this evening, got more than their money's worth. Meeker not only went up 2000 feet, but when his parachute attachment failed to work, he jabbed holes in the hot-air bag, and made a descent that startled the spectators. Missing a ducking by good luck, the balloonist made a flying leap and landed himself on the Willis avenue bridge pier unharmed.

The hitch in the parachute was due to tangled ropes, and when Meeker, who had been seated on a swinging bar, suddenly began to scramble up a rope until he reached the gas bag, the people below thought it a part of the performance, and cheered. A moment later the aerial artist had pierced a half dozen holes in the bag, which shot toward the earth. As it dropped it swayed back and forth, and Meeker, who had left his seat on the bar, was seen to hold his seat with difficulty. When about 50 feet above the river, the balloon halted, swung a few yards above the bridge over the roadway, and Meeker jumped, landing safely on the structure.

Harriman Is Satisfied.

New York, July 18.—The directors of the Illinois Central Railroad Company today declared a regular semi-annual dividend of 3 1/2 per cent. It was said that the election of a director to succeed John C. Welling was postponed until July 25. E. H. Harriman was asked if there had been any break between himself and President Harahan.

"No. Why should there be? It is too ridiculous to talk about," was his reply.

Mr. Harriman was asked whether the successor to Mr. Welling on the board would be a representative of Mr. Fish or himself, to which he replied:

"I have nothing to say about that."

Stuyvesant Fish, former president of the company, attended the meeting.

Wife and Money Returned.

Roseburg, Or., July 18.—The first chapter in the interrupted elopement of Mrs. Williams of Looking Glass, and S. Vickers, who was arrested at Cottage Grove last week on a charge of larceny, was ended today when Mrs. Williams appeared before District Attorney Brown and returned to him \$15 of the money Vickers stole, stating that he had given the money to her to deliver to Mr. Smith, from whom it was taken, and that she was returning to her husband at Looking Glass. As Mr. Williams refuses to prosecute Vickers on a charge of illegal relations, Vickers will be released. Smith claims that there is yet \$1.65 of the stolen money to be accounted for, and will not consent to the release of Vickers until that amount is returned.

Some Good in Socialism.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 18.—Boston was selected today for the next convention of the American Federation of Catholic societies. Resolutions were adopted recommending the encouragement of parochial schools and a Catholic daily press; reaffirming the declaration of last year on divorce; postponing action on a Catholic Y. M. C. A. until next year, and, while denouncing Socialistic principles, admitting that some of the demands of Socialists are right, but are the same objects for which Christianity has long striven.

Edward Feeney, of Brooklyn, N. Y., was elected president; H. J. Falk, Atchison, Kansas, marshal, and T. B. Minnehan, Seattle, Wash., a member of the executive board.

Japan Trade Getting Heavy.

Victoria, B. C., July 18.—The Nippon Yusen Kaisha Company has chartered the Moyore Maru, 3264 tons gross tonnage, and will add her to the fleet operating between the Orient and British Columbia and Seattle. Owing to the heavy demand made on the freight space between Japan and Victoria it has become absolutely necessary for more vessels to carry the goods, and the Nippon Yusen Kaisha Company has been the first to take steps to prevent an overplus of freight. The Moyore Maru, which has been chartered from the Japanese naval department is one of the vessels seized during the Russo-Japanese war for carrying contraband of war.

MAGILLS GO BACK FOR TRIAL

San Diego, Cal., July 18.—Shirley Campbell is expected to arrive here after noon or this evening to meet Frederick Magill and bride party. Clinton, Illinois, to stand trial on charge of murdering the former wife. It is expected that the bride will leave on the return trip tonight. Margaret, Magill's daughter, is domiciled at the home of the Magills' counsel. The accused are more anxious than ever to meet their accusers.

A Bride's Dilemma.

A humorous romance is reported from Natal, where a youthful bride was recently called upon to choose between her husband and her jewels. The case came before Durban police court in the first instance, where the bride's parents says the Natal Mercury, accused her husband of abducting her while under thirteen years of age. The bride, however, claimed to be eighteen, and the magistrate dismissed the case. Outside the court a tug of war was in place between the two parties as to the possession of the bride, in the course of which it appeared that what her parents particularly desired was not herself, but her jewelry. A sergeant of police then sat in judgment and decided that the jewels belonged to the parents, and the girl must choose between her husband and her bacelets. After some cogitation she chose the husband, and promptly unfastened the bangle from her arms and handed them to her parents.
