

Death Rides With The Merry Crowd

Railroad Wreck Turns Light Jest and Merry Laughter to Wailing and Sorrow

Detroit, Mich., July 20.—It is reported 40 were killed and many injured at 10 o'clock this morning in a wreck on the Pierre Marquette road. Between Ionia and Detroit when a special excursion train and a freight collided. The latest reports say 30 bodies have been taken from the wreckage. Doctors and nurses have left Detroit for the scene in a special train. The excursion had ten coaches and met a freight head on.

Of 55 injured many will die. Five of the coaches are not damaged, the rest were smashed to tinder, both engines and three freight cars are buried in the ruins.

Plymouth, Mich., July 29.—A man from the wreck his hands and clothes blood stained has arrived here with a terrible story. "I cut out fourteen bodies, mangled

beyond description," he said, "and helped to pile up arms and legs until I feared I would go mad. I saw persons dragged from the wreck and die in the sun crying for water and relatives, while their shrieks filled the air. I saw one woman her dress dragging in blood and her face covered with it, completely mad crawling over and under the wreck looking for her baby. Men and women fell over in a faint, exhausted by the vain search for relatives and friends and lay in the hot sun as if dead."

Detroit, Mich., July 20.—It transpires that a wrecking and relief train was made up in the union depot and dispatched to the scene some minutes before the wreck actually occurred. Officials say the collision was inevitable. They summoned doctors and nurses and the wrecking crew and sent them on a special train without waiting for the collision.

Detroit, July 20.—An official dispatch to the Pierre Marquette officials received at noon, gives the number dead as 22 and injured 65, but says more are in the wreck.

Salem, Mich., July 20.—The wreck occurred near here. Twelve coaches, crowded with employees of the Pierre Marquette were on an outing. The first intimation of danger was a quick churning, rasping sound, gushes of steam and scores lying in scalding water in the wreckage. The known dead are Charles McCauley, foreman of the blacksmith shops; Jim Vissard, Need Gallagher, a high school student fatally injured. Mrs. Alma Fulkner and William Beals. The freight train was supposed to make the siding and wait for the excursion train to pass at Salem. The freight was not there and the excursion train thundered through meeting the freight coming. The excursion was not supposed to make a stop between Ionia and Detroit.

Eight hundred employees of the road's and of the lone shops and their families were on the train which was crowded to the platforms. It is reported that 35 bodies have been taken from the wreck so far, but there are more in it. Ray Jacobs, fireman of the special was killed, and Engineer Alvord and Conductor Pixley injured.

Additional dead identified are Herman Hoss and sons, Paul and Charles; L. K. Merrill, Photographer Alber Trautwine, Conductor Pixley, John Tafel, Henry Reynolds, Willie Grams, Homer Smith, F. F. Fitzgerald, Jos. Brown, John Rogers, A. M. Corbert, Mrs. August Vico, Mrs. Abe Keley. The freight crew is blamed for having ignored orders.

Will Make Him Fight.

Carlsruhe, Germany, July 20.—Attorney Dietz has challenged Prosecutor Bleicher to a duel because of alleged insults heaped upon Dietz by the prosecutor during the Hau trial. Dietz seconds today called at Bleicher's residence with a challenge but were denied admittance. Dietz issued a statement that he will force Bleicher to fight or proclaim him a coward throughout Germany. He will send a challenge through the mail and says the prosecutor must fight or "welah."

HAWLEY EARNS HIS MONEY.

Has Faith in Orchard and Roasts the Federation.

Boise, July 20.—Taking up the attempts to kill Gabbard and Goddard as testified by Orchard, Hawley went deeply into the question of motive. "Who would want these men out of the way, who would benefit if they were killed? I tell you it would be the Western Federation and no one else. They plotted these crimes. This man Haywood advocated and endorsed them every day, and now he would evade responsibility by endeavoring to cause doubt of Orchard's narrative. You look at the entire matter and you will know at once how, and why the bombs were planted. It was to terrorize the state administration and the judiciary to compel them to work with these so-called labor leaders." Hawley was still talking when recess ordered.

ADMITS HE HAD NO EVIDENCE

MAGILLS SET FREE

Prosecuting Attorney Says He Was Moved to Have Magill Arrested By Irresponsible Gossipers and Yellow Newspaper Stories

Clinton, Ill., July 20.—State's Attorney Miller today admits he had no evidence against either Fred Magill or his bride, who were arrested upon Miller's presentation of charges in connection with the suicide of Magill's first wife. Miller is on the verge of collapse as the result of the indignation of citizens over Magill's arrest at San Diego. Miller will at once wire Sheriff Campbell, who went to California to bring back the Magill's, to release them. Miller blames the gossiping here and newspapers for the action he took in causing the arrests. Public opinion as specifically stated in the United Press dispatches from here, always declared there was no chance of convicting the banker.

TELEGRAPH STRIKE IS SETTLED

New York, July 20.—Secretary McInerney of the local union said today the settlement of the strike is satisfactory to the operators. Vice President Adams, of the Postal company, declares the company granted nothing simply agreeing to take the men back at the request of Neill. He says absolutely there is no agreement regarding arbitration, so far as the company is concerned.

HE PLAYED TAG.

And Everybody He Ran Against Tagged Him.

New York, July 20.—Adorned with a motley array of tags, which were pinned on his coat, shirt and trousers in many cities on the route from far-off Minsk, Russia, to this city, 7-year-old Benjamin Meyerson, is quartered in the Hebrew Home for Immigrants in this city. He is bound for Omaha, where his parents, who left Russia some years ago, now live.

The boy remained with his uncle until recently, when his parents sent for him, and he was started alone on what probably has been the most remarkable journey ever taken by a child of his age.

Benjamin's uncle tagged him so that the railroad men might know where to ship the human freight. He also pinned to the boy's coat a request that wherever the wee journeyer stopped he should be bathed. The child has been scrubbed in a score of cities.

At each point where the boy changed cars he was retagged, until, when he arrived a few days ago on the Eturia, he looked like a misshapen trunk that had gone through the grand tour.

STRIKERS RIOT IN DETROIT

Detroit, July 20.—Five thousand strike sympathizers this morning attacked a hundred strike breakers on their way to work at the Great Lakes engineering works, precipitating a wild riot. The strike breakers fired wounding one striker. Policeman Wandrie was badly beaten. There were 25 arrests.

MAKES STRONG POINT

Carlsruhe, Germany, July 20.—Attorney Dietz for Hau charged with murdering his mother-in-law, created a sensation in court today by declaring his trial is an organized conspiracy to convict the professor on insufficient circumstantial evidence. That the court prosecutor and witnesses have shown the strongest animus against the defendant. He raised a strong point by declaring that Wieland, the valet in the Moller home, who disappeared on the day of the murder should be found and examined before the trial proceeds.

Guilty of Land Fraud.

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 20.—In the United States district court yesterday F. M. Holbrook, a millionaire; E. E. Lonabaugh, a prominent attorney, and Robert McPhillamey, a well-known business man of Sheridan, were found guilty of conspiracy to defraud the United States government of coal lands in Sheridan county.

The maximum penalty on each of two counts on which the men were tried is two years in the penitentiary and a fine of \$10,000.

Judge Riner announced that he would impose sentences in a few days.

Roads Tied Up.

Denver, July 20.—All freight trains on the Colorado Southern are tied up owing to a strike of switchmen and men who want an increase of pay. High officials of the road are handling passenger traffic.

SERIOUS SITUATION IN SEOUL

Tokio, July 20. Afternoon.—Reports from Seoul state that four machine guns are now at the Tai Hau gate. Should the Korean soldiers repeat yesterday's behavior by firing on the Japanese police, the Japanese troops will not hesitate to retaliate.

Seoul, Corea, July 19.—A company of Korean troops mutined an hour ago, escaped from the barracks without its officers and attacked a police station on the main street at the Great Bell. After firing several volleys, the soldiers scattered, continuing a desultory firing and attacking individual Japanese. They were joined by the populace, who used stones and clubs.

Two wounded Japanese have already reached the hospital in the Japanese quarter, where the Japanese are flocking for refuge. The correspondent of the Associated Press, while on the scene, noted seven Japanese and four Koreans dead, and three Japanese and two Koreans wounded.

General Hasegawa is sending dismounted cavalry to reinforce the police, who are now searching for the mutineers. The military have been ordered out.

While at the residency general an outbreak of the people was discredited, General Hasegawa's apprehension has been fulfilled in the emeute of the emperor's guards.

Troops Prevent Lynching.

Hahnville, La., July 20.—A hurry order for more troops to guard the Italian prisoners who were threatened with lynching was given last night by Major Wheat, in command of the militia here.

"Rush me troops. Expect trouble any minute."

There is a rumor here that a mob will attempt to reach this place from New Orleans, and this is believed to be the cause of Major Wheat's order.

Two companies of militia guard the jail, while nearly 100 men are picketed along the road and all approaches.

2 A. M.—A posse of about 100 armed men arrived here by train about 2 o'clock this morning, bent on lynching, but were dispersed by the militia without a conflict.

WAR BETWEEN THEM.

Senator Crane Plays Pussy-foot With the President.

Washington, July 20.—An open feud between President Roosevelt and Senator Winthrop Murray Crane of Massachusetts is believed to be imminent and, if it be waged with vigor, which is likely to be the case, the country will be treated to a highly interesting and diverting contest between now and the actual opening of the presidential campaign.

Mr. Crane, the softest treading pussy-foot in the upper branch of congress at this particular period, wants to be a big figure in the Republican national convention next year. The administration long has been possessed of this knowledge, and furthermore, has believed that the Crane influence would be baneful to the interests of the elements which want
