NEW YORK'S LATEST FASHIONS

New York, July 20.—The fine art of looking well is to wear good clothes and appear unimpaired of them. To be able to be unimpaired, one must feel that every part of one's costume is in good taste and becoming. Then, and then only, can a woman forget her appearance entirely. One idea to be borne in mind in choosing a summer costume is to secure a hat that will afford protection to the face. It is really more sensible to keep what complexion one has than to bother with pastes and washes and beautifiers after the short summer is over and a tanned face no longer fashionable. The absurdly small and tilted hats worn early this summer are useless for protecting the face. The sailor is still a favorite with sensible women and is now being made in lighter and daintier straws than heretofore. While it continues to be trimmed simply, with band and bow, it is brought up to date by a bandeau covered with ribbon bows, worn in the back under the rim. A shade hat made of rustic, soft green straws, and trimmed with wild flowers is most effective.

Rose color is always charming for little girls and this season is especially attractive in the linens and chambrays, both of which launder with perfect success and without loss of color. Especially pretty and durable is a soft finished French linen, with trimming of bands of white embroidery and worn with a belt of black patent leather. Simple as this style of little frock is, it can be treated in a number of ways and is susceptible of considerable variation. There is an accompanying gulmpet that can be worn beneath whenever desirable, and the dress itself can be made from a variety of materials. Piques, both white and colored, are being widely used for the little women this season and make charming dresses. All white is especially pretty and lovely for more dressy occasions, with the colored materials for harder usage.

Any pretty banding can be used as a finish, or if desirable, bands of the material can be embroidered or braided with linen soutache, this last being much in vogue at the present time. Again, the belt can be of the material, if desired. The waist and skirt portion should be cut in one and laid in the long box plaits that are so generally becoming, the belt holding the fulness in place.

A coat suit of wash material is a very useful addition to the summer wardrobe and is now very much in vogue, the very smartest dresses at the summer resorts having taken it up for wear upon suitable occasions. Many times a light wrap is needed, and an unlined linen jacket will be found most comfortable. If the suit is made of colored linen—pink and blue being the most popular shades—it is pretty to have a dainty waist of the same colored batiste. In a very pretty model being used very much just now the skirt is a plain circular cut with two stitched bands.

The very short coat has rolling collar and revers in one with a shaped ruffle over the sleeves. It is trimmed with crocheted buttons and white cord.

A shirt waist, well made of good materials and becomingly worn, is a thing of beauty and a joy for the summer, but the waists worn by a great many women might as well be bags. In the making of a shirt-waist each detail must be perfect to secure a good effect. A great deal of the beauty and comfort of a shirt-waist depends on the fit of the neck, and the neck measure should be taken, and the neck band on the waist should measure from end to end when finished, one and one-half inches more than the neck measure. In making the sleeve, the opening to which a link cuff is attached, when finished, should be half the length of the cuff; that is, the opening for a cuff ten inches wide should be five inches. If the material is striped or figured, the piece which is put on the top of the cuff should exactly match after it is attached. When a waist is too large or too small in the neck the alteration should be made in the shoulder seam. The seam is taken up equally on the front and on the back. In making the waist, the cuffs and neck bands should have an interlining of butchers' linen, which, with all material, should be shrunk before using, as two materials do not shrink alike. One thickness is sufficient for cuffs, and it should be attached to the outside half. The cuff is attached to the sleeve, having the seam come on the wrong side, then the edge of the under side is turned in and neatly basted, to be stitched on the machine. Stitch the cuff around the edge and around the bottom twice. If a stiff collar is worn with the waist, as is the proper mode this summer, even with lingerie waists, the neck when fastened should measure one-half inch less than the collar. If they are of the same size, the band pushes down below the collar, and in addition to giving a bad appearance, pinches the neck and is most uncomfortable to the wearer.

CATHERINE MANN-PAYZANT.

Gossip of the National Capital.

Washington, July 20.—Mrs. Justice Harlan is the leader in a new philanthropic movement which has for its object the erection of a summer home for cats, where the feline pets may spend the summer away from the heat of the cities and the uncertainties of summer resorts for humans. Plans are now being made by the women interested for the purchase of a large tract of land, in a convenient place, on which will be erected an edifice especially designed for boarding handsome, delicate and expensive cats belonging to persons who regularly leave the cities during the summer and who at present either have to take their pets on long journeys or leave them at home in the uncertain care of servants. Mrs. Harlan, who originated the idea, is herself the owner of three beautiful Maltese cats valued at \$1000 each.

Roosevelt a Populist?

If you do not remember United States William A. Peffer, you at least have not forgotten his whiskers. The bearded one was the representative of Kansas in the upper house of the national legislature at the time when Kansas was swept by hot winds, populism and grasshoppers. Asked as to what had become of the People's party, the ex-solon of the long hirsute appendage replied: "One of the 'Pops' is in the White House now."

According to Senator Peffer, who is now nearing 76, the Populists have been benevolently assimilated by the Republicans. The "cranky notions" we were taunted about have now come to be recognized as conservative principles and policies by both the larger parties," he declared. Senator Peffer retired from the senate, where he had been sent as the personal embodiment of bucolic unrest, a decade ago, and is now all but forgotten by the general public. At one time he was among the most noted men in the country and was universally regarded as the friend of the farmers of the country in their battle with the trusts and the combinations. He was the anointed one of the agriculturist, sent to scourge the money changers from the temple. Papers opposed to his political program used him as the daily butt of the jokesmiths. All of his personal peculiarities, especially his long and flowing whiskers, were magnified many fold and the great ability he undoubtedly possessed was minimized. When he was in the senate he was its most conspicuous figure; when he dropped out, it was without even the tribute of a dull thud. For some time past he has been in Washington, engaged in the preparation of an index of the proceedings of congress since the beginning of the government, a work which will be of incalculable value. The task is now

nearing completion and the aged senator hopes to have the copy in the hands of the publisher by the last of the year.

Many of the former colleagues of Senator Peffer, both Democrats and Republicans, are firm friends of the former Populist and place a high estimate upon his ability often seeking his advice in legislative matters. "Without having changed his opinions one jot, Peffer would now be looked upon as a conservative if he were in the senate," said a prominent Republican recently.

A Subway De Luxe.

The smallest subway in the world is now being built in Washington and will be in operation within four or five months. The underground road will be less than one-third of a mile in length and will connect the capitol building with the house of representatives office building. Two wide walks are being built in the subway, which will also contain a narrow gauge electric line on which cars of a miniature pattern will be operated at frequent intervals while congress is in session. The object of this underground railway is to obviate the difficulty encountered by congressmen in going from their offices to the capitol. It is now necessary to cross a wide street in the capitol park, and this is always thronged with carriages and automobiles. As a result, it sometimes requires twenty or more minutes for the legislators, few of whom are very spry, to get from office to capitol.

Reform Customs Service.

To make the customs service less unpopular is the slogan of Secretary Cortelyou in regard to the reforms now being made in the regulations governing the admission of foreign goods to the United States. While the precautions against smuggling will be as stringent as heretofore, the rules have been changed so that personal baggage may be searched with the least possible friction and inconvenience to the incoming passenger. Matters will hereafter be so arranged that the various delays which are so exasperating to the traveling public will be abolished. Uniform courtesy will hereafter be demanded of every customs officer—a requirement that is not new but that has been very sparingly observed.

Trust Magnate to Wed.

New York, July 20.—According to reports received here James B. Duke, president of the "tobacco trust," now being probed by the government, will be married next week in Europe. The prospective bride is Mrs. William Inman, a beautiful society woman of Atlanta, to whom the nicotine king has been attentive for many months. The honeymoon, it is said, will be spent in a tour of Europe in a big Mercedes touring car which Duke recently presented to Mrs. Inman, and which is reported to have cost \$20,000.

Mrs. Inman is one of Dixie's most famous women. As Natalie Holt, of Macon, Ga., she was admittedly the most beautiful woman of Georgia. Her charms captivated William Inman, a wealthy cotton man of Atlanta, and they were married. Inman died three years ago and soon afterward his widow began the social career that has made her a well known character in the society of New York and Washington, as well as in the south, and will shortly culminate in the complete conquest of one of America's richest men.

Duke's previous marital experience was marked by sensations. His wife was Mrs. Lillian N. McCreedy, a New York widow who had secured a divorce especially to marry Duke, and who was in turn divorced by him. Frank I. Huntoon, a well known New York clubman, was named as co-respondent in Duke's suit for divorce, and the testimony adduced at the trial created a sensation in New York social circles.

Given a New Backbone.

New York, July 20.—Anyone needing a new backbone is referred to the surgeons of the city hospital on Blackwell's island, who will in a few weeks discharge as cured a patient who was subjected to the most remarkable operation on record.

Alexander Adrehi will leave the hospital with a new backbone, replacing a missing portion of spinal column that was shot away over four years ago, during a street fight in Brooklyn.

Since May, 1903, Adrehi has occupied a bed in the hospital, which he is now almost able to leave. The bullet which struck him almost severed the spinal cord and shattered the tenth and eleventh vertebrae. Physicians immediately pronounced the case hopeless—all but Dr. George R. Fowler, who died about a year ago. He decided to operate and performed a feat with surgical instruments that has seldom been surpassed. The spinal cord was laid bare, the bullet removed and strips of oiled silk introduced to mend the membranes.

This operation was performed May 9, 1903. Since then the injured man has received almost constant attention from the surgeons, the treatment of his case having already cost the city over \$5000.

First Salmon Run of Year.

Astoria, July 20.—The first real run of salmon that has reached the Columbia river this year is now being caught, and while it does not block the canneries by any means, it is keeping them busy to handle the morning's deliveries. The fish are large in size, averaging 25 pounds, and appear more like a June run than a July one, as there are very few of what are recognized as July fish among them. The boats that fished at the mouth of the river last night averaged from 400 to 1000 pounds, and the traps in Baker's Bay, as well as the lower river seines, did well. As the pack to date has been far behind, this run helps considerably, but there is no actual assurance that it will continue.
