WEEKLY FINANCIAL REVIEW

J. D. Baker & Co. Comment On the Money and Market Conditions

If ever it were needed to prove high generalship for the Union Pacific, it would do but to point to the financing of the company's bond issue just closed. To have had this successfully underwritten, and over-subscribed in the underwriting, months ago was a bit of far-sighted management, which has its fruition now, with the public subscription falling flat, and making not the least difference to the railroad because it has its money. Nevertheless, the public failure to subscribe has had its effect, and the week has been one of fluctuating sentiment, mostly gloomy. The Atchison 5 per cent bonds showed a like lack of participation, \$8,000,000 or \$9,000,000 of the \$26,000,000 having been taken, with no friendly underwriting to swallow the untaken portion. It certainly should not be difficult to dispose gradually of these bonds at par, convertible as they are into stock, and one of the most attractive investments offered today. For those who wish well assured principal, a good, round 5 per cent per annum, and a chance to take advantage speculatively of their faith in the country and its ultimate emergence from the clouds of the present, these with their feature of convertibility into the common stock of a great railroad with great prospects, afford splendid opportunity.

A Smoky Week.

The other pessimistic features of the week were some further export of gold, a rise in call rates, and kaleidoscopic manipulation of Japanese and American Jingo news. As if this were not enough, a fresh outburst from Washington, threatening receivership for the tobacco trust, fell with a sickening thud on the benumbed body of the patient. Constant whacking, however, has made opinion almost insensible and this startling bit of news, which two years ago would have caused an explosion, simply made the situation more smoky.

London and America.

We said last week that by reason of leading authorities boldly declaring it, the cause of our decline was beginning to be admitted, and the blame placed where it belonged, on the Roosevelt attacks; even the Evening Post London correspondent reluctantly admits that it is the anti-trust campaign that is putting down London prices of Americans this week. One does not hear now the refuting argument that securities all over the world are depressed. The American condition is still affecting the whole world as it began to affect it first during our March panic. The writer was in London then, and the funeral fog that hung over Throgmorton street had no other source than the situation on this side. Nothing was thought of but Americans, and it must be borne in mind that at that time foreign securities had not begun to decline. It was the American fall that pulled down the world. Nations are too close together in these latter days to be independent of each other. It was the

Baring crisis in 1890 that depressed finally every money center the world over.

Export of Gold.

The foreign bank situation still continues reduced as to reserves, the Banks of England and France both showing lower than a year ago, and each straining for a recovery of gold. The movement of export which we are watching with such interest, and doing nothing artificially to offset, will probably have much effect upon our situation later when the fall squeeze begins. It may be easily presumed that these two banks will not be such easy aids to our own cramped conditions two months later. In other words, we doubt whether they will permit the re-import of this same gold which is going out now, when we attempt to bring it back late in August and September. Last year, it will be remembered, when our far-sighted Shaw produced the mechanical condition by which we were enabled to bring over gold artificially, notwithstanding that the real conditions of interest rate and supply of money abroad did not warrant it, the foreign banks stood idly by until one day the Bank of England waked to the fact that gold was scarce the world over, and that England's trade was being drastically affected. Then the bank put up the rate one and two per cent threatening three, to stop the outflow, and found that, too late, this had been done, and all England suffered for many months after.

Will England Stop Re-imports?

This year it is to be presumed that the Old Lady of Threadneedle street will not be caught napping, and if, and when, Cortelyou tries the Shaw tactics of paying interest in transit, the Bank of England's rate may quickly rise prohibitively, forbidding. We shall begin to be then in the throes of our yearly money stomach-ache, and what medicine shall relieve us?

America's Waste of Gold.

And this brings us to a consideration of the outrageous waste of gold reserve in America, through our superannuated, vicious currency system. There is gold money enough being carried around in the pockets of our people uselessly, in the shape of warehouse receipts, to make reserves easy around the world. Those \$20 yellow-backs, every man who carries a roll flashes on you when he opens it, represent a wicked waste of the basis of prosperity. It is as if a man recklessly poisoned millions of bushels of grain in warehouses, when thousands of people were dying of starvation. And yet with this condition prevailing, we have a President who could, if he would, put through the reform bills in short order, and make a greater record in history for his administration than can possibly be obtained otherwise. Railroad reform is a very little subject as against currency reform, through the lack of which the country is losing millions yearly, and foolishly defying disaster.

Light in the Sky.

All these are serious considerations, and the horizon line is not yet clear enough for much optimism. Nevertheless, that the situation is clearing there is no doubt, and the calm way in which much that is depressing is met, gives good evidence that probably the worst has been encountered as far as securities are concerned, barring always the dangers of this fall's money market. Complete recovery, however, and high prices seem still a great way off. Meantime, the security market furnishes a most attractive field for the investor, and preferred stocks, convertible bonds, short and long notes, and even some common stocks, make up a wealth of selections, any of which, if purchased, are sure to produce great results for the investor who will hold them.

BOGUS LORD NEARS END ON GALLOWES

Has Had a Strenuous Life But Is to Die Next Thursday

St. Louis, July 20.—Unless Governor Folk should decide to commute his sentence at the last moment, "Lord" Frederick Augustus Seymour Barrington, convicted of the murder of James P. McCann, will be hanged by the neck until dead in the jail yard at Clayton, St. Louis county, next Thursday. Many times before death has pointed its grisly finger at the English adventurer, only to pass him by when the fatal moment was near at hand. Now it appears that the law's delay is at an end. Still declaring his innocence and confidence in ultimate acquittal, Barrington has not yet begun preparations to meet the worst.

"Lord" Barrington came to St. Louis while the exposition was being built and announced himself as a representative of King Edward and the British government. He was received with great ceremony and wine and dined by the officials of the fair and the social leaders of the city. One of the most polished and apparently refined of unhung rogues, Barrington wooed and won Miss Grace Wilhelmina Cochrane, the daughter of a well-to-do Kansas City packer. The roseate pictures he drew of life in Brighton castle enraptured the unsuspecting young woman and the result was the hasty marriage. Barrington's action soon aroused the suspicions of a brother of the bride and investigations were instituted that soon resulted in laying bare the record of the bogus nobleman.

Kicked into the street by the irate brother, Barrington was arrested as a pauper and a disturber of the public peace and sentenced to six months in the workhouse. In a single day he fell from his proud estate as a lordly representative of the British king to a common "hobo" and brawler.

In his bitterest hour, however, he was not without friends who admired his "nerve" and considered the manner in which he had imposed upon the social elite of the city as a hilarious joke. One of these was the proprietor of a St. Louis saloon, who paid Barrington's fine and installed him behind the bar of his refreshment dispensary. It was at this time, while adding drink mixing to his list of accomplishments, that Barrington met James P. McCann, a millionaire turfman known among the sporting fraternity from one end of the country to the other. McCann introduced himself to the "lord" by handing him a \$50 bill. With this as a basis, the pair becomes fast friends and McCann installed Barrington as his private secretary. One night the two went forth on a hunting trip in St. Louis county. That was on June 13, 1903. Barrington came back alone and tried to take McCann's place in the dead man's home. Suspicion pointed toward the bogus "lord" as the slayer of his benefactor. He was tried, and while the evidence was wholly circumstantial, it did not require long for the jury to arrive at a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. Since that time Barrington, aided by influential friends and prominent attorneys has made a fight for life that has extended vainly to the supreme tribunal of the United States. Now only Governor Folk's clemency—and it is not thought he will exercise it—stand between Barrington and the gallows five days hence.

"Yes, the time is near at hand," said Barrington in his little cell at the Clayton jail, "but I am confident that I will yet be acquitted of this crime of which I am absolutely guiltless before God and man. If I should die on the gallows, it will be because of powerful enemies who have sought my ruin and who have hounded and persecuted me for many years. If I must, I will meet death bravely. I have already suffered too much to fear the grim destroyer. The things I have been called upon to bear are too harrowing to describe. They are known only to me and to my God—the God of my faith and the star of my eternal hope who through all these years of intense grief and suffering has wonderfully sustained, encouraged and strengthened me. My hands are clean, my conscience clear, and I shall at least die as a true Christian and a British soldier should. I am prepared to meet without fear the source of all justice, the God of my parents, my childhood and my mature days."

Barrington has been exposed as a

natural crook. From the age of 10 to 40 he was not out of prison an entire year at a time. George Frederick Barrington is his real name, and he was born at Turnbridge Wells, England. His first sentence was five years for embezzlement. Robbing benefactors seems to have been the principal occupation of the man's life. Of an engaging and polished manner, he made many friends and these he always robbed and defrauded. He first came to America as Sir Frederick Sydenham Burgoyne, and married Celeste E. Miller, a wealthy Brooklyn woman. After gaining possession of all her property he deserted her. In Philadelphia, latter, he married another woman of wealth and family, whom he deserted in Cincinnati on their honeymoon trip.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street in the City of Salem, Oregon.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, Broadway street in said city from a point 518 feet south of the center line of Belmont street, northerly to the center line of Norway street in said city, except a strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of Broadway street now occupied by the track of the Oregon Electric Co., with full intersections in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading the roadway of said portion of said street full width except a said strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of said street, with full intersections to the proper sub-grade, and by thoroughly rolling the sub-grade of said street and by placing thereon crushed rock in layers to the depth of eight inches, and by thoroughly rolling said crushed rock.

Also by constructing wooden curbs along both sides of said portion of said street.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, and the plans, specifications and estimates for the doing of said work heretofore adopted by the common council of said city and now on file in the office of the recorder of said city, to which said plans, specifications and estimates the attention of all persons interested in said improvement is hereby called.
