A. J. MINNICK SHOT WHILE HUNTING

Friends in this city were shocked to learn last night of the accidental shooting of A. J. Minnick of this city who was employed in the sawmill established by his brother-in-law, Col. L. K. Page of this city, at Drain, where Minnick was regularly employed. He went out on a deer hunting trip with Scott and Addison Page of this city, and as nearly as can be learned the accident occurred Friday morning about 8:30. Minnick had dropped behind the boys a little ways, when they heard his rifle ring out, and on investigating they found his dead body, with a bullet hole through the head, the bullet entering below the point of the left cheek bone and coming out at the back of the head. They packed the remains 16 miles to Drain and the remains were shipped to Salem for interment, arriving on the morning overland, and taken to the Rigdon undertaking rooms. Mr. Minnick was a brother of the former Mrs. Page, who died in Iowa. He was a bachelor, and a man who was very well liked. His death is believed to have been entirely accidental. The funeral will be held Monday at 2 p. m. Col Page and wife are on a trip to the Klamath Falls country, and will not be here in time for the funeral.

BIG HOP TRANSACTION.

I. L. Bower Sells His Last Year's Crop of Hops at a Great Sacrifice.

One of the largest transactions in hops that has been made in Silvertown for several months was consummated Monday evening when I. L. Bower sold his entire lot of 1906 hops to T. A. Livesley & Co., of Salem. The lot consisted of 130 bales and the price received is too low to mention. Mr. Bower held the crop over hoping to receive a better price, but as there is not much reason to hope for an increase at the present time he disposed of them Monday for what they would bring. From all appearances it was a great sacrifice. He was offered much more several months ago. At this rate of sale there is not much encouragement for hop growers, and unless better prices prevail this fall there will be fewer hops raised in Oregon next year. The transaction Monday was a losing deal for Mr. Bower.

Little has been done in the hop market during the past few months on account of the low price and it is doubtful if there will be many hops moving between now and the time for harvesting the new crop unless the price takes a turn for the better.—Silvertown Appeal.

SICK CHILD DENIED ICE.

Limit to Which Heartless Corporation Can Go.

Seattle, Wash., July 20.—Because she did not have \$5 with which to buy tickets for the purchase of ice, a woman, a stranger in the city, was denied ice by the local member of the Seattle ice trust today with which to cool the fevered brow of her infant. The attending physician had ordered ice liberally applied to the sick child's head and when the woman hailed an iceman and asked for a dime's worth of ice, she was told she could only buy through the medium of a book of tickets costing \$5. She only had \$1 on being left here, awaiting the coming of her husband, and she had to deny herself the purchase. Then she went to a grocer and later to a meat market and there met with a refusal of ice, as they told her that they would be blacklisted if they sold or gave any away. The woman, who occupies a cheap lodging-house on Seventh avenue, refused to give her name. The several commercial bodies have been notified and, unofficially, they declare a prosecution of the ice combine will be made.

Funeral of Mrs. Meyers.

The funeral service over the remains of Mrs. Meyers, late wife of the well known Salem merchant, was held at the family residence, Rev. P. S. Knight of the Congregational church conducting a brief but very appropriate and impressive ceremony. The service at the cemetery was private and attended only by the family and relatives of deceased. The speaker delivered a beautiful eulogy of the departed, from the golden text: "Well done, good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joys of thy Lord." This text fully expressed the tribute due to Mrs. Meyers. All real life was service of others, and in her quiet and unpretentious life was rounded up the full measure of service from a wife and mother to those she loved. Such an one could not be estimated, such a life could not be measured with words. Only in the hearts of those nearest and dearest was that estimate and that measurement possible to be taken rightly.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful, and expressed the high regard in which Mrs. Meyers was held by her friends.

Run Over by Hay Rake.

While working in the hay field on his farm near Brownsville last Saturday afternoon, Fred Smith, a prominent resident of that section, was run over by a team of horses which were pulling a rake. The teeth of the rake caught Smith and he was dragged a considerable distance. When found, Smith was unconscious. His head was terribly lacerated by the teeth of the rake, and there were other severe injuries on the man's body. For over twenty-four hours Mr. Smith was in an unconscious condition. He is yet irrational as a result of his injuries. There are hopes of his recovery.—Lebanon Criterion.
