MARRIED FIFTY-FIVE YEARS.

Eighty Children, Grand and Great Grandchildren.

An unusual event occurred yesterday at the home of "Uncle Dock" Humphreys, in the Waldo Hills, east of Macleay. It was the 55th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Humphreys, and nearly 100 relatives and friends were gathered together to do honor to the veteran couple. An unusually good time was had, and a magnificent picnic dinner was spread under the trees for the gathered guests. Mr. and Mrs. Trover, of this city, were sent for to take several group pictures of the party, and of relatives who, including the children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, numbered just 80. It is needless to state that all present enjoyed the rare event to the fullest, and it was conceded to be one of the greatest social events ever held in Marion county.

Suicide at the Asylum.

Elmer I. Webb, aged 29 years, an inmate of the asylum, sent from Baker county, hanged himself in his room some time this morning, presumably about 2:30. Another inmate in the same room called the night watch, who discovered the body about 3 o'clock. The deed had been done deliberately, the suicide twisting the sheet from the bed, which he fastened to the top of the bedstead, tying the end around his neck, and lying down so that strangulation caused his death. Coroner Clough examined the body, and decided that no inquest was necessary. The body will be shipped to relatives in Baker City.

To Collect Note.
