MAKING STRONG DEFENSE

HAYWOOD CASE

Richardson Makes Strong Defense and Accuses Owners of Plotting Against Federation Leaders

Salem, July 23.—The impeachment of the testimony of Orchard was the chief argument this morning. Richardson, who continued his defense for the defense. NIGHT RIDERS' CRIME.

Wound Farmer and Accidentally Blind His Wife.

Hopkinsville, Ky., July 23.—A hundred night riders surrounded the home of Stephen Moseley, a farmer, at 2 o'clock this morning, and riddled the house with bullets. Moseley was shot in the face, ear and hand, and his wife's eye was pierced with a wire from the screen door shot out by bullets. They fired 100 shots. The riders carried Moseley from his house, and warned him to quit talking. Moseley has been a strong anti-tobacco association man.

HANGED SIX AND HERSELF

Copenhagen, July 23.—Mrs. Nelson, driven to distraction by the loss of her position as housekeeper for a land owner named Ulrikjar, sought revenge today by hanging Ulrikjar's three children, then killed her own three children and hanged herself.

Injured by Defective Walk.

Mrs. Fannie Neckerman has commenced an action against the city of Salem, asking for \$100 damages, which are alleged to have been sustained by her last April from a fall caused by a defective sidewalk, along the Willamette University campus.

Mrs. Neckerman some months ago presented her claim to the city council for \$150, which was rejected, as it was alleged that the University trustees had agreed to pay all damages resulting from defective sidewalks from the time the board was torn up until the cement was down. In bringing suit against the city it was necessary to reduce the amount to \$100, as this is the maximum amount which can be obtained as damages under the Salem charter.

Wind Blows Mother and Babe 100 Yards.

Williston, N. D., July 23.—A terrific wind, hail and rain storm Sunday night destroyed 15 dwelling houses, injured 25 people, two of them probably fatally, and did much other damage to property in this city and the surrounding country. Those believed to be fatally hurt are a man named Holmes and Mrs. Collinson. Mrs. Collinson and her babe were blown out of their house for a distance of about 100 yards, landing against a wire fence. Their house was entirely destroyed. Most of the houses demolished were in the suburb of Westlawn and were small structures. The court house, school house and Union block sustained considerable damage.

The Gun Exploded.

New London, Conn., July 23.—Private Hammond, of the 100th company of artillerymen, was killed and two members of Company K, Third Infantry, and a sergeant of the 100th company, were seriously injured when a six-inch gun exploded at Fort Terry today.

OUT OF THE JAWS OF DEATH

DEAD LESS THAN 100

Growing List of Survivors Brings Joy to Many Who Had Given Up Relatives as Dead—Probable All Living Are Now Accounted For

San Francisco, July 23.—Further details of the Columbia disaster are coming in slowly, owing to poor communications. Up to 10:30 this morning the total number of known survivors is 154. Of this number 139 were brought in by the Elder. The remaining 15 came in at midnight, having made a landing with a life raft near Shelter Cove. As far as known only one child has arrived. How many were drowned is problematical, as the steamship officials kept the record that is on the register. The Elder left for Portland today with a majority of the survivors.

A Boat Load Saved.

Eureka, Cal., July 23.—In the boat which landed at Shelter Cove last night were the bodies of Mrs. Lewis, of Pasadena; an unknown man, and the following survivors: B. R. Kriever, Prescott, Ia.; Jacob Kuro, Coldwater, Kans.; Armand, Cadrotte, New Bedford, Mass.; David Dosten, fireman, Columbia; Charles McCoy, oiler, Columbia; D. C. McAlpine, watchman, Columbia; Emil Mann, sailor, Columbia; Paul Hinner, quartermaster, Columbia; Mr. Lewis, Pasadena; Edwin Wallin, San Francisco; Mrs. Winkler, Poplar Bluff, Mo.; Mrs. W. H. Ingalls, Oakland; Blanche Mussar, Salt Lake; Ruby Cooper, Fayette, Mo.; Michael Redman, San Francisco; B. W. Graham, Portland.

Up to noon no additional bodies or survivors had been found.

With barely enough clothing to cover their bodies, 27 members of the crew of the Columbia and Mrs. Otille Leidel, of San Francisco, one of the few women survivors, arrived this morning on the steamer Pomona. All showed traces of their terrible experience. Mrs. Leidel was met at the wharf by two men. She wept bitterly as she stepped off the boat and walked with great difficulty, having been badly bruised in making her escape from the state room to the deck. John Smith, one of the firemen, came in with a broken arm. Smith was working in the fire room when the crash came, but succeeded in making his way up the companionway to the deck. The vessel was sinking rapidly, and Smith jumped into the ocean as the water began to pour over the deck. While going down he struck against the side of the vessel, breaking his arm. John Ross, another fireman, residing in San Francisco, also came down on the Pomona. He was the first man to get into the lifeboat. C. Robertson, a mess boy, also of this city, escaped by means of a life preserver.

Did Not Want Calhoun.

San Francisco, July 23.—The industrial peace conference opened this morning with a good attendance, harmony and optimism prevailing. It was noticed there was some unrest by the rumor that Calhoun would be invited to attend, but he was not present, the committee having been forced to refuse to invite him. Explaining his absence Secretary Caldwell said Calhoun's presence would have disturbed the conference, as some one would have got up and hurled invectives and asked, as Cicero did, "How long, Oh, Catalina, will you abuse our patience?"

ELEPHANT ATE THE DOUGH.

Chewed Up the Honeymoon Money at the Park.

New York, July 23.—Gunda, an elephant at the Bronx zoological park abruptly ended a country couple's honeymoon by chewing all their ready cash. The big animal collects cents daily from spectators and hoards them in a bank above his head.

James Hincheliffe and bride, who were just married at Pawling, N. Y., were standing before Gunda's cage, watching him collect pennies from the crowd, when it suddenly occurred to the bridegroom to see if pickpockets had tried to get his roll of bills. This roll was specially for the bridal trip and amounted to about \$250.

He pulled it out of his pocket, whereupon Gunda deftly grabbed the greenbacks with his trunk and stuck them into his mouth. The bride screamed and the bridegroom shouted at seeing the elephant placidly munching the money. The keepers rushed up and prodded the beast until he yielded the cash.

The money looked as though it had been through a corn sheller, only a single dollar being passable. The bride wept, but the bridegroom cheered her with the observation that the elephant had left them enough with which to return to Pawling. Theater parties, excursions on Lake Washington, trips about Seattle and a ball at Fortuna park have been arranged for the following week. The convention will probably adjourn July 31.

SHOOTS PRETTY WOMAN

BEATEN BY THE MOB

After Shooting the Woman Warner Then Shoots and Kills Another Friend Who Was in the Act of Opening Till to Loan Him Money

New York, July 23.—Eather Norling, aged 20, and very pretty, was shot and instantly killed this morning by a man supposed to be Charles S. Warner, her former employer, at Forty-second street and Broadway, during the rush hours. The girl was accompanied by R. A. Spicer, a clerk, and was entering a haberdasher's store, where she was employed, when a strange man rushed through the throng of pedestrians and killed her, creating a wild panic. While the crowd was throwing missiles at him he emptied his revolver at Spicer, finally knocking the latter down with the revolver. He then rushed into an office building, and the janitor locked the door, fearing a lynching. Meantime the murderer escaped down a fire escape and disappeared in the alley.

New York, July 23.—After escaping from the building Warner entered the store of John C. Wilson, of Waverly place, and fatally shot him. Warner was captured by the mob, which nearly killed him.

Warner asked Wilson, who is a haberdasher, for \$10. While Wilson turned his back to get the money, Warner shot him twice in the back. The two men were acquainted. Meantime the police were in an excited search for Miss Norling's slayer. Warner rushed from Wilson's store, followed by a howling mob. He was struck down by a longshoreman, and the crowd jumped on him, nearly causing his death. The police say there is no question but that the slayer of Miss Norling and Wilson's assailant are the same man. He was known to the woman as Charles and to Wilson as Frank Warner. Miss Norling had told her friends that Warner annoyed her.

THEY ALL TOOK BRIDES.

And Some of Them from Both Sides.

San Francisco, July 23.—Supervisors Coffey and Nicholas were the principal witnesses at this morning's session of the Glass trial. Coffey admitted taking bribes for voting the 85 cent gas rate and franchise to the Home Company, and to accepting \$5000 from Halsey to vote against the Home franchise. He said his conscience was clear, and testified that, although he was a good Catholic, he accepted the bribe from Halsey, after he knew the Home was to get the franchise. He told Ruef that Halsey gave him the money, and Ruef told him to keep it; that Halsey was a fool. Mrs. Thomas Lonergan, wife of the supervisor, also testified. She said her husband gave her \$4000 shortly before the Home franchise was granted.

SHOT HIS WIFE.

Idiotic Husband With a Gun Takes Wife for a Burglar.

Chicago, July 23.—Mistaking his wife for a burglar early this morning Joseph Laudenbauer shot and killed her in their home. Laudenbauer was roused by a noise, saw a form in the dark, reached for his revolver and fired.

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE.

William Stephens, Accidentally Shot, a Former Salemite.

William Stephens, who was accidentally shot at Portland Saturday night, was still unconscious this morning, and his condition is critical. Mr. Stephens was well known in this city, and especially at Hayesville, a few miles north of Salem, where many years of his life were spent, and where his aunts, Mrs. Madison Halbert and Mrs. J. Pruett, and his grandmother, Mrs. Stevens, still reside.

His parents at one time had charge of the Marion county poor farm, and were among the well-known pioneers of the county. Both are dead, however, having passed away near Oregon City about two years ago, at about the time that Addison Stevens, a brother of William, was accidentally drowned in the Willamette river at this point.

Mrs. Fred McIntire, who resides near Salem, is a sister to the wounded man, and was at his bedside yesterday, as were two of his brothers.

Officer Accuses Wife of Cruelty.

Something of a sensation has been caused in military circles by a divorce complaint quietly filed at St. Helens, Columbia county, a few days ago. The plaintiff is George N. Wolf, superintendent of prisoners for the Philippine Islands, and the domestic inharmonies culminating in the complaint are said to have begun in the tropics two or three years ago. The complaint is couched in terms of restraint, and Wolf charges his wife with cruelty, principally in having falsely accused him of gallantry towards other women. The plaintiff denies that he has broken his marital vows, and he makes no charges against Mrs. Wolf, save that of cruelty in being unduly suspicious and free with accusations against his honor.

While Wolf has spent the greater part of several years in the islands, attending to the duties of his office, he has never abandoned his residence in Oregon, and it is said the suit for divorce was brought at St. Helens for the purpose of avoiding notoriety, as far as possible.

Caused by the Auto.

Nicholas Simon, who lives in West Salem, was slightly hurt yesterday near Eola. He was driving along the road near the water trough, with a load of hay, when an automobile passing frightened his horses. One of the horses lunged so hard he broke the whippletree and also the lines, and skipped. The other horse, in trying to go, pulled the wagon into the ditch, upsetting it. Mr. Simon was caught under the hay, but was soon pulled out by Mr. Starr and others, who composed the automobile party. No serious damage was done, though Mr. Simon was badly bruised.

Redmen Meet at Newport.

The Albany Herald of Monday says: Many delegates passed through Albany this noon on their way to Newport to attend the grand council of the Redmen of Oregon, which begins its annual session at the coast resort tomorrow and continues throughout Wednesday. About 40 tribes from different parts of the state will be represented. Grand Sachem L. L. Jacobs, of Medford, who was in town this morning, said that during the past year the order had made great progress, and now numbered several thousands members. At the sessions in Newport the annual election of officers will be held.

A Singing Gallows Bird.
