Celebrating her ninety-second birthday at Newdigate, England, the good widow Roffey told her friends that in all her life she had used but 1000 hairpins and sixteen nets, the pride of all English women when it comes to arranging their coiffures. And in that same period the good woman read from a soiled diary, she had forty-one dresses, forty-seven petticoats, eighty pairs of shoes and fifty-three aprons.

As if those facts were not enough to make her hearers realize that economy may be practiced by the fair sex, the widow told them that she had used but 27 pairs of stockings, 107 pairs of garters, 34 shawls and wraps and 63 corsets. She never was extravagant in the matter of hats and bonnets, for of these she has purchased but 165 of both classes. With the exception of the latter, the good widow had made what she wore, utilizing her spare moments in the task.

The old woman has it jotted down in black and white that she has spent 67,160 hours in dressing and undressing, and that she has done up and taken down her hair 53,480 times. She has washed her face 67,067 times—her hands 123,424 times and her feet 2,208 times. She also figures that she has slept 302,220 hours of her life, drawn 33,584 buckets of water from the well in the backyard and manicured her nails 1656 times.

She has lived chiefly on bread, cheese and milk for the last twenty-five years, but she calculates that during her life time she has consumed 4784 fish, 11,960 loaves of bread, 50,730 potatoes, 19,136 cabbages, drunk 134,320 cups of tea, 67,160 glasses of milk and 33,580 glasses of water.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

ANCIENT TRADES UNION.

The Company of Pewterers, Which Was Composed of Masters Only.

Unlike the trades unions of today, the company of Pewterers of olden times was composed of the masters only, and disobedience of the rules was punished with a vigor far exceeding anything of the kind at the present day. The laws were made for the protection of the general public and not for the workman alone; consequently the articles turned out by a master pewterer and bearing his "touch" had to be up to a given standard of excellence. Before a man could set up as a master pewterer he was obliged to serve an apprenticeship of about six years, after which he had to produce his "essay" pieces under certain test conditions, and only after these pieces had been approved by the authorities of the craft was he allowed his freedom and permitted to register his private "touch" at the company's hall and set up as a master pewterer.

The company was not content merely to pass upon the work of a craftsman, but came very near regulating the minor details of his life. The penalty was very heavy for employing a helper who had not served a regular apprenticeship, and any master so daring as to employ a foreigner was fined £40, and all articles made by him were confiscated, the object being to keep the trade secrets from spreading.—Circle Magazine.

Game Laws West of Cascades.

Officers—The game warden has power to arrest or search without warrants.

License—All hunters (except persons on their own land) must have license and carry same while hunting. Resident, \$1; non-resident, \$10.

Trespass—It is unlawful for anyone to go upon the enclosed property of others without consent.

Beaver—Beaver must not be killed at any time.

Deer—Open season for bucks from July 15 to November 1; does, September 1 to November 1. Dogs prohibited at all times. Spotted fawn shall not be killed at any time. Each hunter is limited to five deer in a season.

Elk—Elk shall not be killed before September 15, 1907, open season one month.

Trout—April 1 to November 1, and is unlawful to take with seine, net, etc. Limit is 125 per day, all less than five inches must be returned to the water.

Pheasants, etc.—October 1 to December 1. Limit, ten birds per day.

Squirrels—October 1 to January 1.

Water fowls—Geese, swans, ducks, etc., September 1 to February 1. Limit, fifty birds per week. No hunting one hour after sundown or half hour before sunrise.

Sale prohibited—It is unlawful to sell or ship out of the state for sale any of the above mentioned game.
