## May Transfer Leo's Bones.

Rome, July 24.—It is unofficially announced that the transfer of the remains of Leo XIII. will take place tomorrow, the fourth anniversary of the death of the late pope. Every effort has been made by the church authorities to keep the matter a secret, owing to the fear of anti-clerical outbursts. The bones will be taken from the Church of St. Peter's to the permanent monument constructed by the sculptor Tadolini in the Church of St. John at the Lateran. The ceremony has been several times postponed because of confidential advices from government officials that a serious demonstration would result, such as marked the removal of the body of the late Pope Leo IX, from the Vatican Basilica to the Church of San Lorenzo. The disorders at that time were so violent that the remains of the pope were only saved from being thrown into the Tiber by the determined defense of the loyal Catholics accompanying the party. Hundreds of women took part in the battle and defended the sacred bones with the heavy lighted torches they carried, inflicting serious injuries upon many of their assailants.

It is reported that the Italian officials have assured the pope that the entire garrison of Rome will be called out if necessary to quell the prospective anti-clerical disorders. The powerful array of police and soldiers, it is expected, will be sufficient to prevent any serious trouble. A revival of the spirit of anti-clericalism is now spreading all over Italy, but expresses itself in a more quiet and philosophical manner than in former years.

The anti-clerical referendum now has over 90,000 members and is constantly growing.

## Excursions in Upper Air.

Paris, July 24.—Simultaneous excursions into the upper air, involving the most extensive observations ever attempted over vast regions of the northern hemisphere, were commenced today in various parts of Europe by the International Commission for Scientific Aeronautics.

The experiments will be continued through the week and are expected to supply much information as to the velocity and directions of the winds at the enormous elevations reached by the little rubber pilot balloons that have been sent adrift, and also as to the temperatures obtainable by the use of balloon sondes. The observations will show the conditions simultaneously prevailing high above the loftiest mountains in many widely separated regions.

All the famous European observatories engaged in upper air researches are taking part, as well as many independent observers. The prince of Monaco, one of whose pilot balloons last summer attained the

extraordinary and unprecedented altitude of 97,700 feet, is making observations in a high northern altitude, and French and German warships will send up balloons between Iceland and Norway and in the neighborhood of the Azores.

Further south an expedition sent by Dr. Teissereno de Bort and Professor Rotch of Blue Hill observatory will record the upper air conditions in the region of trade winds and doldrums.

The Italian government has co-operated by sending a warship to a point in the Mediterranean, and pilot and other balloons will be sent aloft from several points in Scotland and England.

In September and November these observations will be repeated, and there is every prospect that the study of the upper air will make great and unexampled progress during the year.

## Eddie Payne in Trouble.

The unpleasant news comes from Walla Walla that Eddie Payne, who is a Salem boy, and an amateur cartoonist, has gotten into a serious difficulty. Since leaving Salem Eddie has had a checkered career in the newspaper world, and his friends deeply regret to learn of the unfortunate turn in it. It seems that since living in Walla Walla he has been married and worked at different newspaper stunts. He evidently lived beyond his means, and, as a result, some time ago was tempted to extract \$180 from the safe of the chief of police in Walla Walla. He wrote up glowing reports of the theft, and was not suspected until he had had a row with his wife, when she informed on him. The result was that he promised to make good, etc., but recently left for Boise, when it was concluded that he repudiated the claim, and a warrant was sworn out for him. The young man was arrested in Boise and returned to Walla Walla, where he will tried, and it is feared by his friends that he will be obliged to pay a severe penalty, at least.

## Dies of Blood Poisoning.

After only two days' confinement in the St. Mary's hospital in this city Johnny Adams, the 13-year-old son of William Adams of Alsea, an account of which was given exclusively in Saturday's Herald, died Sunday noon. The cause of death was blood poisoning, induced by a sprain in the left ankle. The injury was sustained about two weeks ago at a logging camp at Blodgett on the C. & E. railroad. The youth jumped off a log and sprained the ankle. Home-made remedies improperly applied is said to have caused blood poisoning. The youth was brought to Albany and placed in the hospital for treatment last Thursday. The remains will be taken to Alsea today for interment. —Albany Herald.

## Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street in the City of Salem, Oregon.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, Broadway street in said city from a point 518 feet south of the center line of Belmont street, northerly to the center line of Norway street in said city, except a strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of Broadway street now occupied by the track of the Oregon Electric Co., with full intersections in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading the roadway of said portion of said street full width except a said strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of said street, with full intersections to the proper sub-grade, and by thoroughly rolling the sub-grade of said street and by placing thereon crushed rock in layers to the depth of eight inches, and by thoroughly rolling said crushed rock.

Also by constructing wooden curbs along both sides of said portion of said street.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, and the plans, specifications and estimates for the doing of said work heretofore adopted by the common council of said city and now on file in the office of the recorder of said city, to which said plans, specifications and estimates the attention of all persons interested in said improvement is hereby called.

The cost of all of said improvement to be assessed to the owners of property adjacent to said portion of said street hereby proposed to be improved.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the city recorder of said city within ten days from the final publication of this notice.
