FORTY AUTOS SATURDAY

Endurance Run From Portland to Salem Will Be Made

The "reliability and endurance" run of the automobilists of Portland will be made Saturday under the auspices of the Automobile Dealers' Association. It is not a race, as the speed will be limited to 20 miles an hour on country roads, and 10 miles in towns and village limits, and drivers will be penalized if they exceed this limit. This run is made to show the reliability of the machines, and the average time will not exceed 15 miles an hour. There is a sweepstake prize of \$100, and a cup for the winner in each class. It is expected about 40 machines will enter, but as entries do not close until Friday noon the definite number is not known. In the run each machine is given a score of 1000 points, and for each minute or fraction thereof stop on the road one point will be taken off. A point will also be taken off for each minute spent in repairs. Each auto will carry a time keeper, who will check up all details of the trip. The autos will leave Portland at one-minute intervals, commencing at 7:30 Saturday morning, and will reach here about 11 o'clock, and will remain until after lunch. While here the autos will be supplied with gasoline.

F. A. Bennett and F. P. Baumgartner were in the city today, making the run in an auto from Portland for the purpose of "blazing the trail," and perfecting arrangements here. It is thought there will be more than 150 persons who will make the trip, a number of them Eastern people.

STATE NEWS

The wheat crop in Eastern Oregon is above the average, both in quantity and quality.

The yearly meeting of the Friends' church, held at Newberg, closed its session Monday evening.

Mrs. John Martin dropped dead at Cove, in Union county, Saturday. She was a pioneer of Eastern Oregon. In cleaning up the Multnomah county jail a loaded revolver and a monkey wrench were found hidden in a pile of dirt.

The Cunningham Sheep Company, of Medford, recently made a purchase of 2000 Lincoln rams in Canada.

The preliminary work for the trolley line at Eugene is being done and materials for completion are on the ground.

It is estimated that the Hill line has brought 40,000 workmen to the coast since work on the North Bank road has been commenced.

A number of the sawmills of Linn county have turned their attention exclusively to the making of railroad ties, which proves to be very profitable.

Fruit growers of the Grand Ronde valley report that fruit prospects there are very bright this year, and that prices promises to be higher than usual.

The Chautauqua at Ashland paid all expenses, and left a surplus sufficient to pay off last year's deficiency. G. F. Billings was re-elected president for the thirteenth time.

A surveying party which has been at work for some time is reported to have found an easy grade across the Cascades in the vicinity of Mt. Hood. For whom the survey is made is not known.

A scarcity of laborers is reported in the wheat fields about Albany. Women are working in the fields, and high wages are offered for help. The same condition of affairs is reported at other harvesting centers. At South Bend \$3 a day for common labor meets with no response.

It is reported that farmers of Linn and Lane counties have not been dipping their sheep, as provided by law. In other parts of the state it is reported that the sheep raisers are fulfilling the provisions of the act. Quarantine of flocks of these two counties may follow.

Eddie Kinney, the 14-year-old son of Mike Kinney, a wealthy sheepman living about nine miles north of Heppner, was killed at about 7 o'clock Tuesday morning. He was driving a hay rake, when the team became frightened and ran away, throwing the little boy under the rake and dragging him to death. The rake teeth dropped on him, inflicting wounds on his breast, causing a flow of blood that could not be stopped. His breast was badly crushed.
