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The Primitive Violin.

In its primitive form the violin was a direct development of the lyre and monochord—the strings from the former and the elongated box, with its sound holes, finger board and movable bridge, from the latter. The history of the violin began with the invention of the bow some time before the thirteenth century, when the volle, or vielle, used by the troubadours, made its appearance. This instrument underwent many changes until the middle of the sixteenth century, when the true violin model appeared. The primitive violin had little or no contour. It was not until the thirteenth century that the vielle was scooped out at the waist. The corner blocks were added in the fifteenth century and are attributed to Germany. For nearly a century the sound holes were shifted all over the instrument before they were cut in their proper place and the bridge fixed between them.

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Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street in the City of Salem, Oregon.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, Broadway street in said city from a point 518 feet south of the center line of Belmont street, northerly to the center line of Norway street in said city, except a strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of Broadway street now occupied by the track of the Oregon Electric Co., with full intersections in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading the roadway of said portion of said street full width except a said strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of said street, with full intersections to the proper sub-grade, and by thoroughly rolling the sub-grade of said street and by placing thereon crushed rock in layers to the depth of eight inches, and by thoroughly rolling said crushed rock.

Also by constructing wooden curbs along both sides of said portion of said street.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, and the plans, specifications and estimates for the doing of said work heretofore adopted by the common council of said city and now on file in the office of the recorder of said city, to which said plans, specifications and estimates the attention of all persons interested in said improvement is hereby called.

The cost of all of said improvement to be assessed to the owners of property adjacent to said portion of said street hereby proposed to be improved.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the city recorder of said city within ten days from the final publication of this notice.
