TO INSTALL THE SUBMARINE BELL

Light Vessels Will Have Submarine Telephone System.

Advices received in the city yesterday state that the United States light house board has arranged with the submarine signal company to equip with submarine bells the lightships on the Pacific coast. Practically all the light vessels on the Atlantic coast and the Great Lakes are fitted with these instruments, which have proven a great success.

The government has for a long time promised to adopt this system along the Pacific coast, and it is now assured. Several light vessels on the coast are not fitted out with the submarine bells and those that are not will be as soon as possible. Among the list to be fitted with these instruments are the Umatilla reef, off Tatoosh; Columbia river light ship; San Francisco, Blunts reef, Cal., and relief light vessel No. 76.

The submarine telephone system has been universally adopted by all nations. A vessel fitted out with these instruments can obtain their positions when nearing a dangerous entrance or passing near dangerous rocks or shoal during thick or foggy weather, when the air signals cannot be heard, or when heard, are misleading. The vessel's hull is fitted with a receiving to the pilot house.

If the captain is in doubt during thick weather as to which side of the light vessel he is on, all he has to do is place the receivers to his ears and from which ever side of the light vessel is on the submarine bell will be heard on that side.

Steamship companies on the Pacific coast have already expressed their willingness to adopt the submarine telephone system, but heretofore they have been unable to get any satisfaction from government officials as to whether or not the system would be adopted on the coast.

Samuel D. Gilman, juror No. 3, said:

"I cannot point out any particular instruction that seemed to decide the boys on a verdict of not guilty. I do not think there was any particular instruction that they debated over. I believe it was the instructions generally. They couldn't seem to make head or tail to them, but were convinced that the general tone indicated that the defendant should be freed. Some of them seemed to think the instructions were very strong regarding corroborative testimony, and some said that they could not be clear as to the reasonable doubt."

Hotel Burns.

The fire started on the top floor, where 200 guests were sleeping.

A dispatch received at noon says: "The fire is under control. The loss is now estimated at \$1,000,000. Two persons are reported missing."

MOSQUITOS STOP A TRAIN.

Hold It Up Two Hours, While Frantic Passengers Give Battle.

A recent dispatch from Des Moines, Iowa, says:

A swarm of millions of mosquitoes held up a Minneapolis and St. Louis train at Ridgely the other night for two hours. One hundred and twenty passengers were almost crazed before they escaped. As the train started to pull out of Badgley all the windows were open, owing to the heat, and mosquitoes, driven from the marshes by the rain, swarmed in.

For a while the passengers attempted to fight the pests with handkerchiefs and hands, but as they increased in number and ferocity the conductor was appealed to and stopped the train. The passengers were driven from the cars and built fires beside the track, making a dense smudge, which afforded them a little relief. The smudge was carried into the cars and the mosquitoes driven out. Many of the passengers' hands and faces were almost raw from the bites.

Why?

Yet, there are those who want it abridged. They are working stealthily today for its abandonment. They want bossism and the old regime of debauchery and devilry at Salem. Why?—Corvallis Times.
