Prohibition and Suffrage.

"For every reason that a woman should have a good home the saloon business should die; and if the men of this country want it to die, for God's sake, why don't they enfranchise the women and let them have a chance to help kill it? This matter must be taken into the legislature and the laws made which will drive it out, and then they must be enforced against the unwilling and in favor of the weak."—Speech of John G. Wooley.

The foregoing remarks were made by John G. Wooley during his recent visit to Portland. It is just such talk as this that has killed the prohibition cause. When a party goes before the people with a single issue, and that issue just, it generally wins in the end. But when it goes before the country with a half dozen issues it invariably loses. I have been a strong prohibitionist all my life—always voting for that cause, but if I have to vote for woman suffrage, after what I have seen of its workings in Colorado and Wyoming, I shall never again vote for a prohibition candidate. Of the two evils—the dram shop or female suffrage, give me the dram shop every time.

John G. Wooley is a prohibition crank, and like every other extremist is ready to grasp at every fad and folly that presents itself in the hope that their adoption will help his cause. For one vote that woman suffrage would bring to the cause of prohibition a dozen would be lost to it. It is now clearly evident that prohibitionists intend swallowing woman suffrage, and that being the case I am done with the prohibition cause for ever. I know dozens of prohibitionists who have recently left

If women have to be given the right to vote in order that the cause of prohibition may carry why has not Wyoming—which has had female suffrage for over thirty years—brought about prohibition in that state?

Is there any more indication of securing prohibition law in Colorado now than there was before that law was passed? Has suffrage done anything for prohibition in either Utah or Idaho? Not one thing. Before ranting about woman suffrage Mr. Wooley should ask himself a few questions like these.

Let us look at home. Mrs. Dunaway, the president of the Woman's Suffrage of Oregon, and by far the ablest advocate of the cause in this state is an anti-prohibitionist and in her "cabinet," as she calls it, she has surrounded herself with other women who hold the same views. How then can Mr. Wooley, or anyone else, expect any sympathy or aid from granting women the ballot? And there is the Hon. Jeff. Myers, who is everlastingly trotting round the country with other old women preaching suffrage, who is a hop-grower and who on introducing one of the advocates of suffrage to an audience, openly declared that the women when they become voters will never do anything to injure the hop trade. Mr. Wooley should know these facts, and if he is a man of good sense, he will in future confine himself to prohibition and leave female suffrage to take care of itself. When the next election takes place and this craze is knocked on the head with a sledge hammer of 25,000 votes, we think he will begin to sing another song.

Government Telephones.

The government of the province of Alberta, Canada, is taking steps to supply all the cities, towns, rural municipalities, and local improvement districts that want them, with telephones at the lowest possible prices, the province undertaking the installation, operation and maintenance of the whole system.

It is believed that this service will be rendered for \$10 to \$12 a year and give long distance connection for little more than the cost of a postage stamp. The public works department will be ready when the frost is out to go ahead with the construction of the line from Edmonton to Lloydminster. Edmonton has been called the Glasgow of Canada.

In addition to a progressive system of taxation she also owns her own street railway, telephones, water works and electric lighting system. A number of the new towns throughout the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan are following the same course.—The Arena.
