**GETTING MILK.**

How Will Forty to One Hundred Tons a Day Come to Albany. The problem of bringing 80,000 to 200,000 pounds of milk a day to the condensed milk factory in Albany, is a problem that is already being taken up. That in the country will be brought here on wagons and the cars, and there is even talk of a milk train in the valley as there are in many places in the east. One means that is being worked up is by river navigation. J. B. Marvin and Frank Killen were in the city this morning, making arrangements to put a gasoline launch on the river between Corvallis and Albany, tapping the Corvallis country and along the way, and will do so if after a canvas for customers enough are secured to justify it. They want about ten tons of milk, and if obtained will secure a boat of that capacity drawing about ten inches, which would run in all seasons of the year. Already one gasoline launch has been built on the Long Tom for the business and another one will be. It is probable some will come up the river. These things suggest the propriety of the factory being on the river bank. —Albany Democrat.
