Remarkable Spanish Invention.
Possibility of a revolution in
the use of steam power is indicated
by General B. H. Ridgley of
Spain in the following report:

"Pedro Puigjaner, a well
known engineer of Barcelona, has in-
vented and submitted to practical
tests a rotative steam engine which
asserted will cause a revolution in
the countries where steam power
is used. It is claimed for this re-
volving engine that it may be ap-
plied to all purposes for which steam
is required, whether on land
or at sea, and that it consumes but one
fourth the coal per horse-power that
the ordinary engines consume. For ex-
ample, it is declared that a ship burn-
ing 100 tons of coal per day with the
new marine engine would burn only
25 tons with the new invention.

It is also claimed that the small re-
laxation of the engine is a great ad-
vantage, since it occupies but one-
fourth the space occupied by an ordi-
nary engine. This also ap-
plies to the coal per horse-power, but not to
the cost, which are of the usual
proportions.

The inventor says that even when
the question of motive power of
importance, the consumption
of fuel by his rotative engine is con-
siderably less than that of the ordi-
nary engine. It is claimed that the
new engine consumes only one-half a kilo (1.1 pounds) per
horse-power, and does not
exceed this established maximum,
whereas the ordinary engine con-
sumes from one to two kilos, and
therefore decreases to an appreciable
degree when a machine of 100 horse-
power is required, and so on suc-
cessfully until the expense of fuel does
not exceed a quarter of a kilo (0.55
pounds) when the engine is working
at full horse-power.

Another claim for the engine is
lightness. The ordinary 100 horse-
power engine for example, weighs
from one to two tons, whereas the
new engine weighs only one-half a ton.
The inventor also says that the engine
is much smaller than the cost of pro-
duction will also be much less, and
therefore be sold considerably
below the prices of ordinary engines
of the same capacity. It is claimed
that the economical results thus in-
duced are not exaggerated, when it
is considered that the machine con-
sumes all essential and efficient work-
ing capacities of the ordinary steam
engine in use at the present day
which the piston with rectilinear
motion is employed, including, con-
sequently, those which are the prop-
erty of the most improved turbines
employed by steam. The inventor has
patented his engine invention by
law in Spain and elsewhere and
applied for patent rights in the
United States.

The Sugar Plum Is the Most Ancient
Kind of Sweetmeat.

The most ancient kind of sweet-
meat is the sugar plum. It was the
invention of Julius Dragatus, a noted
Roman baker and confectioner, who
belonged to the family of Fabius.
According to an authority on ancient
history, it was in 177 B. C. that he
made the great discovery which for
twenty centuries has done so much
damage to teeth.

These bonbons, called dragati,
after their inventor (dragates in
French), remained the exclusive
privilege of the family of Fabius.
But at the birth or marriage of one
of that family a great distribution of
dragati took place as a sign of re-
joicing. The custom is still observed
by many of the nobility of Europe.

Burned almonds are purely of
French origin, owing their inception
to the gluttony of a certain French
merchant. One day Marshal Du-
plessis-Fralin, an old gourmet, sent
for Lassagne, who had already in-
vented many a toothsome dainty, to
concoct a new bonbon for him.
Lassagne searched, reflected, com-
bined, until finally he conceived a de-
licious bonbon, which he baptised
gloriously after the name of his mas-
ter, praline, the French for burned
almonds.—Pearson's Weekly.
