HOW SEEING THINGS

He Is Marked For Assassination
and Is Already "a Dead One"—He
Came Over to Get Teddy to Speak
to the Mikado and Ask Him to Take
His Fins Off Korea

New York, Aug. 1.—Prince Tyong Onji, nephew of the deposed emperor of Korea, arrived today. He is marked for assassination, and that nothing can save him. "The day to slay me has gone forth," he said, "and I am virtually dead now. It is the duty of the police to arrest the first Japanese found near me. I am here to see Roosevelt, to get him to save Korea from Japan. The Mikado will try to seize the Philippines, and then try to destroy the English power in the far Indies."

RACE SUICIDE.

City of Evanston Becoming an Adam-less Eden.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Evanston, North Shore city of wealth, pride of the wealth and cultured, is gaining feminine population, is losing her masculine inhabitants and is confronted with race suicide.

This situation was revealed yesterday with the completion of the city's annual school census. The figures showed an increase of 470 in the feminine population, a decrease of 42 in the number of masculine inhabitants, and an increase of only seven in the number under 21 years old.

In that portion of the city given over to luxury which furnishes a population of about 12,000 in school district No. 75, there were just about the same number of children that there were in the fifth and sixth wards, which furnished only 4000 people. Victor McCulloch, the census taker, who is a Northwestern University student, said that even this showing in the wealthy homes was much better than it would have been had it not been that the maids and other servants under 21 years of age were included as among the children.

The total population is 24,324 and the census shows that there are 1968 more females than males in the town.

LABOR TROUBLES SERIOUS

MINNESOTA'S TURN

Foreign Agitator Who Doesn't Know Uncle Samuel Advises Miners to Arm Themselves—Eleven Hundred Deputies Have Been Sworn in By the Sheriff of St. Louis County.

Chisholm, Minn., Aug. 1.—Petriella, the agitator, before 2000 miners today declared they should arm themselves in the next 24 hours, and strike to kill, if they cannot secure their rights through justice. Sheriff Bates, with 100 armed deputies, left Duluth for Hibbing at noon. The eleventh hundred of new deputies have been sworn in. The Payall mine there opens with nearly a full crew. The Adams, Spuc, Rust, Glen, Clark and Chisholm mines resume with partial crews. Governor Johnson has been asked to send troops to the iron mining districts.

Frenchman Talks Right.

Tangier, Aug. 1.—The French cruiser Galilee arrived at Casablanca today. The ship's commander ordered the Bashaw to protect Europeans, on penalty of his own head. Two of Tuesday's massacre victims were burned alive, and the remainder horribly tortured.

The helpless victims were tortured by children, who were allowed to gouge their eyes out. Splinters also were driven under the finger and toe nails. The natives were encouraged by the troops, who stood and watched the torture of the foreigners. In a state of terror many are boarding the foreign steamships in the harbor.

Toulon, France, Aug. 1.—The cruisers Conde and DuChayla are ordered to sail this afternoon for Morocco, to assist in putting down the rebellious tribesmen, who are seeking the lives of foreigners and threaten a holy war.

Killed in Swimming Pool.

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 1.—Edmund R. Watson, president of the Southern National Bank, of this city, was killed in the swimming pool of the well Columbia club this morning. He mounted the diving board, but slipped, and his head struck the concrete tank killing him instantly.

Engineer Lets Water Get Low.

Urbana, O., Aug. 1.—Lou Chamberlain, P. F. Welsner, Charles Stuart, trainmen, were killed this morning by the blowing up of a boiler on a Pennsylvania engine. Low water was the cause. The engine, tender and two cars were demolished.

Boiler Exploded.

Breckenridge, Mo., Aug. 1.—The boiler on a locomotive of a Burlington freight blew up last night, killing G. E. Menlenhall, a brakeman; H. P. Brewer, fireman, and student fireman. Two others were seriously injured.

Telegraphers Are Sore.

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—The telegraphers' union, angered at the part the national executive committee took to prevent small carrying out plans for a national strike, met last night and asked Reidy, Konenkamp and Sullivan to resign.

Startling if True.

St. Louis, Aug. 1.—Mrs. Kate Webster Walsh has brought suit against Edward U. Walsh, a former army officer. Mrs. Walsh is a sister of Creveling, the race horse owner of San Francisco.

Rameses Was a Fraud.

London, Aug. 1.—Egyptologists claim that they have discovered that Rameses II. was a fraud, and that he is not entitled to the appellation of "Great" which the historians have given him. Recent explorations, it is stated, have developed the fact that many temples and monuments bearing his name and therefore supposedly his work, existed a thousand years before him. The explorers believe the king was vain, and caused his name to be cut everywhere. Professor Naville, one of the official explorers of Egypt, had this to say about Rameses:

"The more we discover about Rameses, the more convinced are we that he was a fraud. He was not 'great' in any way, but his vanity was colossal. To satisfy this he conceived the notion of causing his name to be inscribed on every temple, statue and monument. We are now beginning to find him out."

JENKINS WILL NOT BE THERE

Chippewa Falls, Wis., Aug. 1.—In a letter issued by Congressman Jenkins, chairman of the judiciary committee, regarding the state mud-dle in North Carolina, he says that never since the Civil War has there been an event which calls for such severe condemnation as the recent senseless trade on behalf of the states against the nation. "Civil war was the result of such agitation," he says. "We may have another civil war earlier than we want it."

INDIANS IN FULL DRESS

Tulsa, Okla., Aug. 1.—Eight thousand persons are attending the Oklahoma state Republican convention. Full-blooded Indians, in blankets, are sitting as delegates. It seems certain Governor Frantz will be nominated for governor of the new state.

Disbands Korean Army.

Tokio, Aug. 1.—The emperor this morning dissolved the Korean army, as the result of a secret agreement, in which the Korean soldiers colluded and exchanged fire with the Japanese. Twenty-eight of the latter were injured.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 1.—Forty Koreans were killed and wounded in a fight with Japanese today, according to the dispatches received from United States Consul-General Sammons, at Seoul. The hostilities grew out of Korea being disarmed by the Japanese. The casualties among the Japanese were slight.

Japs Come by Thousands.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 1.—News of further charters of steamers to carry Japanese from Honolulu and the prospect of Japanese steamers being brought from home to enter the coolie carrying trade between the Hawaiian Islands and British Columbia, together with reports of the renewed influx of Hindus, is exciting labor men in this province. Steamer Indiana is expected to leave Honolulu tomorrow with 800 Japanese for Vancouver, and O. Y. Ito, a Honolulu Japanese, is sending for a Japanese coasting steamer, which will be placed regularly in the trade.

Littleton to Defend Thaw.

New York, Aug. 1.—Martin W. Littleton, former borough president of Brooklyn, has been selected as chief counsel for Thaw.

It is understood Littleton's retaining fee is \$25,000. He has accepted on condition that he may have his own way in conducting the trial.

BRITT WHIPS NELSON AND DOES IT EASILY

Clever Fighter Astonishes His Friends By His Form—Nelson Is Clearly Out-classed But Takes All Kinds of Punishment For Twenty Rounds

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—Battered and sore Nelson spent the night and morning at a Turkish bath, and only a few friends called to see him. He presents a sorry appearance. His nose and one eye are in bad shape, and his body is sore from the beating he received. He is undecided as to his future, as the unexpected defeat upset Nolan's plan. Britt shows few signs of the battle. He will bide his time until he gets what he wants in the shape of a purse for the next fight. Britt and Gans may meet tonight to discuss terms of the fight on Labor Day. Britt says: "Gans must come to me, as he ignored me before the fight with Nelson."

Auditorium, San Francisco, July 31.—Jimmy Britt, of San Francisco, gained the decision over Battling Nelson, of Hagenwisch, Ill., at the end of 20 rounds of fast and pretty fighting as has ever been seen in San Francisco in many years. At no time was either man in danger of a knock-out until near the end of the last round, when Britt's right and left swings and uppercuts, which he landed one after another at will on Nelson's face, all but put the Dane down and out.

Nelson did the greater part of the leading from start to finish, but he was outdone by Britt in cleverness, ring generalship and gameness and ability to take punishment. Referee Welch, in announcing his decision, gave Nelson only two rounds out of the 20—the second and the seventh.

By his game fight Britt wiped out finally the aspersions that some former battles had cast on him. He showed that keeping away from his adversary is the chief part of his ring generalship. His defense showed up better than ever before, and his accuracy was never so marked before. He found his man almost at will, and from the opening tap of the gong to the end of the last round there was no lack of steam in his blows. If anything, he showed up stronger in the last five rounds than in the first 15, while in the last half of the mill Nelson's hitting powers obviously diminished.

While Britt took no foolish chances, he gave Nelson plenty of close quarter opportunities to put him out, if the Battler had been able to land. Nelson disappointed many of his admirers by his wildness. In the last eight or ten rounds he swung with right and left for the face scores of times and missed by a big margin of inches. His favorite fighting tactics were to crowd his man, go in to a clinch and then, with his bull head pressing his adversary's neck, upcut him again and again to the face and body.

Will be Free.

The races at the state fair grounds track this evening will be free to all, and good, clean sport is promised. This meet, while many good horses are listed, is strictly amateur and gotten up for the promotion of gentlemanly sport and the entertainment of the public. The races will come off between 5 and 8:30, and all who attend will see a good exhibition of trotting and pacing.

CHICAGO WILL GET BOTH.

Democratic and Republican Conventions May Meet in Windy City.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Chicago will get both the Democratic and Republican national conventions, according to Thomas Knight, chairman of the joint committee having the matter in charge, who says that Chicago is the logical city. The only competing cities are Denver, Seattle, Kansas City and Boston. Eight hundred hotel rooms are said to have been engaged for next June.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS AIDING.

Order Comes to Assistance of Father in Searching for His Child.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Aided by the Knights of Pythias throughout America the search for Gertrude Rehde, aged 6 years, whose strange disappearance Monday is puzzling the police, was extended today to every city. Her father is a K. of P. At first it was thought the child fell into the lake, but circumstances now point to kidnaping.

SNAKE IN THE DRINK

Ashland, Ky., Aug. 1.—Four are dead and two dying as a result of drinking beer from a keg, in which a copperhead snake had crawled and died, in a camp at Welch, in the mountains.

BODIES TRAVEL TOGETHER.

Dead Actress and Dead Lover Journey to the Grave.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 1.—The body of Laura Matthews, accompanied by Tillie Green, her nurse, was shipped to Kansas City today for burial. Despite the coroner's verdict of suicide, the sentiment is general that the girl was doomed to death. The body of Amos Rumbaugh was taken on the same train, to be taken to Mt. Pleasant, Pa.

Japs Leave California.

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 1.—Imajo, cashier of the Japanese American bank, states that Japanese are leaving California for the interior states since the San Francisco trouble. Four thousand have left Sacramento for Montana, Utah and Nevada. He says this is a solution of the Japanese problem, "as it is in this state only there is race prejudice," said Imajo.

Daily Occurrence in Russia.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.—In quelling riots the troops at Lodz today opened fire, killing and wounding 30.

Ordered to Remove Phones.

Mayor Rodgers has notified the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone Company to remove its wires and phones from the city immediately. This is the company which has recently installed several long distance phones in the down-town district without having a franchise in the city, and it is said there was no understanding with the city authorities whatsoever in regard to its doing business within the corporate limits.
