Files Answer to Objection.

W. F. Gholson, administrator of the estate of J. B. Gholson, deceased, has filed an answer in the county court to the objection of E. F. Gholson to the final account. The answer sets forth that the administrator received from the I. O. O. F. lodge of McCoy the sum of \$50 which was used in behalf of the estate of the said J. B. Gholson, deceased. The administrator denies that he collected \$5 from John Walling, but says that \$4.30 was collected, one-half of which sum was his own and other half belonging to the estate.

He states that outside of the real estate of the deceased he received from all sources from the property of the estate the sum of \$212.75 and further from the I. O. O. F. lodge, \$50, making \$262.75 and that he has paid out for the debts of the estate \$235.94.

He asks for \$22.20 which is claimed to have been advanced by himself for the benefit of the estate, also \$39.39 administrator's commission and \$20 for attorney's fees in the matter of the objections and asks that the court dismiss the said objections.

Must Comply With Law.

A meeting was recently held by the insurance commissioner of Oregon and the fire insurance underwriters of the Pacific coast, and it is probable that an order requiring insurance companies to comply with the law will be issued by Secretary of State Benson to the various companies doing business in this state. The underwriters are at present investigating the conditions and methods in San Francisco, and the order will not be issued until their report has been made.

The law which holds that all provisions modifying the form set forth by the statute shall be in different colored ink, and in letters twice the size of the rest of the policy, will be enforced.

War Chief Sam Visits Old Friends.

John Sam, an Indian, one time chief of the remnants of a tribe of Indians in this vicinity, is visiting old acquaintances in Oregon City.

With the coming of the white settlers the tribe was disbanded, and John lived here till about 20 years ago, when he and his family left for Eastern Oregon. Luck favored him, and today he is the owner of a fine stock ranch in the Cascades.

John is acquainted with all the early settlers, and recognizes nearly all of them at first sight. He is being shown the town by Joe Suisap, a former tribesman, who is one of Oregon City's characters.—Oregon City Star.
