BLOCKED

AGAIN

Game to Stop All Street Improvements
Shows Its Hand

Business men who attended the
sessions of the city council, and there
are still a few who are not so thor-
oughly weary but that they go up
and look on, must have realized that
there are two lines of work that seem
to be the favorite industry of some
of the city fathers. One of these is
taking a fall out of the telephone
company, the railroads or the street
car line. That passion has yielded
no fruit to speak of, and if kept up
will make this city a back number,
while other cities will be getting new
passenger depots and other improve-
ments. The second lucrative indus-
try seems to be delaying or blocking
every attempt at public improve-
ments. Of course, it leaves a great
deal of idle money lying in the banks
—city funds—and state and county
money, and money of wealthy prop-
erty owners that would otherwise be
scattered for common labor on street
paving.

The Objector Appears.

After lying still for a few months,
the objector in the city council awak-
ens in time to spike street paving
again. Although not paying a dollar
of street assessment, paying little or
no taxes of any sort, doing political
stunts from the standpoint of per-
sonal interests instead of public,
the elements represented by the Objector
and Chronic Kicker seem able to
thwart the city government, and
successfully hold up all paving propo-
sition. Street paving is again held
up by Alderman Gesner who has had
the ordinance for the paving of State
street referred to himself, where it is
to be pocketed and killed, and the
Capital City made the laughing stock
of the state. He objects even to the
paving of Court street, when the
conservative property owners on that
street are ready to go ahead, and
when every objection has been met
and overcome by the patience of May-
or Rodgers and his backers in the
council then the everlasting objector
by occupation arouses himself and
shows his hand again. It is under-
stood the street car line, which is
losing money at Salem, has been able
to meet the city half way and make
its share of the improvement pos-
sible. It would pay to give Gesner
a fat federal office.

The Capital Journal, does not
despair of this city ultimately getting
some paved streets, but it will be
when there have been some funerals
political or otherwise. That all pub-
lic improvements have been held up,
that it has taken over two years to
build a little concrete bridge, that
mechanics and contractors are driven
elsewhere to make a living for them-
selves and families, is enough to con-
vince anyone, that instead of a pro-
gressive city administration, the ob-
jecting elements that want Salem to
linger at the tail end of the proces-
sion of Oregon cities, are not dead
but really in the saddle. That Mr.
Gesner and that element are in con-
trol of the city council, and in con-
trol of making the new city charter
must be apparent to anyone. It is
now a square issue, whether the
municipal tetanus shall be fatal or
simply a prolonged case of civic
suspension in the interest of the
most selfish element that ever held
up a community. The county and
state have made their appropriations.
The city has the money to pay its
part. The property owners have over-
come their fears of bankruptcy fol-
lowing a policy of progress. Just at
that favorable moment the city coun-
cil seems to swoon back into the arms
of the perennial objector who will
neither die nor resign.
