

# UMP NOTES ROSEBURG TO BANDON

## Ryan Tells of His Trip Across the Coast Range

We left Roseburg Wednesday the 4th and drove south to Ruckels, where the railroad, turned, and drove three miles, and took our lunch at the banks of the Umpqua in the Prairie, and camped for the night twelve miles west of Roseburg. The next day we passed through a valley where there is some fine timber until we came to the Cathas valley, which has splendid farms, the best we have seen since we left the Willamette. We crossed the mountains and camped for the night two miles east of Myrtle Point, this road was a mountain road, being some very steep hills. Myrtle Point is a very pretty little town, and seems to be improving. Buildings are in good condition. We crossed the bridge over the river and went down the south side. There are some fine ranches for the ten miles, then the road was hilly, and for ten or more miles, there are some very steep pitches. We camped for the night five miles east of Myrtle Point on the M. & N. Y. ranch, which three German men are managing, milking forty-six cows, taking 144 gallons of milk a day to the creamery. We picked up some hay along the road, and had a good dinner. Hay is high at present, \$1.50 per bale or \$30 per ton. Barley \$1.25 a sack. We arrived at Bandon Saturday, at 2 p. m. and camped in the southwest part of the city. Monday morning dawned clear and bright, there was a heavy wind from the ocean, which shows up on the white caps. We went down the coast and got some razor-back sheep, came back to dinner, and had a good dinner. This is a nice place to camp, the people here charge unreasonable prices for supplies to campers. There are a good many pleasant places. Hay can be had up to the fifteen miles south along the coast from \$8 to \$12 per ton. The M. & N. Y. have a hall of their own, and there are lots of Socialists in the neck of the country. We also saw many from Coquille City. We met Mr. Blackaby, a brother of Blackaby of Silverton, he is buy- ing cattle, is also the deputy sheriff of Coos county. There was a big game on Coquille down today. Result 13 to 9 in favor of the ash and door factory, large mill, and has just finished a fine warehouse, and is doing a good business. Bandon is a good seaport there is some fine country surrounding it. Monday morning we went up the coast, crossed over on the steam ferry, drove across the hills to the other hand ferry, and crossed at Bandon. Drove on to Empire City which is going to ruin rapidly. This is owned by Elijah Smith, manager of the Southern Oregon Land and a few private parties; all to sell, and get out. The company owns 105,000 acres of land, consequently controls all the business. The proprietor of the Empire City barn was such a hog he would spare us a particle of hay or feed for our horses. The postmaster was nice in showing us camp places, and other courtesies. The supervisor found some hay for us and we camped just north of a fine place. Next morning we drove on to North Bend, a thriving place, everything is new and up-to-date. Thousands of dollars being spent in improvements of the town. The Catholics have a fine school. The town has a fine hotel, splendid stores, and factories, everybody was busy, and happy. We drove on to Marshfield, arrived at noon, met Walter Lyons in headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce, which has just opened a room on Main street, centrally located. We also met James Pickens, formerly of Salem. Met lots of soldiers, one a Mr. J. C. Ferry gave us a good location to camp, and place for our horses, we met J. C. Johnson, he gave us care for our horses. Marshfield is destined to be the best harbor on coast. We took a trip up the river to the hatchery, where they are preparing for a large catch, and a big

hatch. The Marshfield creamery, and cheese factory is doing a good business. Mr. Smith is finishing one of the largest sawmill plants in the state, which will be able to cut 250,000 feet of lumber in ten hours. He has timber sufficient to last him 200 years to come. The steamer "Plant" from San Francisco came in well loaded. Unloaded part of its cargo, and went on. The "Breakwater" came in heavily loaded from Portland, and went out loaded. There is new business, and lots of new residences in course of construction, and property is selling at big prices. Eventually North Bend and Marshfield will be one town, with street cars along the river front. Farm lands range in price from \$100 to \$300 per acre; hill land from \$10 to \$100 per acre. Prices on products of all kinds are high, and labor from \$2 to \$5 a day. Everybody is busy and all seem to have plenty of money, and are apparently happy. From here we drove back to Coquille, Myrtle Point, Port Oxford and Gold Beach, Eureka, California, and thence on to Ashland and Medford.
