San Francisco, Aug. 7.—Emil J.

Pennsylvania Man Kills Himself.

Pittsburg, Aug. 7.—George W.
Delmarter, former state senator and
later candidate for governor of Penn-
sylvania on the Republican ticket,
shot and killed himself this afternoon
in the office of the Pennsylvania Steel
Tie company, of which he is presi-
dent. Melancholy is supposed to
have been the cause, as he has been
worrying over the death of his son,
which occurred a month ago.

A letter was found on his person
which is in possession of the coroner.
It is thought to contain the real cause
of his suicide.

That Dayton Murder.

Dayton, O., Aug. 7.—Harry, Jacob
and Bertha Markowitz who were ar-
rested in connection with the death
of their sister, Anna, who was with
Abe Cohen, when he was shot Sun-
day night, were released this after-
noon to attend the funeral of their
sister. They are not to be charged
with the murder.

Dr. James Smith Drowned.

Dr. James M. Smith of Portland
was drowned at Long Beach yester-
day morning about 11 o'clock while
trying to save his son who was caught
by the undertow and was drowning.
A young man named Harry Tink
threw over a life preserver and
though almost drowned himself saved
the boy, Leslie who is about 13 years
of age. Dr. Smith's body was seen
in the breakers but has not been re-
covered. He was a native of Port-
land.

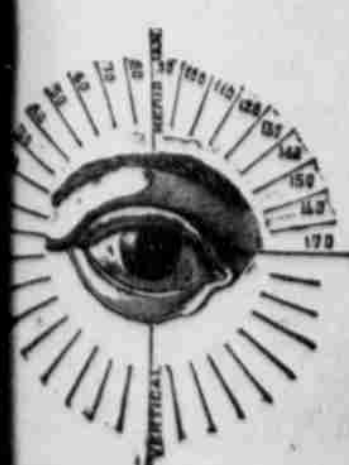
