A delegation of oystermen, Yaquina, at a meeting of the commission, held here yesterday, complained that various companies are attempting to monopolize the oyster industry at Yaquina bay. They petitioned the commission to action in the matter. It was set forth that a large portion of the bottom of the bay is suitable for producing oysters and that the planting of the oysters could be accomplished by the government. It was decided that the fishery should visit the bay and make personal investigation before action is taken by the commission.
