TRAVESTY ON AMERICAN LAWS.

That a man should be thrown in the county jail on a charge of stealing a few eggs is a travesty on American justice.

There are all over this state men who have stolen public lands, have stolen public and private funds, NOT IN JAIL.

There are men who have held up banks and depleted them, according to law, who are pillars in society and possess great political power.

But a tramp who steals overalls, or a laboring man who steals eggs, must be immediately LANDED IN JAIL AND BRANDED A CRIMINAL.

Men who openly forge public records and alienate hundreds of thousands of acres of the public domain are considered respectable.

But we jump onto all small thieves and CLAP THEM INTO JAIL WITHOUT CEREMONY. Are we not becoming a laughing stock unto ourselves.

By all means, the man who steals eggs should go straight to the penitentiary, and let outraged justice be vindicated.

TIME TO QUIT KNOCKING.

Having a fairly good and very efficient delegation in congress and the United States senate, it is time for the knocking to begin.

Instead of building up and strengthening the men who represent Oregon at the national capital, the cry is, PULL THEM DOWN.

All kinds of candidates for all kinds of offices are being groomed put into the field for each of the offices at Washington.

The great states of the nation, the states like Illinois, Iowa, New York and Pennsylvania, KEEP THE DELEGATIONS INTACT.

We must destroy, break up, batter and cripple the congressmen and senators before they get fairly into a good working position.

Has not the time come for Oregon people who are not office-chasers TO DRAW THE LINE AGAINST THIS STYLE OF POLITICS.

Let us for ten or twenty years pull together and build up the state. If the states goes Democratic there should be a change, not otherwise.

We cannot develop Oregon, we cannot secure improvement of our rivers and harbors, we cannot secure irrigation and reclamation work, by making continuous changes in the delegation.

CORRUPTERS OF YOUTH.

The San Francisco Star publishes the following stinging editorial on the corrupt practices of the telephone trust in the Bay City and elsewhere.

The editorial portrays vividly the degrading influences of many big corporations in general and is as follows:

The refusal of Zimmer, one of the officials of the telephone trust, to testify against his superior, Louis Glass, is a sermon on the art of getting on in the world.

As the trusts become more and more powerful, about all the salaried positions worth while are at the disposition of trust magnates.

The question naturally arises, do the trusts want for such positions, men of integrity who are law-abiding, or do they want men who are prepared to set at defiance the laws of the land, and, to use a harsh expression, to cut a throat if necessary?

The Zimmer incident shows plainly that THE TRUSTS DO NOT WANT HONEST MEN FOR THE POSITIONS THEY HAVE TO GIVE OUT.

These combinations of capital are engaged in most dubious pursuits.

They regard the law as made to be broken; they expect their employees, particularly their officials, to break the laws when required.

In other words, they want men who will go to any extreme in advancing trust interests; the Zimmer incident is a good case in point.

Here is a young man who knows that the law has been broken, but instead of going into court to testify to the facts as he knows them, PREFERS TO SPEND HIS TIME IN THE COUNTY JAIL RATHER THAN BETRAY HIS LAW-BREAKING MASTERS.

JESSE JAMES, NOR CAPTAIN KIDD, NEVER HAD MORE FAITHFUL LIEUTENANTS.

Zimmer, like the bribe-giving Halsey, occupies a remunerative position in the telephone trust.

Like Halsey, he was pointed out as a successful young man.

Other young men who have not gotten over the old-fashioned notion that the laws are to be observed were made to take secondary positions and were looked upon with more or less open contempt, as wholly or in part failures.

VIOLENCE EAST AND WEST.

Commenting on expressions of opinion by the eastern press on the Haywood trial and western lawlessness The Tacoma Ledger very aptly calls attention to some of the beams in eastern eyes as follows:

It does not become a state disgraced with whitecap outrages to comment on violence in the West.

The Indianapolis Star, in discussing the Haywood verdict, had this to say:

"The moral influence of this admittedly fair trial by deliberate legal process and conducted in a manner as orderly as if in a New England court will undoubtedly be deeply felt in a region where violence is common and where men are accustomed too often to take the law into their own hands."

It has not been ten years since a mob in Terre Haute, Ind., after hanging two negroes to a railroad bridge, built a bonfire and burned the bodies.

AN INDUSTRIOUS PHOTOGRAPHER WAS ON THE SCENE AND TOOK EXCELLENT PICTURES SHOWING THE MURDERED NEGROES LYING ON THE PILE OF BURNING STICKS AND A SCORE OF MEN STANDING AROUND THE FIRE LOOKING ON AS INTERESTEDLY AS IF IT WERE A BARBECUE.

THE FACES OF THE ONLOOKERS WERE CLEAR AND DISTINCT, BUT THE PERSONS WHO WERE PRESENT AT THE BURNING WERE NEVER CALLED TO ACCOUNT.

Not more than two months ago there were three or four frightfully brutal whitecappings in Southern Indiana.

Men and women were taken from their homes in the night and whipped until the blood ran from their backs and limbs because their conduct was not morally up to the standard of the neighbors; and it has only been six or seven years since five men were hung to one limb, one after another, because they had been robbing stores and otherwise making

themselves offensive to the community in which they lived.

Not a member of the mob was ever punished.

Talk of violence and of men taking the law into their own hands!
