LADIES' NARROW ESCAPE

Runaway Team Crashes Into Buggy In Which Three Ladies Were Riding At Scio

An accident occurred on Main street in this city Tuesday afternoon that filled all spectators with horror of expectancy. Mrs. Laura Irvine of Portland and sister, Mrs. Dolly Wagoner of Corvallis, had been visiting relatives and friends in this vicinity for the past week, and started from the home of the News family at about 3:30 p. m. in a buggy driven by Mrs. Minnie Young on their return home.

Just as the trio were driving in front of Wealey & Cain's store, a team belonging to C. C. Burmester that was being unhitched in front of McDonald & Renno's blacksmith shop, became frightened and started to run away. Mrs. Young attempted to get her rig out of the way of the frightened team and turned in towards the bank building to do so. The running team, with but one trace attached to the wagon, made a turn in the same direction and a collision resulted.

One of the team horses passed between the horse driven by the ladies and the buggy the ladies were in, while the other horse passed in front of the buggy horse. The wagon tongue, which was in the air, passed between the back of the buggy seat and the ladies. In a jiffy the buggy collapsed and the whole, ladies, horses and buggy, were in a promiscuous heap. Spectators at once secured the horses and prevented them from trampling upon the ladies.

Mrs. Wagoner was the first of the ladies to arise, and in doing so had

the presence of mind to pick up her spectacles, and had the extreme good fortune to escape without a scratch. Mrs. Young received two scalp wounds, and had one of her hands severely injured by one of the horses stepping on it. Mrs. Irvine was taken up in a dazed condition and removed to Dr. Prill's office. She was afterwards carried upon a litter to the home of the News family, where she is at the present writing. She recovered from the shock at about 9 p. m. and thought that the shock was the only injury to speak of. Mrs. Young's wounds in the scalp required several stitches, and the hand, while no bones are broken, is so badly injured that she may have two stiff fingers.

The accident was at once the most frightful and the most fortunate for the participants that has ever occurred in Scio. The great wonder is that there was not a fatal result. The buggy was reduced to kindling, no part of it, wheels, shafts, top or box unbroken. Spectators, when they saw the collision was inevitable, turned their heads but very quickly had hold of the horses and were extricating the ladies from their dangerous situation. The ladies most interested feel very thankful to escape with so little injury.—Salem News.

Logs Pass Albany.

The last of the immense log "drive" which is being floated down the Willamette river to the Spaulding sawmill, at Newberg, passed Albany Thursday evening. This "float" contains 12,000,000 feet of logs, composed for the most part of balm and red fir. The logs were started down the river at Coburg about four weeks ago. Thirty men and 12 horses are employed in bringing the "drive" down stream. During the progress down the river there has been but one accident, a few days ago a team of horses being drowned near Corvallis.

One Way to Catch a Copperhead.
John Eddy, engineer at the Luke Fiddler water hoist, near Mount Carmel, while on duty last Wednesday night saw a snake's head appear through a knot hole in the floor of the engine room.

Notifying several companions, he prepared to capture the reptile. Looping a heavy piece of string around the hole he waited until the serpent poked his head up again, when a quick jerk of the line had him fast. A blow with a club then dispatched him. The snake proved to be a copperhead about six feet in length.—Lewisburg Journal.

Better Freight Facilities.

Superintendent L. R. Fields, Chief Engineer William Bollons and Master Mechanic W. T. Younger of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, paid an official visit to Salem yesterday and in company with Railroad Commissioners Alchison and West, took a detailed survey of conditions existing in the freight yards at this point, with the view of adding to the floor space of the depot and improving the freight-handling and storing facilities generally, to meet the deficiencies complained of by the local truck and dray companies.

The officials concede that the present facilities are inadequate and will either remedy them by converting the warehouse formerly used in storing hops and other merchandise, but abandoned when the provisions of the interstate commerce law went into effect forbidding railroads to conduct warehouse business, into a freight shed to be used in connection with the old depot, or by moving the old depot over and building on a commodious addition, with sufficient floor space to accommodate the demands.

The matter was taken under advisement and the decision will probably be embraced in the company's reply to the complaint in the hands of the railroad commission.
