Patent for Oregon Mineral Land. The forest service has recommended to the commissioner of the general land office that patent issue on the lode mining claims of J. C. Lewis in the Rogue River mining district in the Siskiyou national forest, Oregon.

The forest officer who made the examination has reported that the claims are being extensively developed and that valuable mineral deposits have been discovered.

The claims form two groups known as the "Benton" and the "J. C. L." groups. They were located in 1893 and relocated by the present owner in 1894. Large expenditures have been made for the development of the properties and the evidence of the mineral deposits are such as would seem to indicate that the land possesses mineral in paying quantities.

The recommendation that patent issue is in accordance with the policy of the forest service to encourage the development of the mineral resources of the lands in the national forests and to make the forests contribute to the development of such resources by keeping the timber in the country for the use of the miners as long as they need it.

Progress for Independence.

The deadlock in the Independence city council has been broken by the election of W. A. Messner, a prominent merchant, to fill the vacancy. A. B. One of the first tasks before the new city government will be to secure for the city an adequate light and water contract. 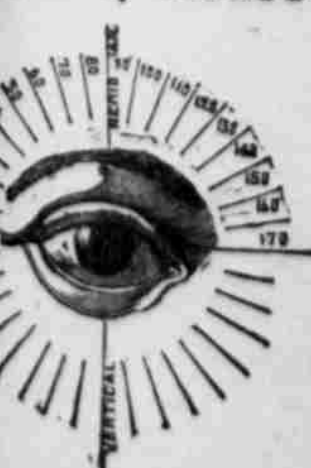
