ONLY "RHINO" IN AMERICA.

Remarkable Specimen to Be Seen In Ringling Bros.' Menagerie.

There is only one rhinoceros in captivity and it belongs to the Ringling Brothers. There are only three giraffes in America and they belong to the Ringling Brothers. There are but two of the hippopotamus family in this country, and they, too, are members of the menagerie of this great circus.

There are many other rare and curious specimens of the animal creation to be seen only under the tents of Ringling Brothers' show. Explorers and naturalists have said after visiting this collection that it is far the largest and most valuable from an educational standpoint of any similar collection in the country. There are 108 dens and cages full of wild beasts, besides many hay-eating animals displayed in pens.

There are so many elephants with the circus this season that in the parade they make a string two blocks long. A few of the many specimens of note are a behemoth, horned horses, sacred oxen, all kinds of bears, deer and cats, taptirs, vlak vauks, black leopards, Philippine cattle, kangaroos, a chimpanzee, ibexes, llamas, yaks, camels, dromedaries, nyghaus, zebues, hyenas and water buffaloes. The hippopotamus den is the biggest vehicle ever built and ten horses are required to pull it.

All of the cages and pens are placarded so that visitors may know at a glance what are contained in them. Uniformed attendants are also at hand to answer all questions. The menagerie pavilion is bigger than any tent ever erected by another circus, so that crowding is done away with. During the hour between the opening of the doors and the beginning of the regular performance Ringling Brothers' famous military band plays operatic airs and the best of the popular music, so that visitors, while inspecting the zoologic department may have additional entertainment.

Bridge Nearing Completion.

Work on the Willsonville bridge across the Willamette is progressing nicely and the huge steel structure will soon be completed. The grading to the approaches has been completed and the bridge with the exception of a span to the east bank and a portion of the steel work on a second span, is ready to receive the rails.

There is some discussion among the boat men as to whether the bridge will allow the large river steamers to pass beneath during high water. The bridge is said to be 76 feet above the low water mark but several of the river captains seem to think that their boats will be barred from going under during a flood. The smoke stack of the steamer Ruth is probably the tallest on the river being 54 feet from the water.
