

SEA GIVES UP OLD RELIC.

Pin Found at Newport Bears Mysterious Inscription.

Newport, Or., Aug. 12.—(Special) Proprietor Fitzpatrick of the Grey hotel, recently found on Nye Creek beach one of the most interesting relics ever taken from the Pacific coast. The relic is a pin, which serves as a memento of a British sea captain. The back is inscribed: "In memory of Captain B. W. Taylor, H. S. Apollo, drowned in the Nye Creek, February 27, 1814." The pin is of oval shape and about an inch long. In the center are the initials of the captain, B. W. T., which is of hand-carved gold with a background of black enamel, closely resembling gun metal. Completely encircling the initials is a snake, carved of gold, while the outer rim of the pin contains twenty-two of the largest and finest pearls that can be found any place. The pin was found at extreme low tide in the clam beds, between the Nye and Nye Creek, and in a place frequently visited by pleasure seekers. This fact makes it probable, that it was lost by a visitor of the beach, and the reasonable explanation for its presence here is that it has come from some shipwreck of many years ago. An old captain, who has made some in Newport for many years, that back in the 60's a British ship was wrecked near this port, and is unable to recall the name of the ship or the particulars of the wreck. The old captain has a reputation for making a yarn of every event which seems to need explanation, but this one whether true or not sounds reasonable.

There is nothing on the pin to indicate its significance. Whether it was given by the British government to the family of the deceased, by secret order, as the snake suggests, or whether it was made as a memento by some of the captain's family, are but matters of conjecture. The mysterious and weird as might the history of the pin, the British Apollo and her history are all so. There are several old sailors here who never heard of her existence, but from her presence in the Adriatic Sea during the Napoleonic war makes it very probable that she was a British man-of-war.

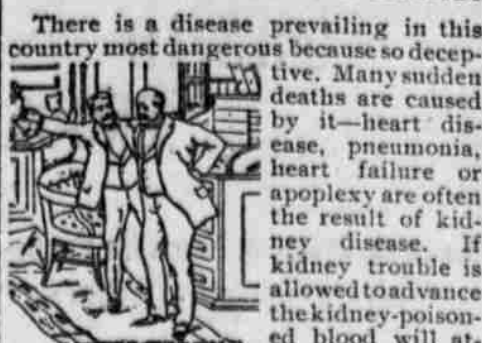
