LUTHER BURBANK

Wizard of the South Does Some Stunts With Plants

The Cherokee Indians claim a close rival to Luther Burbank. The achievements of this heretofore practically unheard of "Plant Wizard" among the Indians are like a romance, but the truth is that immense orchards, flower gardens and vegetables proves his existence among these people for the past 57 years.

David Jagers, an Englishman, is the greatly beloved and highly prized man among the Cherokees. He is now in his eighty-sixth year and has lived among the Indians for 57 years. His experimental station is situated just outside the corporate limits of Collinsville, where he has worked for the past eight years with wonderful success. He formerly lived in the Spavinaw Hills in the eastern part of the Cherokee Nation, and his secret has been closely guarded by his old Indian friends for more than a half century. It was only a few days ago that his 10-acre patch of ground was found to contain numerous strange and curious plants, which, it is believed, entitles him to second place in the world of plant-growing and breeding.

Turnips and Cabbage Crossed.
 Among the number of new vegetables produced by "Uncle David" as the Indians call him, is a perfect cross between an ordinary turnip and a cabbage. He has also an entirely new variety of onion, very much larger than the ordinary variety, sweet and perfectly free from the usual "hot" taste. This discovery, or product, has only recently been found by Mr. Jagers to be a perfect onion, to produce which he says has taken him more than twenty years. It was produced from crossing with a wild variety which grow spontaneously along the streams in the early springtime. The wild onion was successfully crossed with the Bermuda onion and recrossed many times with the native onion of this country.

In the "Wizard of Oz Gardens," as the white people call his place, are to be found practically every variety of flower and vegetable. He also owns several long rows of practically every known fruit tree, and vines. Just how well Jager's efforts have been appreciated is shown by the great number of valuable orch-

ards and vineyards to be found throughout the Southwest.

Indians Learned Readily.
 C. A. McNabb, secretary of the Oklahoma board of agriculture, who is an expert orchardist, said on a recent visit, that the Cherokee Indians were a revelation to him. He expressed the opinion that within five years these people would be in a position to teach their "pale face" brothers the art of peach, pear and apple growing.

Discussing the Cherokees and their assistance in his work of scientific plant culture, Mr. Jagers said:

"When I came among these people in 1850 they were very friendly and fully alive to their own interests. They became interested in my work from the start, and I have always found them ready and willing to provide the necessary funds with which to carry on my experiments. They at first regarded me with suspicion, and some of them even believe that I was a sort of conjurer, but they soon learned that I was working for their welfare."

"The combination turnip and cabbage is the result of nearly 25 years' careful study, and much labor. Had it not been for a few bad boys the world would still be in ignorance of the vegetable. The boys climbed over my high board fence, and in the darkness, took several and sold them to Mrs. White, proprietor of the Hotel London. The traveling men said the combination was a most delicious dish, and they told several newspaper men about it. This is how I learned that the boys had entered my garden at night, and how the public knew of my success in this line."

Wisconsin's 2-Cent Fare Bill.

Wilwaukee, Wis., Aug. 14.—Wisconsin's two-cent passenger fare bill passed by the legislature and signed by Governor Davidson last month in spite of a deluge of protests from politicians and others, becomes effective tomorrow. The rate to be established by the legislative enactment applies to roads earning \$3,500 or more per mile per annum. Nine roads are affected, including the Chicago & Northwestern, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, the Chicago, Burlington &

There are three important lines in Wisconsin which will not be within the limit. These are the Illinois Central, the Duluth, Shore & Atlantic and the Great Northern. As reported, these earn less than \$3,500 per annum on their lines within the state.

The passenger fare situation will not be greatly changed by the bill, as the great bulk of traffic in the state, has been carried at cents or less per mile, although maximum rate has been 2 1/2 as determined by the commission and acceded to by the roads.

CAUGHT BY HUGE BOULDER

Small Boy At the Dalles Pinned Down By Falling Rocks

A most unusual accident and miraculous escape occurred Saturday evening about 6:45 o'clock and caused much excitement among Dalles people. Elmer, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Bettingen, was a victim and his parents feel that they have much to be thankful for that his life was spared.

With some other boys Elmer had been playing in the ledge of rocks south of J. S. Schenck's residence and climbing out to the edge of the cliff loosened a small rock which allowed a large boulder, weighing about 2800 pounds, to slide down and pin him on an abutting ledge in a sitting position. His legs were hanging in a crevice of the cliff, which would just admit them. Had he been a larger boy his legs would

certainly have been mashed. As it was the rock fell across them in such a position as to hold him, but not crush him.

E. H. French, who lives just across the street, heard the crashing of the rocks and then the screaming of the child. Rushing over he at once concluded the boy was hopelessly injured, but seeing that he could do nothing for him, called to a young man who was with him to hold the child's head and shoulders up while he ran for help. He hastened down and informed Mr. Bettingen and Dr. Reuter and then went to get something to raise the rock with.

In the meantime the neighborhood was all excitement and a large crowd gathered. After investigating his situation it was readily seen that a false move would precipitate the boulder on the child and crush him, and at length some one suggested that Louie Comini was the only man who could move it. He was summoned and brought Jack screws with him; but on determining the boy's perilous position saw he must use his derrick. This was hauled up the hill, placed in position and the chains fully adjusted, for a quarter of an inch off meant death to the child. When Comini had everything ready he reassured Elmer and soon the huge rock began to move while the crowd looked on breathlessly.

"Oh its moving!" said the boy, who had been very brave considering the frightful position in which he had been for over an hour, calling for his mother once or twice, but being reassured when she appeared. When the weight was lifted he was carried to his father, whose anxiety as he stood by may only be imagined. To their surprise when they reached home in the automobile and examined him for injuries, they found no bones broken and only bad bruises on his legs and shoulders. He will be confined to his bed for a few days.

Words could not express the thanks which the happy parents attempted to convey to Mr. Comini for his careful work in the trying hour also to the young man who held him up during the long suspense.—The Dalles Chronicle.

School Ma'ams May Strike.
