CAYUSE DOES A STUNT

Entered a Vigorous Protest Against Working For Uncle Sam

The ancient literary savant who first wrote "The horse is a noble animal," was not acquainted with all the varieties of the animal. He had never seen a wall-eyed, pigeon-toed, devil-possessed cayuse from the bunch-grass hills of eastern Oregon. If he had, he would have qualified his statement or put the cayuse where he belongs in a class by himself. As a matter of fact the cayuse, properly broke, is a dandy little animal, tough as leather, and dead game. When he is good he is very good, but when he is bad he is utterly careless and goes the limit. No tougher bunch of meat and muscle was ever crowded into the same amount of horsehide than is the case with the bunch-grasses; but the concentrated spirit of cussedness is also born in them, and it takes time and patience to educate it out.

A short time ago Percy Pugh, the rural mail carrier, learning a band of genuine cayuses had been brought over the mountains and were for sale here, became suddenly possessed of the idea that one of these wiry little roamers of the "breaks of the John Day" would make a splendid motive power for his mail cart. Moved by this idea, he visited the corral and when he left it, he was the owner of a flea-bitten roan, with a mane like the tail of a sluice way, and a tail like a pirates black flag. Tuesday afternoon Percy concluded to give Boanerges his first lesson in behavior. The cayuse, after much patience and some really oriental strategy, was harnessed and hitched to a cart. As a precautionary measure, a spring line was run through the hame rings and one end fastened to a strap around Boanerges' right fore fetlock, the other end being carried aft and made fast to the spanker cavil, so to speak. This was done, so that should "Bony" start to run, a pull on the spring line would take a reef in his leg, so that it wouldn't reach the ground any more, and so handicap him for running. A stern line was also run out to windward and a friend of Percy's induced to hold the end of it, so as to keep the animal from swinging in to the door yards. This all happened down on Chemeketa street. When preparations were complete, Percy mounted the cart and gave the engineer the signal to go ahead, but the engineer evidently took it for two bells and began to back. His star-board aft leg got afoul of the spring line, and the cayuse began to do some ground and lofty tumbling that would make a circus horse look like a "hobby." He turned back hand-springs three or four in succession and danced the hoola hoola; then he stood on his head, and done some trapeze acts, all the time winding himself up in the guy ropes until finally he was drawn back so far that after one of his lunges he came down squarely on the cart, landing a sitting on the seat. Percy saw him coming, and merely remarking well "if you're going to get in, I'm going to get out," did so.

For a few minutes it was an even game between the cart and horse but finally the cayuse having got all his feet mixed up with everything loose about the rigging lay bound as it were, with the cart on top of him. By-standers sat on Boanerges' head while the job of unraveling and untangling was gone through with. When this was completed, or supposed to be, the men got off the cayuse's head and he struggled to his feet. It seems, though that a hold-back strap or something was overlooked, and still connected Bony with the cart. As soon as the cayuse discovered this trouble commenced again. He broke loose from those holding him and away he went kicking at every jump and jumping at every kick, with the cart sometimes on earth and sometimes in the air, but all the time yielding its component parts until there was nothing left of it but the hubs and tires. When the horse was caught again, there wasn't enough left of the harness to wad a shot gun. Percy is going to hitch him up again as he says he is the most interesting study excepting a cyclone, that ever came to his notice.

IT WILL SOON BE CIRCUS DAY

RIVAL SENATORS IN TOWN

Frederick W. Mulkey Pursues a Mysterious Gumshoe Campaign At the Heels of Senator Fulton—Latter Will Spend No Money On Election

Frederick W. Mulkey of Portland arrived in the city Tuesday, but mysteriously disappeared and has not been seen since in the customary haunts of public men and politicians. Last night Senator Charles W. Fulton arrived on the late train, and registered with his rival at the Willamette hotel. He too slid out early to see his trusted friends. To a Capital Journal reporter he admitted after a tour of eastern and Southern Oregon that his fences were in fair order, and that he welcomed competition from other candidates. "It is an open field, and the more candidates the merrier. If I have not conducted myself so as to warrant the people in giving me a second term, I have not attended to their public business in a way to commend me to their favorable consideration, I ought not to be Senator from Oregon and have no claims upon the office. The people of Oregon are entitled to the best and the best man in the party is none too good to serve a great state like ours. My chances I consider very good for succeeding myself, and after seeing as many of the people as possible, I shall leave it to them. There will be no barrel campaign on my part. I was chosen the other time against all kinds of money influences and used no money myself to influence a single vote, not even so much as buying a cigar for a member of the legislature, and I have no money to make this campaign with in the sense of any more than paying my personal expenses to get around and see the people." Senator Fulton was busy all day seeing his personal friends and met a great many of them considering that he slipped into the city entirely unannounced. There is a pretty strong sentiment in favor of not breaking up the present delegation in Washington, and it is the belief even of those opposed to Fulton that he will be the nominee and can be elected against anyone the Democrats put up.
