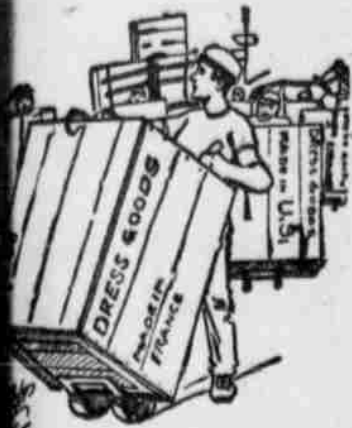

Overlooking Each Other's Faults.

A certain dismay has been caused in French official circles at the carping spirit displayed by some organs of the British press, toward France at this moment. A distinguished diplomat has just made the remark to me: "Certain of the British papers are unconsciously playing into the hands of the enemy in their method of criticizing French politics. If this tone continues it is likely to create a breach in the entente. It is already interpreted in Germany as weakening of Franco-English friendship. German influence is very strong, and sometimes it springs up in unexpected quarters."

"I am aware that public opinion in England has been shocked by events in the Midi and by mutinous incidents in the army. At the same time I would ask you to notice how guarded the French press was in commenting on the events in Egypt and India. With one or two insignificant exceptions there was nothing printed at all unfavorable to England. I assure you that criticism of the sort we have read during the past few days has a damaging effect upon the interests of the two peoples. The entente cordiale is a 'menage'; you must not look too closely at the faults of your partner in life."

"That is the way to be happy though politically married?"
"Precisely. When you are married you must have a little faith. It is so in political affairs. It is, of course, very unfortunate and alarming that incidents such as the revolt of the

Seventeenth Regiment should have occurred in the army, but they are only local and should not be exaggerated. Moreover, have not other nations had incidents of the kind? Did not the crew of a British cruiser mutiny last year because of the quality of the soup on board? And have we not seen insubordination in the Italian troops?"

None can deny that at the present moment the foreign policy of France is extremely brilliant and successful. There has never been a time in her history when she has been strengthened and surrounded with such admirable accords. It may be said that M. Clemenceau has diverted some of the attention which he would otherwise have bestowed upon the complications in the south in helping to build up collateral instruments of the entente cordiale. This policy, which was inaugurated by M. Combes, to his lasting credit, has been admirably continued by M. Clemenceau. It is for this reason that the present head of the French government is entitled to the sympathy of Englishmen.—Paris correspondence of London Pall Mall.

Friends of the Farmer.

A pamphlet issued by the Department of Agriculture, Biological Survey, protests against the deep-rooted hatred displayed by farmers and sportsmen against hawks and owls. It is pointed out that only a few species of hawks and owls attack poultry, and that the vast majority of these birds are really friends of the farmer, in that they search for voracious rodents which destroy alike grain, produce, young trees and eggs of birds. The birds of prey, the majority of which labor day and night to destroy the enemies of the husbandman, are persecuted unceasingly, while that most destructive mammal, the house cat, is petted and fed and securely sheltered to spread destruction among the feathered tribe. The difference between the two can be summed up in a few words—only three or four birds of prey hunt birds when they can procure rodents for food, while the cat seldom touches mice if she can procure birds or young poultry. A cat has been known to kill twenty young chickens in a day, which is more than most rapacious birds destroy in a lifetime.

The rapacious birds breed slowly, rearing only one brood a year, though if the first set of eggs is destroyed another will be laid. The young grow slowly and need a relatively large amount of food. To satisfy their hunger requires con-

stant foraging on the part of the parents, and the strain of rearing the family is probably twice that of any of the other land birds. Even the adults are large eaters, gorging to the utmost when the opportunity presents; and as digestion is very rapid and assimilation perfect, a great quantity of food in relation to the body weight is consumed every day.

Hawks and owls are complementary to each other. While hawks hunt by day and keep diurnal mammals in check, owls, whose eyesight is keenest during twilight and before dawn, capture nocturnal species. Again, owls are less migratory than hawks, and during the long winter remain in the land of ice and snow to wage incessant warfare against the enemies of the orchard, garden and harvest field.

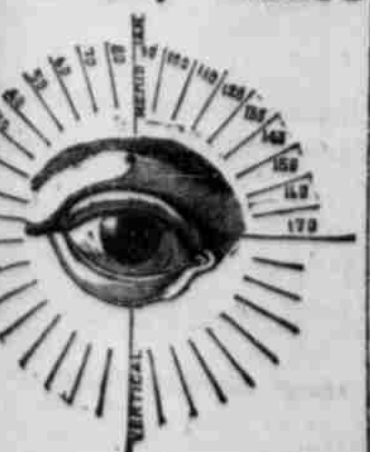
