Troubled With Beaver—

SWELL ELEGANT JONES

Ezra Kendalls Latest and Greatest Humorous Creation

It has been said of Ezra Kendall, who is coming here Wednesday, Aug. 21, under the management of the Harry Askin Company, that he has

been the creator of more laughs than any humorist on the stage today. This statement seems to be born out by his own record as a monologist and at the head of companies. Provided this year with a new company of a rich Kendall type Mr. Kendall in "Swell Elegant Jones" has added new success to his laugh-making career for there has been woven into the piece the essence of humor at which he is best.

As a monologist Mr. Kendall scattered humor from coast to coast, and he has combined in his present role the humor which won him the leadership in other fields. The lines are of the crisp, terse, meaty sort that enabled him to stand alone before an audience and keep the people laughing, and Kendall, the monologist, is seen in his happiest vein as Kendall, the humorist.

"Swell Elegant Jones" has much of that vital humor running through out that springs from the village and cross roads, and while providing a fitting vehicle for Mr. Kendall has been the prime object, there has been preserved a coherent and interesting story with a lot of human interest running through it.
