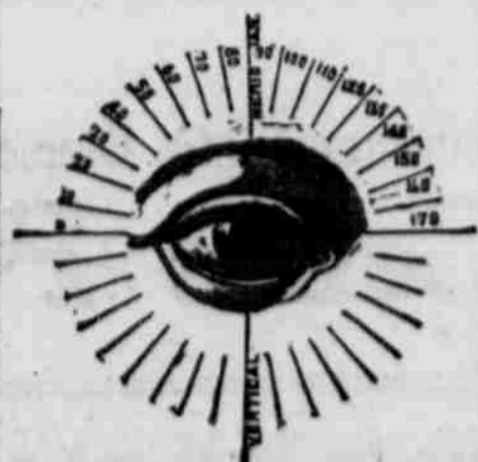

BACK TO STATE OF NATURE

Los Angeles Graves Desecrated and Kids Run Naked Among the Tombs

By personal investigation Mayor Harper of Los Angeles has found out that there has been ghastly desecration in the old Fort Hill cemetery back of the high school in that city. "It is worse than I imagined," said the mayor, after he had viewed vaults which had been broken into by vandals. Many of the graves contain the remains of men and women who took a prominent part in the making of the early history of Los Angeles. There are trenches around some vaults, dug by treasure hunters, who sought for valuables reported to have been buried with some of the bodies half a century ago. The mayor inspected the mausoleum of Robert S. Carlisle, which has been forced open by ghouls. He found the whole front part of the head had been carried away.

The devils who broke into the vault knew that Carlisle was buried with diamonds in his teeth," said Jerry Remsen, the guard who had induced the mayor to see for himself the shocking sight of the casket. "I knew Carlisle well," said the mayor.

"When I was a boy he was one of the big men of the city. I remember he had diamonds settings in his teeth. He was killed in a gun fight. He received a bullet in the heart. He fell to the ground, raised himself slightly, leveled his pistol across his arm and killed his assailant; then he dropped back dead."

The old cemetery is in a terrible state of neglect. "It seems a crime to find it in such condition as this," the mayor went on. "It is 20 years since I last stood in this old burying ground."

Complaints have been made to the mayor that it is a rash disregard for human life to permit bodies to remain in the cemetery, surrounded as it is by the high school buildings. Guard Remsen says the boys have been in the habit of playing among the old graves.

"They got to running naked among the graves, but we stopped that," he said.

"The skunks!" exclaimed the mayor in disgust. "The girls came next," went on Remsen. "Pretty soon they were running naked among the graves too."

"What's that?" asked the mayor aghast.

"Well, they wore those little blouses and pants, you know," the watchman explained, "but that's pretty near naked for a girl."

The mayor gave a sigh of relief. "I guess that wasn't so very bad," he said. "They are not likely to desecrate the graves."

Remsen showed the mayor a plot containing two graves which he had to guard almost nightly because of a rumor that they contained treasure. Mayor Harper read the names on the tombstones and smiled.

"Old man Wilson and his wife are buried there," he remarked. "They left no treasure. I remember when they died. It took the whole estate to pay for that lot and the stones."

Remsen related a number of instances where two bodies have been found in one grave, gruesome evidence of the religious fanaticism of 50 years ago. Sometimes a body would be buried in the Roman Catholic cemetery half a mile from Fort Hill. A Protestant relative of the deceased would remove the body during the night and bury it among those of the Protestant faith. In order that the act might not be revealed by the presence of a fresh grave, the body would be placed in a tomb where another lay buried.

The mayor is planning to make the old cemetery into a public park.

DOZEN COURT DECISIONS

Six Decisions of Lower Courts Reversed and a Motion to Dismiss Allowed--Remington of Woodburn Must Serve Term

State vs. Remington, appellant; appeal from Burnett; Marion county; affirmed by Moore, J. This is the case of the shooting of Slaughter by Remington.

Wm. Scott vs. White and Trowbridge, appellants; appeal from Hanna, Jackson county; reversed by Slater, J.

R. L. Davidson vs. Columbia Timber Co., appellant; appeal from Judge McBride, Columbia county. Motion to dismiss appeal allowed per curiam.

Mollie Wolf, administratrix Isaac Wolf, vs. City and Suburban Railway Co., appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; affirmed by Moore, J.

In the Mollie Wolf suit vs. the Suburban Railway Co., a jury first gave her a verdict for \$500 for killing her father. The corporation appealed and got a new trial. The jury gave her the limit at that time, \$5000, and that verdict is affirmed.

Geo. H. Williams and H. C. Leonard vs. Commercial National Bank of Portland and Wells-Fargo Co., appellants; appeal from Sears; rehearing denied by Eakin, J.

August Krause vs. Oregon Iron and Steel Co., appellant; appeal from McBride, Clackamas county; affirmed Eakin, J.

A. R. Oliver, et al., appellants, vs. City of Newberg; appeal from Gallopway, Yamhill county; affirmed by Eakin, J.

State vs. Henry Carmody; appeal from Burnett, Marion county; affirmed by Bean, J. Second conviction of same party reversed by same justice.

State vs. T. J. Luper, appellant; from Burnett, Marion county, reversed. This is a case of a man charged with committing perjury in suit for divorce. Another suit is pending in which Mrs. Luper asks for divorce because Luper perjured himself.

Jacob Kan, appellant, vs. Alex. and Fred Normand; appeal from McBride, Clatsop county; reversed by Bean, C. J.

Lowengood vs. McGees; appeal from Hamilton, Douglas county; reversed by Slater.

The court adjourned to meet at noon next Tuesday, when important matters are to be decided.
