CITY COUNCIL GRINDS

ACTION ON BRIDGE

Goes Over--Council Meets Again This Evening--Annex Saloon Gets Its New Location--Welch Franchise Has Many Amendments

Messrs. Bayne, Churchill, Downing, Haas, Fraser, Gesner, Greenbaum, Radcliff, Jacob, Stockton, Stolz, Waldo and the mayor were present. Goode and Low were absent.

No Time Saved.

To save time an effort was made to avoid reading minutes. Mr. Greenbaum moved to dispense with reading minutes. Gesner objected and the recorder was compelled to read 16 pages of civic records.

Mr. Bayne sprung a new one by moving to "amend" the minutes in several respects. The mayor ruled this out of order. But Mr. Bayne did get his appeal from a ruling of the mayor entered on the minutes.

The ordinance committee recommended that the names of part of Broadway be changed to High, and Old County Road to Broadway. Report adopted.

Saving Public Time.

The city council refuses to suspend the rule requiring all its highly-elaborated minutes and proceedings to be read in full. Monday night's reading took half an hour and there was no correction offered.

There is much time lost in cumbering the records with what the rules require to be entered in full. What sense is there in spreading upon the minutes and reading verbatim several times the long-winded resolutions that some member sees fit to offer?

The legislature thinks nothing of suspending the reading of its minutes, but it seems the city council cannot think of taking any such chances.

Business who have confidence in their recording officer could well trust that gentleman to keep the records, and not take half an hour to read what has in substance been published in all the newspapers.

Some Bills Allowed.

Mr. Churchill moved that bill of the General Constructing company of \$250 for deepening channel of North Mill creek be allowed. Carried.

Bill of H. C. Tillman for \$256.50 was reported back without recommendation. Mr. Greenbaum moved it be paid. Stolz moved that pay be reduced for \$7 per day to \$5 per day. Mr. Gesner said Mr. Chase was paid \$10 per day and what was right for one was for another. Mr. Radcliff said he was opposed to paying more than \$5 per day. Mr. Jacobs said surveying bills were paid last month amounting to \$395. Mr. Tillman had completed surveys of 56 blocks, or eight or ten times as much work as was done by the \$5 a day surveyors. Tillman's bill was a just one. Mr. Stockton said the new street committee had no right to audit a bill of this kind at \$7 a day. A large amount of money had been spent in North Salem and not a shovelful of dirt had been thrown. Mr. Downing said the old street committee had paid Mr. Chase \$10 a day because he was worth it. The amendment to reduce compensation to \$5 a day and \$2.50 for helpers was then carried and the bill allowed at that rate.

From License Committee.

Mr. Waldo and Mr. Downing reported favorably on application of Standard Liquor company for change of location of Annex saloon license from Court street to Commercial street. Mr. Bayne offered minority report and moved that it be substituted for majority report. Mr. Downing stated there were nine in the block for granting the request for a change and six opposed. Mr. Churchill said he had found but two persons on the street opposed to granting the request. On rollcall for adopting minority report Bayne, Jacob and Haas voted aye, the rest no. The majority report was then adopted by the same vote. Bayne, Haas and Jacob voting no. The license committee reported in favor of all being signed by bondsmen giving name in full, instead of firm names.

The Bridge Bill.

Mr. Churchill also reported back without recommendation bill of the

General Constructing company for concrete bridge of \$4975. This is balance claimed to be due for North Commercial street bridge. Mr. Bayne moved to table the bill. Lost. Mr. Gesner said no tests had been made or could be made until the tracks of the railroad company were laid down. The construction company was willing to give a bond to refund the money if it was wrongfully paid. At present \$2600 had been paid, and he moved that balance be paid. He admitted the bridge was 18 inches narrower than it should be, but no one was to blame for that. It could not be remedied. This point was reluctantly admitted after a sharp question by Mr. Radcliff. Mr. Downing moved to amend that 75 per cent of the whole claim be allowed. Carried.

Mr. Bayne said there was no report from the bridge committee, and there was a saving of \$600 by building the bridge 18 inches narrower than the contract called for. He moved re-reference to committee on claims. There was a tie vote and the mayor decided it carried. Mr. Stolz moved that committee bring in a written report at next meeting.

Bridge committee reported that contract of Capital Improvement company had been complied with and asked that bill for same be allowed.

The North Bridge Again.

Letter from Manager Page relating bridge was read. Placed on file.

Mr. Downing moved that street to crossing North Commercial street railway company be allowed to have temporary use of bridge.

Mr. Greenbaum said it was very important to have the cars run through to the fairgrounds.

Mr. Bayne said it would be unwise to allow them to cross the bridge, as it would be equal to an acceptance.

Mr. Fraser said there was no way to allow such use without accepting the bridge.

Mr. Jacob was opposed to the street cars running across that little narrow bridge. It was a bungle and they were acting like children.

Downing said there was no way to test the bridge unless the cars were run over it.

Mr. Gesner moved that if construction company release city from constructive acceptance of the bridge the street car line be allowed to cross the bridge.

Mr. Stolz said the city must accept that bridge at some time, but it should not be delayed too long.

Mr. Bayne said as long as the city had no property in the bridge it could not grant any privileges over it even temporary.

Mr. Fraser said he was in favor of accepting the bridge as soon as they could frame a report. They would be ready Tuesday.

Stockton moved to refer to bridge committee with instruction to report Tuesday evening. Carried.

Mr. Fraser moved that railings be erected on fills and approaches to said bridge.

Mr. Downing of street committee reported that deed for vacation of street by Mr. Stapleton in North Salem be accepted.

The Welch Franchise.

A. Gesner of special committee on franchise of A. Welch for electric railway, reported several amendments and that same be granted. The matter of the franchise and report was on motion referred back to committee.

City Health Good.

City Health Officer Smith reported 11 births and 8 deaths, and general health of city excellent. Following resolutions adopted:

That eight feet strip of General Electric company on State street be advertised to be improved as per resolution of Mr. Gesner.

That 12 feet of Southern Pacific on Twelfth street be advertised to be improved as per resolution of Mr. Gesner.

Petition for electric light at corner of Second and B street. Pleasant Home addition referred to light committee.

Petition for sidewalk on west side of Second street in Pleasant Home addition. To street committee.

A bill for an ordinance to open Chemeketa street through property of Mrs. Nancy Clark was read twice and referred to committee on ordinances.

Bill to establish grade of Pine street, read twice. Same reference.

Will Observe Labor Day--

At a meeting of the carpenters' union of this city a committee was appointed to confer with the printers' and cigar makers' unions and arrange a program for the formal observance of Labor Day at Salem, September 2d.
