MRS. FISH IN SWIM

light over Mrs. Vanderbilt's severe snubbing.

The true inwardness of the story is told in the following press dispatch from Newport:

Bitter Social War at Newport.

Newport, R. I. Aug. 22.—One of the bitterest social wars in the history of Newport culminated today with the arrival of Prince Wilhelm of Sweden, the scion of European royalty for whose entertainment the social leaders of the city have been pulling wires for many weeks. Victory is perched on the banner of Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish, and her success has won for her the proud title of queen of social Newport. Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt and Mrs. Ogden Goelet will have no part in the entertainment of the prince, and so have lost their place on the throne from which they once ruled their subservient subjects of the "Four Hundred." In a word, Mrs. Fish is IT, and Mrs. Ogden Mills and Mrs. Edward J. Berwind will share the honors with her.

In the victory of Mrs. Fish the wise ones of Newport see a connection with the Fish-Harriman railroad controversy, and some there are who insinuate that men in high places were responsible for the decision of Baron Lagercrantz, Swedish minister to the United States, in selecting Mrs. Fish for the honor of chief entertainer to his royal highness.

As Cornelius Vanderbilt stood with Harriman, Mrs. Vanderbilt was denied access to the royal presence, say the wiseacres; and as Mrs. Goelet is so unfortunate as to be Mrs. Vanderbilt's sister, she also must share in the great taboo.

According to popular rumor now percolating through Newport, the inclusion of Newport in the itinerary of Prince Wilhelm was an after thought managed only after an energetic campaign of Newport society women. It is stated, too, that a well known—not to say famous—public man pleaded the cause of those who now have the undivided honor of receiving the prince.

When the Grand Duke Boris visited these shores four years ago Mrs. Vanderbilt and Mrs. Goelet led in entertaining him, as they have on the occasion of the visit here of every other titled foreigner of note in years. It is also significant that Mrs. Robert Goelet, who has been presented at court in Sweden and is acquainted with the royal family from her frequent visit to the Swedish coast, is denied the royal presence. Much influence must have been brought to bear to produce this result, runs the gossip, and facts apparently bear out dame rumor. That Mrs. Goelet's son, Robert W. Goelet, also stood with Harriman in the Illinois Central episode may explain many things.

The visit of a titled foreigner to Newport, with the Vanderbilt and Goelet "cottages" closed to his entertainment, is a thing unprecedented and unique in the social annals of the United States. Thought of it will bring secret joy to the hearts of certain hostesses of the ultra-exclusive set, who remember how they were vanquished when Mrs. Vanderbilt gave a brilliant dinner to Prince Henry of Prussia when that royal personage visited Newport.

To render the situation more complicated, from a social standpoint, and to accentuate the victory of Mrs. Fish, the stay of the prince will occupy three days, instead of the full week provided for in the original arrangements. The largest and most important affair in his honor will be the dinner and dance to be given tonight by Mrs. Fish and Mrs. Berwind. The manner of the entertainment is novel, even in Newport, whose blase social leaders have come to believe that there is nothing new under the sun. The dinner is to take place at the Crossways, Mrs. Fish's villa, and then the company will go to the Elms, Mrs. Berwind's cottage, for the dance. The two affairs, although one is to follow the other immediately, will be as distinct as they can be made. Mrs. Fish will be the sole hostess at the Crossways and Mrs. Berwind will retain her honors unshared at the ball.

The Fish home is an ideal place for a dinner, for through the long windows come breezes direct from the sea, while the Elms, elegant and stately, lends itself to the requirements of a ball better than any other of Newport's homes.

Tomorrow the prince will devote to sightseeing about the city, with a visit to the Casino, the golf club and other social organizations. In the evening Mrs. Ogden Mills will give a second dinner in his honor.

On Saturday afternoon Mrs. Richard Gambrill will give a garden party at her Belleville avenue residence. In the evening the prince will return

Swedish navy, on which he is making his tour of the American Atlantic coast. On Sunday Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish will for the second time come into the limelight by giving a farewell luncheon to the prince at the Crossways. Later in the day the prince will sail on the Fylgia for Boston.
