ROB ALASKAN MAILS.
Thieves Make Third Big Haul Within a Month.

Seattle, Aug. 22.—A Fairbanks, Alaska, special says: What is believed to be the biggest plot for robbing the United States mails ever discovered is now in operation in Alaska. Only yesterday word was received from the coast that the third pouch missing in a month had been reported at Skagway. The sack contained \$45,000 in gold dust addressed to Seattle banks.

Postoffice inspectors already in the North working on the two former robberies, have taken up the latest loss. It is almost certain that the sacks were stolen while in transit on the Yukon river boats plying between this point and Dawson. Several men are under suspicion, but no arrests have been made. Reliable clues are scarce.

Ever since gold dust shippers have decided to use the mails for sending out their metal, instead of patronizing the express companies, as they previously did, because of the increased tariff, the present trouble has existed. It will necessitate the employment of guards by the government to watch the gold shipments. As they have been practically unguarded up to late, robberies have been easy, and it is believed that the thefts have resulted from systematic operations of bandits working with well-laid plans.

WORK AT POST-OFFICE

The columns for the new arc lights were taken to the postoffice grounds today, and excavations were made preparatory to installing them. The holes are six feet deep. These will be filled with concrete, into which the iron columns will be placed. An arch of fancy iron work will be placed on the summit of the columns to which the lamps will be hung. The wires will be under ground from wires on Court and State streets. The work will be completed in a few days, and the juice turned on, as the underground wires are already laid.

Postmaster Farrar has been working to obtain this improvement for more than a year, and all Salem will be glad that his work has materialized.

The contractors are now replacing the cement in a few places in the concrete, where it has been proved to be defective. Except this the work has been completed for some time, and 90 per cent of the contract price paid. The remaining ten per cent is held until the grass is set, and will be paid over when a good growth is produced. The ground is now becoming green, and this will be only a matter of a short time.

The shrubbery which was planned to have been placed on the grounds is still under consideration by the authorities at Washington.

A COMMON DREAM

Council Reserves the Right to Him Uncommon Dream

The city council is going to after the sobriety of the right, as the following ordinance declares, but it does not seem man should not have to wait for 30 days to accomplish. The ordinance reads:

"That whenever it shall be the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, by petition or otherwise, that any inhabitant of the city is in the habit of being grossly drunk and has been so for a period of one month, the common council shall, by ordinance, declare such person a common drunkard, and shall cause a copy to be given by the city to the bulletin board at the city hall, in said city, said copy to be posted for a period of 30 days. Thereafter it shall not be for any person, within said city, to sell, give or in any manner such drunkard to obtain any spirituous or malt liquors, however, that the common council may revoke such declaration, discretion. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$5, nor than \$100."
