

SEATTLE GOES TO THE CIRCUS

Arrival of Ringlings' Show Made Occasion for General Holiday--Accommodations Not Equal to Demand for Admission and Many Hundreds Fail to See Performance

The Seattle Times has the following concerning the Ringling Brothers' circus, due here next Wednesday:

All over town today the question is asked: "Did you go to the circus? Which act did you like the best? My, but weren't the clowns funny?"

Circus day in Seattle is always a holiday. Yesterday morning long before the time set for the parade, crowds thronged the streets, and all of them were in a jovial mood and very orderly. At the appointed time for the circus parade to arrive both First and Second avenues were crowded to their utmost. Windows in all of the buildings were reserved for friend of the occupants. Every point of vantage was taken and some men were seated on top of telegraph poles.

When the parade was over it was then time for the small boy to follow it to the circus grounds and if possible to get a job carrying water to the elephants. Early in the afternoon people streamed to the circus grounds. If possible to get, had children with them. In some cases they borrowed children to take to the circus so as to be able to say:

"Oh, yes, the children wanted to see it, so I took them."

On entering the main entrance of the big show the first thing one encounters is the peanut stand; after that comes the animals, and a finer collection of them has never been seen upon this coast. The cages are full, and include a great variety. The only giraffe that has been able to cross the mountains without getting a sore throat and dying of tonsillitis is the one belonging to the Ringling Brothers. Lions, tigers, pumas and, it would seem, everything that bites or scratches is owned by the show.

After the animals comes the stadium, where the big acts take place. Before the circus proper starts Albert Sweet and his band entertain the crowd. Promptly at 2 o'clock and at 8:15 o'clock trumpets are heard and off to the left of the grandstand glittering colors are seen and the circus starts. As the rubber-minded press agent says: "Never before has there been seen such a prodigious display of spectacular interest, combining the beautiful tones of luxurious fabrics and royal trappings, with the noble men and women of the picturesque days and deeds of romantic history," etc. The grand opening is over and the main show starts.

The Kauffman troupe of bicyclists were amazing. Yes, the man walked down stairs on his head and seemed to enjoy it. The elephants were "cute," so one young lady described it, but the trained pigs—those pigs had everyone guessing, and people were high into hysterics when they concluded their act with the "chute the chutes." The horse went to bed gracefully, naturally, and without hesitation. The rest of the horse family were well received also.

The burlesque bull fight was undoubtedly the funniest thing in the show. A donkey wearing horns of a bull, and two clowns, were responsible for the mirth and hysterics of the people. So on down the line everything went with a rush, and the

only criticism that can be made of the show was that it was too good and too big.

Long before the show opened the ticket wagon had closed its doors and no more people were admitted, only those having reserved tickets. At least 3000 persons were refused admittance to the big show. Those falling to get into the stadium took advantage of the side shows, all of which were well patronized.

After the main show was over the concert started. Many persons to avoid the rush to the street cars, stayed to the "vawdyveel," which was declared to be the "finest ever seen upon any stage in the world." Well, anyhow, it amused the people until the cars were less crowded.

This afternoon the performance was given again, and tonight the last performance will be given. Those desiring to gain admittance to the big tent had better go early or they will be refused admission, as was done last night to many persons who were willing to pay double the price to see the show.

Before the last act is over tonight nearly half of the circus will be well on its way to Tacoma, and shortly after the show closes tonight nothing of Ringling Brothers' World's Greatest Shows will be left in Seattle with the exception of the pleasant memories that it leaves in the minds of those who patronize it.

WANT A LIBRARY.

Y. W. C. A. to Look After the Hop Pickers.

A letter was yesterday received by the library commission, asking for a traveling library to be used at Krebs Bros.' hop yards, near Independence during the picking season.

These yards this year will be in charge of the Portland Y. W. C. A. More than 500 women and children will be employed in these hop yards this year, and the housing and feeding them always presents a serious problem to the management. The actual picking done will not be in charge of the Portland Institution, but everything else will be. The eating house and the women's quarters will be cared for by representatives of the association, and will be run in the best manner possible for the physical and moral well-being of the workers. Besides a waiting tent, a reading tent, with magazines and good literature will be established, and it is for this that the traveling library is required. The association is also contemplating establishing a gospel tent.

It is hoped that by this means the surroundings of the hop pickers will be beneficial, rather than otherwise, and that the harmful influences that have been notorious in the larger yards will be to a great degree eliminated. Several crimes committed in the hop yards last year have awakened the people on this matter, and the experiment will be watched with interest. Portland Y. W. C. A. have already done excellent work along other lines, and it would be difficult to think of any body more fitted to take charge of this work.

The request was received yesterday, and will be complied with at the earliest opportunity.

PREPARING FOR WINTER.

Klinger Grand Getting Ready for a Lively Theatrical Season.

It seems that Salem is to have a good stock show this winter. At least Jack Cooper has promised us one after September 1st, and by the improvements that are being made at the Klinger Grand it seems that the emenagement are prapring for something decidedly better than is accustomed to be produced at that theatre. The plays will be given by traveling shows on Tabor & Company's circuit, instead of a permanent stock company, as was the case last season. This insures a much better quality of plays, and a much better production of the plays given. With a permanent company the actors are compelled to learn a large number of plays, to produce a new one once or twice a week, and cannot be expected to be proficient in any particular one. Under the other system each company is employed altogether in three or four plays, and only stays a short time, perhaps one or two weeks in each town.

The stage has been made two feet wider, and extended several feet outward. A large quantity of new scenery has been ordered and the wiring completely renovated. The theatre has been painted on the outside, and now presents a very attractive appearance.

It Is Made In Salem and Rivals the Best Italian Product

The Oregon Sienna Paint Company, on Trade street, is adding machinery to its equipment, which will more than double its output. This company has been in existence less than a year, and machinery was added only a few months ago that increased the output materially. The management say that still further improvements will be made before the end of the year, so it is difficult to estimate the proportions that the industry will eventually attain. The new mixer has just arrived, but has not yet been put in place. It has a much greater capacity than any at present in use, and is of the most modern make. It will be installed on the second floor, with the machinery necessary to carry the raw material up to it, and pour them in their proper proportion into the machine.

Besides this several new tanks, with a capacity of over 100 gallons each are to be placed on the ground floor.

This new and rapidly growing industry is made possible by the valuable deposits of paint-bearing ores on the company's grounds near Cottage Grove.

Most of the sienna used in America is shipped from Italy, and is now shipped in large quantities to America and other places all over the world. The Oregon product shows practically the same composition as the Italian. It contains over 30 per cent of iron and aluminum oxide, and stands practical tests as well as any known. The finished paint is put up in 42 beautiful tints, which are very popular.

The company found, several weeks ago, a fine deposit of sky blue ochre, which will in the near future be employed exclusively for making paints of this color, if it stands the test of experiment. Half a carload of it will be shipped to Salem at once, along with a large shipment of other colors. The company does not intend to injure its reputation gained by the superior quality of its material by mixing it with inferior ingredients. Only the best quality of lead and linseed oil are used, and they are ground and mixed with the best modern machinery.

Until lately the product of the factory has been used largely only by local consumers, and many houses in Salem have been painted with this home product. But lately the surrounding towns have discovered the superior quality of the product, and orders are being received which will tax the full capacity of the plant. Orders have been lately received from Portland and Puget Sound firms, and the extra equipment of the plant has come none too early to meet the growing demand. The bridge across the Willamette at Salem is now being painted with "home grown sienna," and two casks were ordered by the painters for this work.

Some of the buildings on the fair grounds are being painted with this sienna paint, and will thus be a standing exhibit of the resources of the state, and the growth of the industries of Salem.

D., as the officials of Wells-Fargo's Express Company refuse to receive any such shipments. For this reason the company is forbidden, after September, handling any liquor shipments C. O. D. The company will, of course, continue to carry liquors by express and to collect the regular freight but never C. O. D.

Manager Deckebach, of the brewery, was seen, and he said his concern will at once conform to the new ruling of the express company as they believe in strict conformity with all public regulations. They already sending out to all of their customers notices of the new ruling, and while they have a heavy C. O. D. business, they expect to overcome the loss of this business by co-operation and compliance with the new conditions.
