

MEXICAN CRUDE SUGAR

panocha, panela and piloncillo are made of crude unrefined sugar made by primitive methods, somewhat similar to those used by the maples in the United States—namely, by boiling the cane juice until it reaches a sirupy consistency, evaporating this residue over a fire, and pouring it into molds and allowing it to harden. No clarifying or refining process is made use of in the way.

The name given the resulting crude sugar is usually determined by its form, size and weight. It is known as panocha when molded into a plate, each cake weighing about one kilo, and piloncillo when it is a cylindrical and conical form of weight varying from five to ten pounds.

The production of asbestos in the United States in 1906 was 1695 tons valued at \$28,565, as against 3109 tons valued at \$42,875 in 1907. The imports were valued at \$1,076,170.

The output of all existing asbestos mines is insufficient to supply the demand for this product, and the leading manufacturing firms interested in the industry are diligently searching for new deposits.

An advance chapter from "Mineral Resources of the United States, Calendar Year, 1906," on the production of asbestos in the United States in 1906, by J. S. Diller, of the United States geological survey, is now ready for free distribution.

A Comparison of Customers.

The figures showing the import trade of the east coast of South America for the fiscal year ended with June, 1907, are not yet at hand. There is more than probability that they will reach \$500,000,000, and a fair chance that they will exceed that sum. This includes the foreign purchases of Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay, the area which our mail reaches by the way of Europe and to which our merchandise goes by slow freighters unless shipped via England. Only about 11 per cent of that business came to us.

The population of these vast and sparsely settled countries is less than half that of overcrowded Japan, yet they buy \$500,000,000, while Japan buys \$200,000,000. Measured by the class of merchandise purchased, the east coast of South America is a far more desirable market than is Japan. It buys finished products, cotton cloth, railway equipment, hardware, agricultural implements building material, household goods, and all the hundreds of articles needed and used in countries of rapid industrial growth and social development.

Japan's principal purchases are foodstuffs and raw materials. As Japan develops her industrial forces her purchases will consist in increasing percentage of raw materials for conversion into finished products, which she will place in eastern markets in competition with the products of our mills and factories.

As Brazil and Argentina and Uruguay grow they will need more cotton cloth, more woolen goods, more rails and locomotives and bridges, more hardware and electrical goods, more glassware and household utensils more of that endless list of things that we make for ourselves and want to sell to other people.

Within a few years the purchases of that region will reach \$1,000,000,000 a year. If we continue our present policy we shall secure perhaps 12 or 13 per cent of that and see the remainder go out from Europe, because Europe has mail and steamer service and we have none that is worthy of being called service.

Hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of trade now gets away from us, and twice as much will get away from us a few years from now, mainly because of a mail and steamer service which puts the European merchant from four to six weeks ahead of our own.

We cannot sell all the goods those countries buy, but a fair and business-like attention to the establishment of a respectable system of postal and commercial communication will give us at least a decent share of their trade. Our present policy costs us millions every year.—New York Sun.
