Says Anarchy Is Increasing.
Chicago, Aug. 29.—Emma Goldman, in a speech at the anarchist congress, severely criticized American laws, saying they are too strict for the proper carrying on of a propaganda. She declared, however, that anarchy was increasing, especially among the Jewish working people.

STORM VISITS FAIR
Des Moines, Ia., Aug. 29.—Damage to the amount of \$100,000 was done the state fair grounds by wind and rain. The Knabenshue airship, the captive balloon, international harvester and other exhibits were destroyed.

SOLDIERS ATTACK CITIZENS DRUNKEN OFFICERS

Wind Up Wild Debauch By Ordering Soldiers to Commit Wholesale Slaughter—Houses Broken Into and Many Are Hurt.

Budapest, Hungary, Aug. 29.—An extraordinary military outrage is reported from Panad, in Transylvania. Officers of the 29th Heuved regiment after a prolonged drinking bout, are accused of ordering the soldiers to organize and massacre the entire population of the village. The men attacked every person found on the streets, and then broke into the houses, attacking scores of persons in their beds. Six are reported fatally wounded, and scores severely hurt.

IRISH HOME RULE HOTEL DESTROYED BY FIRE
Dublin, Aug. 29.—The National Council of the Sinn Fein, of this city, organized to advocate Irish home rule, began its convention today to consider the withdrawal of Irish representatives from Parliament and establishing an Irish parliament in Dublin, without British consent, the revival of the Irish industries and the boycotting of everything English.

NEW YORK TEAMSTERS STRIKE
New York, Aug. 29.—Obeying the order to strike in sympathy with the butchers' teamsters' strike, the strike leaders of the livestock wagons for the big packers quit today. Union officials say the inside men will not be asked to quit. Packers say they are not affected by the strike.

LONG TERMERS ESCAPE
Joliet, Ill., Aug. 29.—Two long-term convicts, both burglars, Edward Quinn and Harry Varmon, who were detailed as nurses in the prison hospital, made ropes of bandages and a scale hook of the iron rungs from a chair, scaled the wall and escaped. They are armed with a bread knife and a steel rod. Twenty guards from a special car are scattered along the tracks leading out, but no trace of them has been found.

Cleveland Very Sick.
New York, Aug. 29.—It is announced that Grover Cleveland has again been attacked by acute indigestion, and has consequently relinquished his ideas of visiting his summer home in New Hampshire. Mrs. Cleveland has returned to Princeton from New Hampshire with their children.

France Will Furnish Troops.
Paris, Aug. 29.—The government has no confirmation of the rumor that the Sultan of Morocco has been assassinated, and also continues ignorant of the real purposes of the sultan's brother, who was recently proclaimed sultan. Premier Clemenceau, however, declared that the French commander at Morocco would be given all the troops necessary to carry out the mission where-with he is charged.

Injuries From Lion's Fangs Prove Fatal.
Pittsburg, Aug. 29.—Mrs. Anna Huske died Tuesday of injuries resulting from an attack by a lion at an amusement resort yesterday. The lion's teeth penetrated a lung and several ribs were broken. The animal was killed.

OFFERS TAYLOR A GUARD
Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 29.—Ex-Governor Taylor, of Kentucky today received a letter from Governor Beckham, offering him a military guard, if he will return and testify in the case of Caleb Powers, accused of the murder of Gobel. Taylor has taken 24 hours to decide, but his friends believe he will refuse to return.

NEVADA WANTS PEACE
Reno, Nev., Aug. 29.—Rev. Leslie M. Burwell, J. T. Taylor, D. R. Williams and I. S. Hall, after spending a night in jail, appeared before Judge Bell and were found guilty of disturbing the peace by holding street meetings. They were sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 each. They will appeal the case to the district court.

Had Writer Arrested.
San Francisco, Aug. 29.—Ex-Chief Dinan today secured a warrant for George Kennan, a writer for McClure's Magazine, on the charge of criminal libel. Kennan wrote an article for September McClure's, in which he accused Dinan of taking certain graft money. Dinan states he will also attempt to have S. S. McClure brought to San Francisco for trial with Kennan.

Bubonic Plague in Frisco.
San Francisco, Aug. 29.—The local board of health vehemently denies the truth of certain sensational stories printed in the East regarding the number of bubonic plague cases in San Francisco since June 18, when the first case was discovered, but nine cases have been developed, of which seven were fatal. There is no occasion for alarm, as every precaution has been taken to prevent its spread, all coasting vessels being examined by quarantine officers.

Murder and Suicide.
Mahoney City, Pa., Aug. 29.—Thos. Lovell, proprietor of the hotel in Grandville, today shot and killed his sister and then committed suicide.

FIRE FOLLOWS FLOOD HUNDREDS BURNED

Eighty Thousand Refugees in Tokio Left Homeless By Terrific Floods in Central Part of the Island of Nippon

Tokio, Aug. 29.—Three hundred lives were lost in Monday's fire at Hakodate, when a building collapsed because the floods had washed out the foundation. Fire spread to the huts of the working people in the vicinity. Nearly 80,000 people within the boundaries of Tokio are homeless as the result of the floods.

Tokio, Aug. 29.—Flood reports continue to be received. A number of railway tunnels have collapsed and many bridges have been damaged. Several days must elapse before traffic is restored to normal conditions. The route of Tokio's food supply is yet obstructed by water, and the fish supply is almost completely stopped.

Tokio, Aug. 29.—Thousands of peasants are destitute and starving in consequence of the floods during the past few days. Rice is higher than ever, and a rice famine is widespread.

In Tokio alone 79,654 people rendered homeless are being cared for by public relief. No doubt many thousands are homeless elsewhere. The entire town of Fukuehijama, near Kioja, was almost completely submerged.

PROFIT IN 2-CENT FARES.
The Receipts of Minnesota Railroads Have Increased.

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 29.—Returns of passenger revenues in Minnesota for May and June, the first two months in which the new 2-cent fare law was in effect, show an increase of one-sixth over the average earnings for any two months in 1906, except in the case of three roads—the Soo, the Minneapolis & St. Louis and the Great Western.

The state commission accepts the figures furnished by the railways as proving that the new law is not confiscatory, and on this showing the state will rest its case as to the 2-cent fare. Affidavits embodying the railways' figures have been secured from attorneys for the stockholders of the road, who are seeking an injunction against the operation of the law.

Affidavits were also filed as to the commodity rate law, showing that it is not unreasonable or confiscatory. These are more complicated but in their summary show that the average rate a ton a mile under the law was higher than the actual revenue a ton a mile last year. Not only in Minnesota but over the entire lines these facts are deduced from the companies' own showing.

Rush for Heppner Land.
The Dalles, Aug. 29.—There was a crowd of 60 eager real estate fliers at the land office Tuesday, it being the day on which were thrown open for filing a portion of the Heppner and Cascade reserves. The lands lie for the most part in the southwest portion of the Heppner reserve, north of the town of Spray, and include seven townships. Fractional parts of three other townships were thrown open, bordering on the Warm Springs Indian reservation, on the Matoles river, and an isolated tract of 120 acres a few miles south of The Dalles, on the Mosier divide.

To avoid the rush, the land office adopted the lottery system and numbers were drawn, the first having the choice of selection, and so on down to the last. Hugh Roberts was No. 1 and Mrs. S. Coffin, aged 67, a widow, residing in Portland, was the next.

The system appeared satisfactory to all, and all but seven filed on the land they had selected. There were about 42 filings made, and today several more applications were made. In the line of applicants were old and young men, old women, middle-aged and young. Some carried their babies in their arms.

Found Old Graveyard.
Medford, Or., Aug. 29.—While excavating for a new track of the Southern Pacific railroad, near Gold Hill, 12 miles north of this city, workmen yesterday came upon what is supposed to be the burial ground of one of the tribes of Indians once inhabiting this valley. A number of skulls and many Indian curios were unearthed.

The spot is not remembered by any of the pioneer settlers as a burying ground, but, being near the foot of the historic Table Rock, from the top of which a number of the Rogue River Indians rushed down the steep side to death, it is believed by many that the remains are those of that now long extinct tribe.

Not Looking for War.
Seattle, Aug. 29.—Luke E. Wright ex-ambassador to Japan, arrived in this city today on the steamer Minnesota, from Yokohama, en route home. He does not believe there will be any serious result should the United States refuse the demands of Japan, for indemnity for the killing of Japanese poachers on the Pribyloff islands in 1906. The Japanese are not looking for war, as their finances will not permit.
