The accommodations are said to be so poor that stockmen often are compelled to drive their animals to Gervais for shipment.

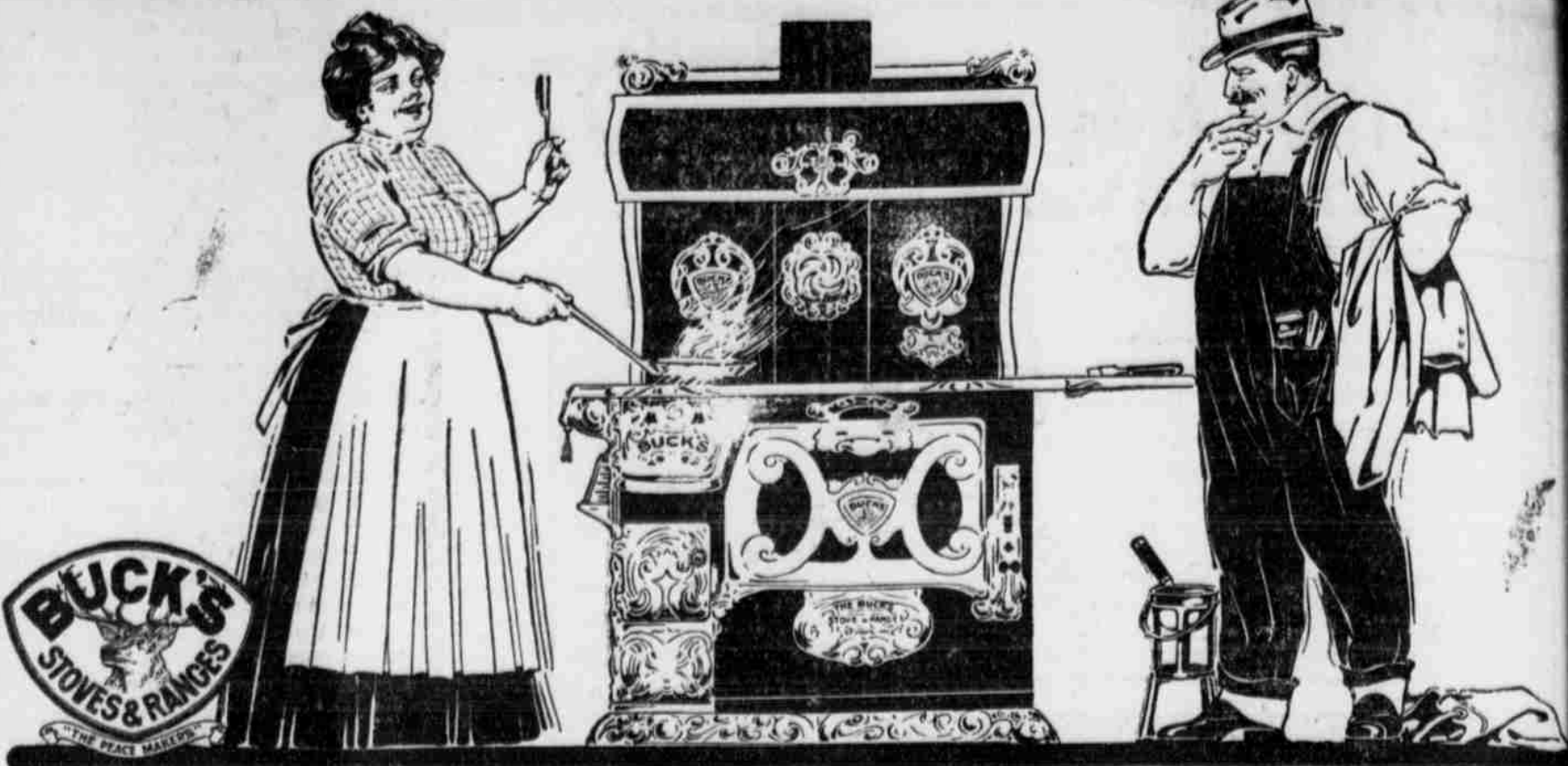

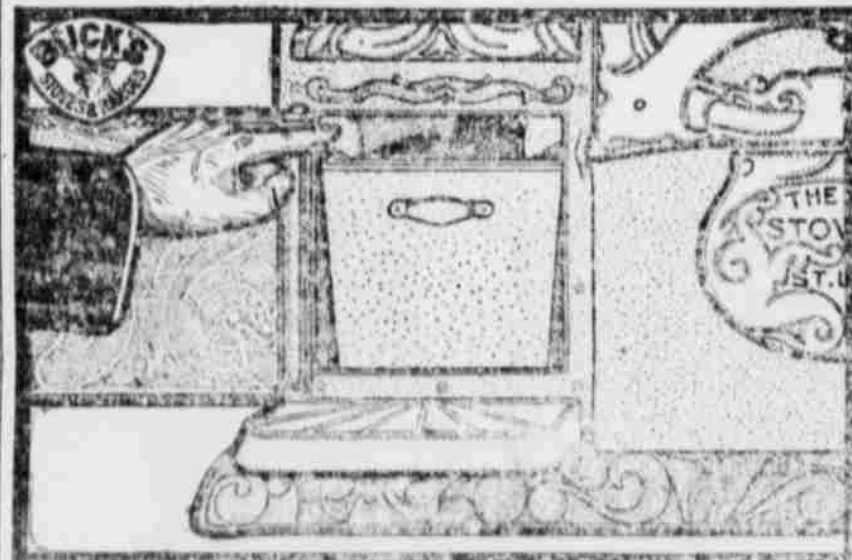

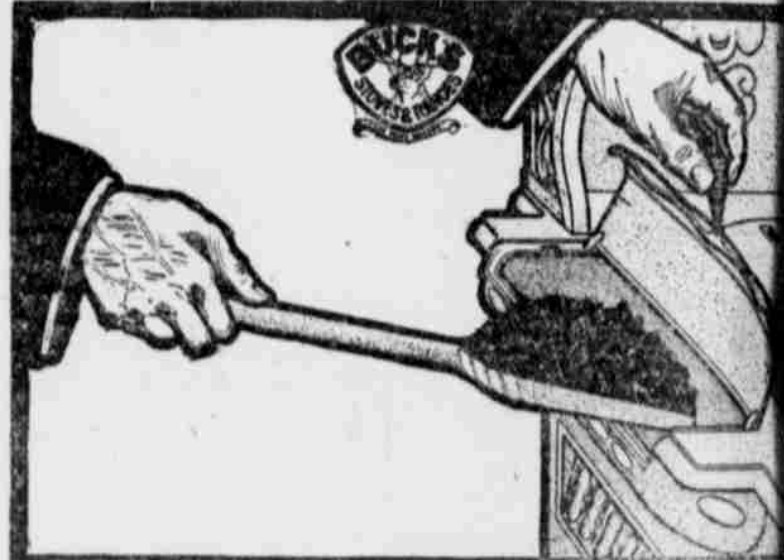
