A GOOD PROPOSAL.

The Associated Charities of Spokane proposes a state convention of charity and correction workers of the state to be held in that city this fall, and the Tacoma Ledger makes the following editorial comment:

The purpose is to bring together those engaged in state, county and city work and to bring about an exchange of ideas.

It is a high and at the same time practical purpose.

The state is sure of benefit.

Problems of charities and correction increase as the population of the state and its penal and charitable institutions increases.

THE CONDITION OF COUNTY AND CITY JAILS MAY BE DEPLORABLE IN PARTS OF THE STATE, AND THIS CONDITION MAY OBTAIN FROM YEAR TO YEAR WITHOUT CHANGE FOR THE BETTER.

Only by calling attention to conditions can these institutions be improved.

It used to be thought that any sort of foul and unhealthy place was good enough for a criminal and that demands for improvements came from sentimentalists.

A change has come about.

It is realized now that society "is made to suffer if penal institutions are so unsanitary as to be a source of disease."

HOW TO KEEP A JAIL CLEAN AND SANITARY AND HOW TO CONSTRUCT IT SO AS TO SEPARATE WOMEN FROM MEN PRISONERS AND YOUTHFUL FROM MATURE DELINQUENTS ARE PROBLEMS THAT MIGHT BE PROFITABLY DISCUSSED AT SUCH A STATE CONFERENCE AS IS PROPOSED.

The delegates would carry back to their home cities new and useful ideas.

Particularly in the last twenty years the study of charities and correction has engaged the minds of man of the best men and women of the time.

In several states are to be found state organizations and annual conferences are held of a character similar to the national conference of charities and correction held a few weeks ago in Minneapolis.

Then there are states in which boards created by law act in an advisory capacity between the state administration and the administrative heads of the correctional and benevolent institutions.

These boards also keep in touch with and advise county and city institutions.

Sometimes their approval is required before a county jail may be constructed.

A conference such as is proposed by the Associated Charities of Spokane is especially timely because of the new laws enacted by the last legislature, the operation of which will be far more successful if the public is kept informed and co-operates sympathetically and intelligently in the efforts to reform delinquents.

THE UNREST IN CHINA.

There seems no doubt that the "young China movement" is beginning to take a strong hold on the masses of the Chinese people, and the Manchu dynasty appears to be confronted with the alternative of resolutely leading it or imperiling its own dynastic existence.

As China is now—and in the nature of things must continue to be—in most immediate contact with Japan, there will be more occasions of friction with that government than with others, but there is little question that the young China movement has for its inspiration the doctrine of China for the Chinese and that Europeans and Americans are no more desired there than any other foreigners.

The Boxer uprising was really a national expression of hatred of all foreigners—who have given ample reason for hatred—and the methods were those of Chinese civilization, shocking to European races of the present age but not differing greatly from those of Europeans of four centuries ago.

And the loot of Peking by the allied armies is something for which young China probably expects to take full revenge in due time. Meantime, as boundary questions and those of the control of Manchuria become acute with Japan, we may expect growing friction between those countries, which for the present will blind Japan to keep the peace with the rest of the world.

CHINESE STATESMEN ALSO KNOW THAT WHILE JAPANESE ARMIES COULD JUST NOW OVERRUN CHINA IF THERE WERE MONEY TO SUPPORT THEM, JAPAN HAS NOT THE MONEY AND COULD NOT DO IT.

They also know that for any nation to actually conquer China would be impossible.

The attempt to do so, if sustained, would bankrupt any nation. Consequently, there is a growing disposition for the Chinese government to assert itself.

It is, of course, possible that the Manchu may finally ally themselves with the foreigners and call upon all the treaty powers for assistance against the threatened revolution; but just now, so far as can be judged from the news, the dynasty is showing a rather bold front to Japan.

When we remember that it is but a few years since Chinese diplomacy consisted in playing off Russia, first against Great Britain and later against Japan, and that now Russia is not even mentioned in connection with Chinese affairs, and that Japan has fortified herself with treaties with the European countries having largest "interests" in China, we can get some appreciation of the changes which a decade has brought in the oriental situation.

With additional changes the next decade may have in store no prudent person would attempt to foretell.

And if, instead of ten years, we attempt to project our forecast for a quarter of a century, the possibilities are still more bewildering.

Meanwhile we may be very sure that for the future the place for the preponderance of our naval force will be on the Pacific.

SIXTY-FOURTH YEAR

Willamette University Opens September 24 With Brightest Prospects

The sixty-fourth school year of Willamette University begins September 24. The attendance last year, in all departments, was 587, and, judging from the communications which are being received by the management, there will be an increase of at least 25 per cent in the attendance this year. The board will probably act in a few days on the numerous applications. The prospects for every college and department of the University are exceedingly bright. The college of music will be continued in the new building, which has recently been removed to the campus, and with Dean Heritage as its director, will probably gain a wider reputation for its excellence. Professor von Jessen, the able pianist, has been engaged for the coming season as dean of the piano department. His success and ability as a teacher and concert player are widely known.

College of Medicine.

The college of medicine will open September 16. Dr. W. H. Byrd has been retained as dean, and the faculty of lecturers is fully up to last year's standard of excellence.

The faculty of the University is completed, with the exception of the chair of history and economics, which will probably be filled in a few days.
