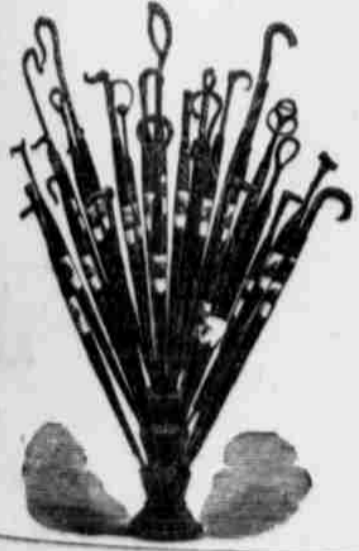

TEAM RUNS AWAY.
Carriage Upsets and Party of Four Has Narrow Escape.
By breaking part of the harness of a livery team, a carriage was upset near the Dencer place, at Liberty, at 4:30 Friday afternoon, and Miss Zonia Baber, of Chicago, was seriously injured about the head. She was brought to Salem in an ambulance at 10 o'clock Friday evening, and taken to the home of her brother-in-law, S. H. Snyder, in Yew Park, where she remained unconscious all night, but regained her consciousness this morning, and was doing well. The driving party consisted of Mrs. Snyder and sister, Miss Baber, and Mr. and Mrs. Wyman, of Kansas. They drove to Independ-

ence and were returning to Salem by way of Liberty when the accident occurred. The neck strap broke when near the Dencer place, letting the tongue down, and the team ran away, upsetting the carriage, and tangling all in the wreckage, so that they had to be extricated from their dangerous position, but fortunately none of the party but Miss Baber were injured more than by slight bruises. Drs. Smith were sent for and gave the lady surgical aid.
