Salem must have better transportation facilities, more rooms, better streets, and better accommodations for the people at the fair and in the city.

Next year the principal business streets **SHOULD BE DECORATED AND STRUNG WITH ELECTRIC LIGHTS AT NIGHT.**

A bureau must be organized to secure lodgings in private houses during the fair.

There will be a thousand automobiles attending the fair next year and a first class modern hotel with garage room on a large scale **MIGHT BE CONSTRUCTED AT ONCE.**

The boulevard leading to the fair grounds must be improved and an auto-driveway should be built for the exclusive use during the fair of machines, with a sidewalk, bicycle path and shade trees on each side.

The Capital City must awaken to its opportunities to make this the central residence and entertainment city of the state. Let all who can realize the opportunities for city building here open their throttle.

THE LATE HON. FRANK DAVEY.

After the excitement of the state fair is over, The Capital Journal is obliged to take up a little space discussing the above gentleman.

His personal affairs or his personal history or defects do not concern anyone, **BUT HIS WORK AS A REPUBLICAN POLITICIAN DOES.**

He has had job after job at the public crib. In fact it has been his principal source of subsistence for the past twenty years.

His latest achievement was as speaker of the house of representatives **WHICH HE CONCLUDED BY GETTING A JOB FOR HIMSELF AT \$10 PER DAY, TO REVISE THE RECORDS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF WHICH HE WAS A PRESIDING GENIUS.**

In a late edition of his newspaper in Harney county he devotes a page to the personal abuse of the editor of The Capital Journal.

Editor Frank Davey, of the Burns News, ex-speaker of the house, is getting back on Editor Hofer, of The Salem Journal, in a very red hot, sizzling manner, of which the following are samples:

"Col. Hofer has the reputation of being purchasable on any side of any question, etc."

"Financially interested in every graft that has been worked on state, county or city."

"The Democrats purchased Hofer's support with coin in 1902 for Chamberlain, a further cementing of the traitorous alliances being effected when the governor appointed Hofer a regent of the normal schools."

"Hofer has grafted every state officer who could be frightened or cajoled for the past 17 years."

"He has the audacity of the devil and publicly proclaims himself the champion of purity and the people's interests."

"He is an assassin of character except when he is paid to flatter."

"Political mountebank, innate rottenness, small souled jealousies, etc."

Davey was speaker of the last legislature, probably the worst the state ever had, and undoubtedly lives in a glass house, which the colonel has a big opportunity to shatter, and probably will.

Mr. Davey was employed on The Capital Journal for a number of years, and for many years applauded the work of this paper.

When The Capital Journal attacked the corrupt gang that was plundering the state school land office, and Geo. W. Davis was proven a defaulter for \$30,000 and fled the state Davey said Col. Hofer was all right. **WAS DAVEY RIGHT THEN, OR IS HE LYING NOW?**

In 1902 the Republican party was divided, the independent element supporting the Democratic nominee. Hofer Brothers informed candidate Chamberlain that they intended to support him regardless of whether he or his campaign committees spent any money advertising in this paper or not.

During Governor Chamberlain's second campaign The Capital Journal supported his opponent, and refused to sell space to the Democratic commission. The Salem Statesman, of which Mr. Davey was editor, also opposed Chamberlain, **BUT SOLD SPACE IN THE CENTER OF ITS FRONT PAGE TO CHAMBERLAIN'S MANAGERS TO COUNTERACT WHAT THE PAPER SAID EDITORILY FOR THE REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE.**

Mr. Davey boasts that he received 600 more votes in the Marion county primary of 1906 for representative than Col. Hofer did. That is true, but Col. Hofer was running on a reform platform, made no combinations, refused all alliances, **DID NOT QUALIFY HIS APPROVAL OF STATEMENT NO. 1, WHILE DAVEY DID.** To people who opposed Statement No. 1, he said "to hell with Statement No. 1." His campaign was one of open barefaced deception of the voter from beginning to end, **AND THE RESULT PROVED THIS.**

So long as the editor of this paper is not guilty of the outrages committed on the people in the name of Republicanism that Mr. Davey has been guilty of he will not take the trouble to defend himself.

Being a perpetual taxpayer, representing the taxpayers, not being a taxpayer, Mr. Davey went into the legislature and organized it **ON EXACTLY THE OPPOSITE LINES FROM WHAT COL. HOFER WOULD HAVE DONE.**

Signor De Caprio Feels He Has Been Misrepresented in Regard to Musical Union.

Signor De Caprio, the well-known band director of Portland, who filled an engagement as baritone soloist at the state fair with McElroy's Military Band, is quite indignant over the report which has been given out that he, through jealousy, was the instigator of the misunderstanding between Professor McElroy and the Portland musical union, and wishes to make the following statement:

"In the first place, as you know," said he, "I am a member of the Portland musician's union, and last year was awarded the contract to furnish a band for the fair held in Pendleton. I filled the engagement to the entire satisfaction of the management, using nothing but union men, at Portland prices. During the past year the Portland union raised the price for the services of its members to \$6 per day, which action I was not responsible for. This year I made a bid for the Pendleton fair, stating that the union had raised its prices, and I would have to govern my bid accordingly. Mr. McElroy also bid on the job, and was awarded the contract. Several of my friends asked the cause for the union requiring that the union prices be paid in the Salem and Pendleton engagements, and have been given the impression that, through jealousy, I influenced the musical union to hold Mr. McElroy up on the engagements. A musical union is organized for the purpose of obtaining a systematic scale of prices, and to promote a higher standard of music, and in order to protect its members the laws of the organization must be enforced. In the present case the matter came up in the regular form, when it was learned that some of our members had been engaged to play at Salem and in Pendleton. As for my being jealous, the fact that I came to Salem and played under Mr. McElroy would disprove that. No, I am not jealous, and had Mr. McElroy made his bid according to the union scale there would have been no trouble. As for myself, I have resolved that I will not fill an engagement again, without it be as a specially engaged soloist or as director of my own band, but I have not made this decision because I am jealous of any musician."
