Wooden Walks Going—

The old wooden walk in front of the Hubbard property on the corner of State and High streets, is being torn up preliminary to the laying of a cement walk. The old plank walks are fast disappearing, and when the walk is finished in front of the Hubbard property there will be no timber-made walks on State street between the railroad and Commercial street, with the exception of a few feet between Winter and Cottage streets.

Salem Flax Industry—

It is not generally known that Eugene Bosse, well-known as promoter of the flax fibre industry at Salem, has 200 acres of flax coming in for manufacture. He is paying \$8 per ton for short flax, and \$12 to \$15 per ton for longer flax, tied in bundles. He has a plant set up in East Salem, with electric power attached, and expects to get out a large quantity of fibre, if he is not burned out again. His flax enterprises have suffered several conflagrations, believed to be of incendiary nature. Some believe it to be the work of some hireling of the flax trust, on the theory of a sinister determination to prevent the establishment of this industry in Western Oregon at all hazards. Mrs. Lord, of Salem, is as hopeful of success as ever for the flax industry.
