The Craftsman for October might well be called an "Educational Number," for the idea most prominently set forth in its pages is that of the great value of handicrafts as a means of mental and moral development, not only for children but

for men and women of both business and leisure classes. The editorial by Gustav Stickley is devoted to the subject of manual training. "Among the Craftsmen," and "From The Craftsman Workshops" are new departments started in October, which include practical lessons in handicrafts; the theory of design is taught by Ernest Bachelder, and also there are practical lessons by Mr. Stickley himself in cabinet making and mental work; for the builders there are important architectural articles, and also a valuable talk by the editor on the decoration of wall spaces. Besides the special educational purpose of the magazine, there are valuable articles on "Secession Art—Its Growth, Meaning and Failure"; some interesting letters which Lafcadio Hearn wrote to an English friend about "Modern Decadent Writers," and a delightful talk about Millet from notes made by his friend Wyatt Eaton, who lived much with him in Barbizon. A brief account of Saint Gaudens' work is interestingly illustrated. And there are two vigorous stories—one an Indian romance by Frederick R. Burton, and the other a charming tale by Katharine M. Roof. Among the illustrations are nine beautiful color inserts.

DIAMONDS IN OREGON.

May Some Day Be the Greatest Diamond Field in the World.

The little story in this issue about the discovery of peculiarly hard crystals in Malheur county, and the headline suggesting they may be diamonds, may not be far from the truth. As a matter of fact, there are thousands of millions of diamonds in Southeastern Oregon, probably the greatest quantity of diamonds in the world, but they are too small to have commercial value. Tiffany, the great New York jeweler, spent several thousand dollars having experts examine the field 20 years ago. In one place the road along a hillside is graded with a formation composed largely of diamonds. A few stones of value have been found, the largest known to the writer weighing nearly three carats. Eastern Oregon also contains immense quantities of opal, chert, Lydian stone, chalcedony and other varieties of colloid quartz. To go back to the diamonds, Tiffany's agents, diamond experts, predicted that some time Eastern Oregon might prove to be the greatest diamond field in the world. They claimed that when the diamonds were formed there was not sufficient pressure to cause them to form large enough, and a shaft was sunk 78 feet into the diamond-bearing material, in the hope of finding a strata of larger stones. Has Malheur, in boring for water, run into a mass of these small diamonds? It looks that way.
