MRS. BRADLEY WILL PLEAD INSANITY

Washington, Oct. 5.—Whether or not a plea of insanity will avail to save Mrs. Bradley, who shot and killed ex-United States Arthur Brown of Utah in his apartments at the Raleigh hotel last December, after he had refused to marry her, will soon be known, as the case is set for trial next week. It is probable that the attorneys for the defense will seek to secure a further delay, but whether it will be granted is not definitely known.

George P. Hoover, the Washington attorney who has been retained in defense of Mrs. Bradley, is responsible for the assertion that mental irresponsibility will be pleaded in her behalf. Mrs. Bradley, if well enough, will go on the stand and tell her tragic life story to the jury. Five witnesses from Utah and other western states have been summoned. One of these is Judge Henderson, former law partner of the late Senator Brown, who dissolved partnership with the senator because of his alleged unspeakable cruelty to Mrs. Bradley. The Rev. David Utter, pastor of Unity church, Denver, a friend and co-worker of Mrs. Bradley and who was also intimately acquainted with Senator Brown's family, will give it as his opinion that Mrs. Bradley was insane when she killed Brown. Testimony and depositions to this effect will also be given by many other western witnesses.

It is possible that letters alleged to be now in the possession of the authorities, written by Mrs. Annie C. Adams, mother of Maude Adams, the actress, to Senator Brown, will also be introduced. Mrs. Adams and the senator were personal friends for years, and it is intimated that Mrs. Bradley was insanely jealous because of the letters that passed between them.

Although Mrs. Bradley is penniless and there will be no millions available for the defense, she will not lack competent legal assistance. Six attorneys will appear for the broken little prisoner, headed by Judge Orlando W. Powers, of Salt Lake City. Judge Powers is famous as a pleader, as renowned in Utah and the intermountain district as Delphin Delmas is on the Pacific coast.

For months Mrs. Bradley has been planning for her defense, fully realizing the importance of the case in which she is involved. One of her decisions is peculiarly feminine, in that she has informed her attorneys that there must be no curly-haired men on the jury that will decide her fate.

"I detest curly-haired men," declares Mrs. Bradley. "Such a man is never broad-minded or liberal in his views. There are strange little curls in his nature as well as in his hair that make him unreliable. Women should be all curls and curves, but men should be built on straight lines."

Mrs. Bradley continued: "I should like the jury made up of men who have loved some one woman strongly and deeply—who have known the heights and the depths of the grand passion. I should like a jury of refined men, those who know and love poetry. They would understand my madness, for they would know that all men—and some women—kill the thing they love."

That the love that existed between Senator Brown and Mrs. Bradley was poetical and beautiful, even though enveloped in shadow and unsanctified by law or religion, there is no doubt. That Senator Brown openly boasted of his love for the fair little woman, the mother of two children whom he at times admitted as his own, and that Mrs.

tensity of a woman's heart is shown in the hundreds of letters which passed between them, and which will be introduced in evidence at the trial.

In his will Senator Brown denied that either of Mrs. Bradley's children were his, and stated "I have never married Anna M. Bradley and never intend to." This document was filed four months before the senator's death, and by it he bequeathed all his property, valued at about \$75,000, to his two children by his first and second wives.

In his letters to Mrs. Bradley, which will no doubt produce a sensation at the trial, Brown acknowledges the paternity of the two children whom he disowned in his will. Among the statements made in these letters are the following:

"Take good care of our little Arthur Brown." "I am determined more than ever that we shall soon be before the world all that we are to each other." "I am still determined to go through life with you." "I think only of the duty I owe you, of the wrong I have done you and yours." "When I look backward I see the different man I would be had I married you in early youth." "I hereby acknowledge Arthur Brown and Mark Montgomery Brown to be my children by Anna M. Bradley," is contained in a signed statement given by Brown to Mrs. Bradley in May, 1905. All of Brown's letters abound in expressions of endearment, and he often addressed Mrs. Bradley as "my wife."
