COUNTY FAIR AT GLADSTONE

The First Exhibition Dated For Oct. 10, 11 and 12

Clackamas county's final annual fair, which will be held in Gladstone park, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 10, 11 and 12, is attracting attention from every part of Clackamas, and from Multnomah and Marion, as well. This is to be the first festival of this kind ever held in old Clackamas, and the members of the various committees are working overtime to get the grounds in shape in the brief time that remains. The premium list contains to grow and in addition to the cash prizes, that aggregate \$500 there are many premiums donated by the merchants of Oregon City and Portland for the exhibits. There are 18 divisions in the fair, embracing horses, cattle, sheep and swine, poultry, vegetables, fruit, farm products, domestic process, flowers, sewing and fancy work, pickles and sauces, works of art and ornamentation, domestic process for girls under 15 years of age, fancy work for girls under 15 years of age, minerals, dogs, grange and the baby show.

The construction of stalls, pens and booths for the exhibits is now in progress and there will be ample space to house all of the displays offered. The gates to the fair will be opened on Thursday morning of next week. The admission has been fixed at 25 cents, with a rate of 10 cents to children under 12 years of age. Season tickets for the fair will be 50 cents. Saturday, the last day of the fair, will be children's day, and all children under 12 years of age will be admitted free on that day.

The Nat Reiss Carnival company has been engaged to furnish its productions at the Clackamas County fair, and this will be the means of attracting thousands of people during the three days. In fact preparations are being made for the entertainment of 15,000 visitors at Gladstone park the latter part of next week. The main feature of the attraction is the big one-ring circus, Madame Wanda's troupe of trained English coach dogs will give an exhibition of almost human intelligence, being put through a number of variety of tricks. TEDDY HITS THE CANE-BRAKES

Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 5.—According to reports received here, President Roosevelt today turned his back on civilization and entered the semi-tropical swamps of northeast Louisiana, where he will spend 17 days. The President was accompanied to the border of the game section by a staff from the executive office, headed by Assistant Secretary Latta, and also by representatives of the press associations, but they will not accompany the nimrods on their hunt. A temporary capital has been established, and Mr. Latta will keep his chief informed of affairs of great importance. The camp life will be shared by Civil Service Commissioner McIlhenny, a Louisiana sportsman who has hunted many times over the ground.

Wildcats, bears and deer are said to be abundant in the region where the Presidential rifle will be raised. A hunting party in this region led by Governor Blanchard of Louisiana last year bagged 40 deer. Mosquitoes are also so plentiful that nets are necessary over the face, but this nuisance has now begun to abate.

From the Far West, to the Far East. Montreal is a great substantial city. Having to wait till the Intercolonial was ready to move on Sunday afternoon, he decided on making the ascent of Mount Royal. This is a beautiful little mountain just outside the limits of the city. Reaching the station directly in front of the mountain we are carried up a steep railway by a cable to its top. The view from this eminence is grand. One could, if he wished, count almost every building in the city. The great Victoria bridge—across the St. Lawrence is in full view and the winding river, bordered on either side by well cultivated farms and orchards, make the view one of the grandest in America. The top of the mountain is very flat and many beautiful roadways and drives make it a resort of great pleasure. A picnic of some sort is held here almost every day in the week. There is also a beautiful cemetery on its summit, and it is possible to ascend it from behind on a winding road. It contains many attractions, such as flower gardens, walks, rustic buildings, etc., etc. Having spent a few hours viewing the beauties, we descend to the street as we went up, in cable cars.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon we board the cars of the Intercolonial railway and are off for Point Du Chene, New Brunswick. We are now in the province of Quebec, inhabited largely by French-Canadians. The French-Canadians are nearly all Roman Catholics, and like French citizens everywhere are very polite and handsome—especially the ladies. Every town along the line has from one to two large churches, and on Sundays are crowded with worshippers. Nearly every station is named after a saint, such as St. Charles, St. Henri, St. Lambert, St. Hubert, St. Bruno, Ste. Rosalie, Ste. Perpetue, etc., etc. The farms all along this part of the Intercolonial are long and narrow, every building being completely fenced round with numerous cross fences beside. The houses and barns are built in a straight line about half a mile back from the railroad on each side. They are low and narrow, but all painted white and present a very handsome appearance. The quality of the soil is light and in many places stony. Yet the people seem to be comfortable, able to dress well and jolly.

After a ride of 162 miles we arrive at Point Levis—a very important point on the St. Lawrence river. On the opposite is the famous old city of Quebec, and a little below it the great bridge, then in course of erection, but which a few days after our visit, fell into the river with such disastrous effects. This is a very picturesque place and one loves to dwell on the high granite banks, around which General Wolfe crept so cautiously until he found an easy way to reach the plains of Abraham, where he met General Montcalm and defeated him in one of the hardest battles of the time.
