Another franchise has been granted a telephone company to do business in the Capital City. The magnificent compensation the city is to receive will be one per cent of the gross earnings on long distance business that originates here, after two years. That will pour revenues into the city treasury like water—at least two dollars a year, if not more. There is one good thing about it—there is nothing much left to give away.

It is a cold day when Salem can't raise \$5000 on a single Sunday for some church or college. But that is the Salem way. We are ready to invest our last dollar for education and religion.

Every business man in Salem can feel the expanding conditions that are in evidence on every hand in the Capital City. Merchants are working their stores to full limit. Every kind of public utility is pushed to meet demands for service. Schools are all crowded. Hotels are overflowing. Now is the time to strike for still greater Salem.

Among other kindnesses of the last legislature was the abolishing of publication of the delinquent tax lists in the county papers. It will now be much easier to part a property owner from his lands or home if he gets behind on his taxes. Publication had reduced the delinquent tax sales to almost nothing. It was time to change the system and play into the hands of the professional tax-title sharp.

Hon. Frank Davey continues to devote space to the editor of The Capital Journal. When he prints anything real mean or offensive, or any statement of facts of a damaging character that might interest the public, who want to know the worst that can be said about the editor of this paper, we shall reprint it in our columns. In that respect Mr. Davey has so far been careful to not follow what has been our custom for nearly 30 years of newspaper experience. It is very pleasant to reproduce the nice things that are said about an editor, but it takes a little nerve to show your own readers the reverse side.

J. L. Stockton and other business men in the city council deserve credit for their fight to have the fair grounds road made passable. That street was the only blot on the city during the state fair. A few carloads of crushed rock would put it in fine order. But it seems technical objections in the charter are in the way. The fact is, a charter can be construed to open streets or to keep them closed. Stockton and other business men, who want the trade of the city protected, would sweep aside the technicalities and do things. That street should be shot right straight through to the government highway, and there ought to be enough push and vim in the city council, the mayor and the street commissioner, to find some way to do it. There was no law for offering \$5000 reward for the arrest of the murderers of Sheriff Brown, but the state officials found a way to do it. There has got to be less tinkering with technicalities and more doing things for the development of the city and the protection of its trade. The fair grounds road can and should be put in condition for travel this fall and winter. The street commissioner, with a team and a few men, can do it in two or three days.

None of the freak propositions pending before the council will ever see the light of day. One of the principal political agitators of the old political machine was not at the last council meeting. His absence was felt in the way public business was expedited. A city council of 14 is not too many, if they were the right kind of men. Any number of the freak order are a curse to any city that wants to go ahead. Let us have more business men and less freaks and jugglers.

A Big Pump.

The largest high pressure pump in the world, and one of the largest pieces of mining machinery ever manufactured is in operation in Jackson county, Oregon, on Rogue river. It is of the five-step, centrifugal type, and weighs, aside from bearings and gears, just 70,000 pounds (35 tons). The pump is tested to stand a pressure of 250 pounds to the square inch. It has a capacity of 13,000,000 gallons every 24 hours, or 9000 gallons per minute.—Ashland Tidings.
