DEER HELD UP THE STAGE

Antlered Denizen of the Forest Shot for His Impudence.
Passengers on the incoming stage from Pogeama last Saturday had the novel and somewhat exciting experience of being held up by a deer, says the Klamath Republican. The first stage had reached the junction of the Ashland and Pogeama roads, when on around the road they came into full view of a handsome buck, standing in the middle of the road. His buckship was not in the least disconcerted, and evidently disbelieving in the right of eminent domain, whether claimed by the stage company or Uncle Sam's mail, seemed intent on remaining where he was. Dr. Parker occupied the seat alongside the driver, and when the stage came to a standstill he grabbed his Winchester and climbed down. Taking aim he pulled the trigger, and not until the bullet had found lodgment underneath his hide did the deer move. After circling around he crossed the road about 150 yards back of the stage. Again the doctor fired, this time placing the bullet in the deer's head. TO PLAT CITY FOR TELEPHONES

Pacific Company Will Make Extensive Improvements

E. B. Schonenbach, of the engineering department of the Pacific Telephone Company, is in the city, and will spend several weeks making a complete re-survey of the city for the future guidance of his company. It seems that the facilities of the telephone company, like those of the railroads and other corporations, are wholly inadequate. The towns of the entire Northwest have outgrown the capacity of the telephone people to keep pace, and it is to right this condition in Salem that Mr. Schonenbach is here. He expects to make estimates of all the new facilities they will need in the next 10 years, and recommend an improvement that will cover the demands of growing Salem for that length of time. The first steps to be taken will be a complete plat of every street and alley, and this must include all data up to date, and covering as much contemplated work as the city officials will be able to supply.

The present cables, both underground and aerial, are filled, and the first thing to be provided is a system of new and additional cables nearly doubling the present plant. The switchboard room is nearly filled, and further provisions in this line will be made at once. The most important part of Mr. Schonenbach's work for the present will be the making of plans for getting all the necessary cable and other underground work in shape on the streets about to be paved before that work is undertaken. When completed this will give Salem a much more perfect system, and in fact one of the very best on the Pacific coast.

GETTING READY TO PAVE.

The first work of the Warren Construction Company on the proposed improvement of Court street was begun yesterday afternoon, when two carloads of crushed rock were dumped at the intersection of Liberty and Court streets. Local Manager Smart, who is superintending the work, says that within a few days the materials for the pavement will arrive from Portland, and expects to have the paving machinery, which is being brought from Eugene in position within a week. The machinery will be placed on the Albert property, on Bellview street, and the rock used for the foundation of the street will be obtained from the South Salem quarry.

The company will furnish specially made wagons to be used in hauling the hot material for the street, as the hot stuff will set fire to any wood with which it comes in contact. Mr. Smart is listing teams to be used on the work, which will give employment to many Salem teamsters.
