OFFERING HUSBANDS AS PRIZES

But a Man Who Would Consent to Be a Chromo Is No Good Anyhow

A Berlin tradesman has lately issued a circular promising to bestow a husband, in the person of his son, upon the spinster who shall, within a year's space, collect the most coupons, one of which is given with each purchase to the value of five marks. To the prize husband, as a wedding gift, he has promised to bestow a share in his business.

This singular offer, though, of course, of rare occurrence in the commercial world, is not without precedent. Some years since a Leeds firm of drapers circulated among its customers penny tokens, whereon was depicted a stylish dressed man surrounded by the legend, "A Husband for a Guinea," signifying that such an expended that amount on the firm's goods were allowed one chance in a raffle for an eligible young man, the junior partner in the house.

A circular which a now defunct tea company distributed among its lady canvassers contained the announcement that "the young lady who procures the best result, compared with the amount of salary received for not less than six months' service will receive £500 and be allowed to marry any single young gentleman of the firm. Should the young gentleman refuse to marry her we will pay the breach-of-promise damages, £100 extra, and dismiss the young gentleman from the firm."

In the early years of our late queen's reign the proprietor of a library at one of the leading Kentish watering places issued the announcement of a lottery for a husband, who was guaranteed to be in the enjoyment of an annuity of not less than £200 per annum. The event created quite a stir, as the prize was a handsome young fellow, who appeared to be in every way eligible. Great, then, was the dismay created by the arrival on the very day when the draw was advertised to take place of a couple of London constables, by whom the much-admired Adonis was arrested on a charge of fraud.

Every New Year's day a large Viennese firm of bootmakers was wont to offer a husband to the lady whose foot was considered to be the smallest and most shapely of the year, guaranteeing at the same time to set the couple up in business should such help be needed. For over 20 years this practice continued until the head of the firm, an old widower, fell in love with and himself married the Cinderella-footed lady, who, being of an ultra-jealous disposition sternly vetoed the custom's continuance.

In the late eighties a Brussels tailor took a young man into his employ on the stipulation that he should be allowed to dispose of him in marriage. The agreement signed, the tailor made public announcement that he would bestow a husband upon that spinster or widow who should bring most custom to his establishment within twelve months. After a keen competition the prize was carried off by a buxom widow of 60, who, besides introducing her eight sons to the clothier's notice, was the means of inducing over a score of brothers, cousins and nephews to patronize his shop.

To all spinsters and widows a chance in the lottery for a husband was the inducement held out by a New York photographer to have their photographs taken at his establishment, while to such ladies as were married, and therefore ineligible, it was permitted to nominate a friend in their stead. The circulars to this effect, which were distributed broadcast, were surmounted with a likeness of the prospective prize, a man of such attractive appearance that many matrimonially inclined women were induced to try their luck before the camera.

After some months, during which trade prospered exceedingly, the draw took place and the good-looking young man was duly delivered over to a lady who, it subsequently transpired, was the photographer's own daughter, whose father had persuaded her to exploit for the good of his business, her fiancée of some three years' standing. The cunning trio soon afterward left New York. —London Tit-Bits.

LABOR UNION ENTERTAINS

Salem Carpenters Have Program and Refreshments Saturday Night

Salem union of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, No. 1065, has arranged a fine musical and literary program for Saturday night at 7:30 at Union Labor Hall, at 416 State street, to which all members of the union and all non-union carpenters and their families are cordially invited. There will be addresses by Rev. Dell, of the First Congregational church; Col. J. L. Stockton and others and music and refreshments will be served afterwards. The committee have worked hard to get up a fine program, and expect every member of the organization to lay aside his square and level, bring his wife, if he has one, and also bring along some brother worker who is not a member of the Union. The carpenter's union is the strongest labor union in the Capital City, and desires to extend the field of its legitimate usefulness to all who work at their trade.

AURORA'S WATER PROBLEM

Aurora, Or., Oct. 9.—At the last meeting of the city council the water works question was taken up and thoroughly discussed, and it was the sense of the members present that not a sufficient supply of water even for fire protection could be obtained from the well lately bored, and decision reached that the most feasible plan would be to investigate some other source of water supply, several of which are close to the city. One proposition was to locate a pumping station on the banks of the Pudding river, and pump water into a high tank located on the present site of the plant. Another plan is to pump into the tank from the spring well at the Aurora Electrical Company's power plant, where it is claimed sufficient water for all uses can be obtained at a reasonable cost. Still another plan has been considered to pump water from J. G. Miller's spring on his farm, where there is said to be a never-failing supply of good water. No decision has yet been reached by the water committee of the council as to which location they will use, but they will thoroughly investigate the matter, and report at the next meeting.

Plenty of Hunters.
Aurora, Or., Oct. 9.—Many hunters from Portland and other nearby cities have been up here hunting pheasants since the season opened, and have met with fair success, though the birds are getting scarce every year. One Portland hunter was here the first day the season opened and bagged the limit of birds.

To Improve a Portion of State Street in the City of Salem, Oregon, and to Improve the Railway Track of the Portland General Electric Co., on State Street in Said City from the West Line of Church Street to the West Line of Twelfth Street.

To Whom It May Concern: Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve a strip of land seven feet wide in the center of State street from the west line of Church street to the west line of Twelfth street in said city, and the railway track of the Portland General Electric Company on said street between said points by placing the track of said Portland General Electric Company in the center of said State street, between the west line of Church street and the west line of Twelfth street in said city, and on the grade of said portion of said State street, and by paving said seven feet with a stone block pavement on a concrete foundation between the street car rails and one foot outside of the rails, and by relaying the rails of said railway track with seven-inch grooved rails on a concrete base.

The said improvement of said strip of land and said railway track to be made in accordance with the plans and specifications for the doing of said work now on file in the office of the City Recorder of Salem, Oregon, and marked respectively "Plan of Improvement of Street Car Track on State Street" and "Improvement of the Track of the Portland General Electric Company on a Portion of State Street—Specifications," said plans and specifications being filed in said office September 25, 1907.
